MOPUB, and Aquilla, and KCP&L. I've been a resident
 and under the same orders that I give, I have to live
 through them.

So anyway, this is a long process. We have a hearing coming up in the future, and I'm one of five commissioners, and the other four will hear your--be able to read your testimony, so I appreciate your coming out. Again, I just want to welcome you and thank you for showing up.

JUDGE CLARK: Thank you, Commissioner.

I want to begin by asking counsel to enter
their appearances for the record, starting with Kansas
City Power & Light Company.

MR. STEINER: Good evening. My name is
Roger Steiner. I represent Kansas City Power & Light
Company and KCPL Greater Missouri Operations Company.
My contact information is with the court reporter.

18 JUDGE CLARK: Thank you, and for the 19 Commission staff?

20 MS. PAYNE: Whitney Payne, legal staff 21 member, Missouri Public Service Commission. The court 22 reporter also has my information.

JUDGE CLARK: Thank you. For the Office of
 Public Counsel?
 MR. CLIZER: John Clizer, with the Office of

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1 Public Counsel, with Lera Shemwell. Our information is with the court reporter. 2 3 JUDGE CLARK: Thank you. Is there anybody else I need an appearance? 4 5 (No response) JUDGE CLARK: I see no hands. 6 7 The Commission has already scheduled an evidentiary hearing for September, I believe it's the 8 9 17th through the 28th, to take evidence regarding 10 KCP&L and KCP&L Greater Missouri Operations' 11 applications for a rate increase. It's also scheduled 12 local public hearings in some of the counties 13 affected, to give the members of the public a chance 14 to comment about the company's applications, and 15 that's the purpose of today's hearing. 16 For those who'd like to provide testimony 17 today, and I see we have one person signed up at this 18 time, I'm going to call the name listed on the sign-up 19 sheet, and when I call your name, please come down to 20 the front to the podium. I'll place you under oath 21 and I'll ask you to state and spell your name, and 2.2 then you can offer your comments to the Commission. 23 There is no time limit, since we seem to only have 24 you, so however long you take is fine with me. 25 If the other person who is here, after

hearing that, if you decide you'd like to testify, you are certainly welcome to do so, and I'll be happy to swear you in and take your testimony, as well, but that's entirely up to you.

5 After you testify, please remain at the 6 podium for a minute. I may have a question for you, 7 the Commissioner may have a question for you, and the 8 attorneys may have a question for you, and if you have 9 a question for the person testifying, just let me 10 know. Okay?

The Commission won't be able to answer any of your questioning. We had a question-and-answer session before this, and there's a reason for that, and that's because the commissioners have to remain impartial until after the evidentiary hearing when the evidence is presented.

If you have questions, I'm going to invite you to stick around and talk to representatives of the company, the Commission staff, or the Office of Public Counsel.

21 With all that in mind, Beverly Coonce, are 22 you ready to testify?

23 MS. COONCE: Yes.

JUDGE CLARK: Would you raise your righthand and be sworn? Do you solemnly swear or affirm

Page 8 1 that the testimony you are about to give is the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth? 2 3 MS. COONCE: I do. JUDGE CLARK: Would you state and spell your 4 5 last name? Beverly Coonce, C-o-o-n-c-e. 6 MS. COONCE: 7 JUDGE CLARK: And what would you like to tell the Commission tonight? 8 9 MS. COONCE: I have been a customer of KC 10 Power & Light for many, many years, and I wasn't aware 11 until recently that -- when I got a huge bill when 12 normally in the summer, my bill is the lowest of 13 everybody's because I like it hot in my house. I like 14 it to be 75 or 80 degrees in my house. I like it 15 warm, and mine is high in the winter, so when I got 16 this bill, which I normally my bill is like \$150, 17 \$200, it was \$600, I went "Whoa," and they said I used 18 4,000 kilowatt hours when I normally use, you know, a 19 thousand or 1,500, at the most, during this time of year, and I know it's been hot the past few months, 20 21 but anyway, I called Kansas City Power & Light and 2.2 complained, and they said, "I'll get back to you," and 23 they never ever got back to me, and they sent me 24 another bill, and added on part of the amount that I 25 hadn't paid because I paid the amount that I normally

1 pay for 4,000 kilowatt hours, which is sometimes what I use in the winter, and they charged me a late fee, 2 but I just feel and also realized that in the sixth 3 month, and the seventh month, and the eighth month--I 4 5 went through my records--they charge a flat fee. The rest of the year, they charge three levels, \$600 at 6 the highest rate and then 400 kilowatt hours at 7 another rate, and then a third level for the rest of 8 9 the kilowatt hours, but in the sixth month, seventh 10 month, and eighth month, they charge a flat fee for 11 whole thing of 12.05 percent, and to me, I don't know 12 what--they say, you know, they need, they use more 13 energy then, but the thing is, they're also charging 14 the people a huge amount more money, so to me, I feel like that's price gouging, and I don't think that's 15 16 They should change--they should charge the same fair. 17 fee through the whole year, and they haven't increased their flat rate that much over the four years, but 18 19 they have, you know, in all these years, charged a flat rate in the sixth month, seventh month, and 20 21 eighth month, and I just feel like it's price gouging 2.2 when most people's bill is very, very high, and here 23 it's time for vacation and whatever, they're paying 24 all this money for an electric bill, and I just--I just don't think it's right. 25

1 COMMISSIONER KENNEY: Ms. Coonce, did the 2 staff, or Public Counsel, or the company, were they 3 able to answer some of your questions as to why the tariffs might allow that? 4 5 MS. COONCE: No. I mean, I'm going to try 6 to talk to someone. 7 COMMISSIONER KENNEY: I would suggest, I'm sure that I know the Public Counsel and the staff at 8 9 the company will be available to explain how that --10 it's called a tariff--what they use, and how it works, 11 and how it's broken down into different months, but 12 perhaps they can give you better information, and if 13 not, I'm sure they'll give you information as to what 14 you can do going forward. 15 THE WITNESS: Thank you. 16 COMMISSIONER KENNEY: Thank you, Ms. Coonce. 17 JUDGE CLARK: You had indicated that you had 18 contacted the company about your large bill and that 19 they hadn't gotten back to you. 20 MS. COONCE: That is correct. 21 JUDGE CLARK: And how long ago was that? MS. COONCE: The bill was for--from 5/13 to 2.2 6/13.23 24 JUDGE CLARK: Okay, so just a few months 25 back. Did you ever try and contact them about it

1 again?

2	MS. COONCE: Yes. They said that, you know,			
3	they hadn't gotten out to read the meter yet, and then			
4	just the past week, they called and said that they			
5	couldn't read the meter, but I went out there and I			
6	could read the meter, so that was a big fat lie. It			
7	was some excuse for somebody making a mistake.			
8	JUDGE CLARK: Now, you had also said that			
9	there was this kind of tiered system?			
10	MS. COONCE: Mm-hmm.
