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#### PROCEEDINGS

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JUDGE CLARK: Okay. Let's go on the record. Good evening. Today is November 18, 2021, and the current time is 6:59 p.m. The Missouri Public Service Commission has set aside this time for a local public hearing in Case No. ER-2021-0312, which is a general rate case captioned as: In the Matter of the Request of the Empire District Electric Company, d/b/a as Liberty for Authority to File Tariffs Increasing Rates for Electric Service Provided to its Customers in its Missouri Service Area.

Now you just had the question and answer portion of the local public hearing. The part we have right now is the formal part of the hearing, and this is to give the public an opportunity to comment directly to the Commission about Liberty's request to adjust its rates.

Now I'm going to ask that when you're not speaking or offering comments to the Commission, that you please mute yourself. It reduces noise levels and reduces feedback. If you are attending this hearing via WebEx, you can unmute yourself by clicking on the microphone when it's time. And if you're attending this hearing by telephone, you can unmute yourself by pressing \*6.

Now the Missouri Public Service Commission regulates the rates charged by investor-owned utilities in Missouri to ensure that those rates are just and reasonable. Commission also regulates the quality of service and the safety of operations of public utilities. Now the commissioner accomplishes this by hiring a staff of engineers, accountants, attorneys, financial analyst and other specialists in the area of utility regulations.

Commission is made up or composed of five commissioners, and those commissioners are appointed by the governor to a fixed term and confirmed by the Senate. Those commissioners are Chairman Ryan Silvey and Commissioner Scott Rupp, Maida Coleman, Jason Holsman, and Glen Kolkmeyer. Chairman Silvey, Commissioners Coleman and Kolkmeyer are at the hearing tonight to listen to your comments.

My name is John Clark, I'm the regulatory law judge that will preside over the hearing this evening. Now because this is an official hearing of the Missouri Public Service Commission, the statements and comments given tonight by public witnesses will be recorded by the court reporter and must be given under oath or affirmation.

At this time, I'd ask if Chairman Silvey would

like to make any welcoming remarks from the Commission. 1 2 COMMISSIONER SILVEY: Thank you, Judge. would like to thank everyone for their participation 3 4 tonight. These processes for rate cases are long and this is really the only opportunity we get to hear 5 6 directly from rate payers, so your input is appreciated. 7 We thank you for taking the time to participate. 8 Thank you, Judge for the ability to make 9 comments and I will speak up if I have any questions. Thank you. 10 11 JUDGE CLARK: Thank you, Chairman. And if any 12 commissioner has any questions after witnesses offer their comments, feel free to just go ahead and ask those 13 I'm not going to ask the Commission if they 14 questions. 15 have any questions. Likewise, if I have any questions 16 after witnesses have given comments to the Commission, 17 I'll ask those questions myself. 18 At this time I'm going to ask the parties to 19 enter their appearances for the record, starting with 20 the Empire District Electric Company doing business as 21 Liberty. 22 MS. CARTER: Good evening, this is Diana 23 Carter for the Empire District Electric Company. 24 JUDGE CLARK: Thank you, Ms. Carter. 2.5 For the Commission staff.

MS. MEYERS: Good evening. This is Jamie 1 2 Myers on behalf of Missouri Public Service Commission. My address is 200 Madison Street, Jefferson City, 3 Missouri, 65102. 4 JUDGE CLARK: Thank you Ms. Myers. 5 From the office of Public counsel. 6 7 MR. WILLIAMS: Nathan Williams, appearing on behalf of the Office of Public Counsel. 8 9 JUDGE CLARK: Thank you Mr. Williams. Now there are a number of intervenors who have 10 11 intervened in this case. Are there any intervenor's 12 counsel present at tonight's hearing? 13 Okay. I hear none. Now what I'm going to do first is I'm going to 14 15 call on the people that have preregistered to offer 16 comments, and after that, I'll allow an opportunity for 17 anybody else who would like to offer a comment to the 18 Commission. 19 Now if I call your name, please go ahead and 20 unmute yourself either by clicking your microphone if 21 you're on video or by pressing \*6. I'll then place you 22 under oath and ask you to state and spell your name, and 23 then you can make your comments to the Commission. 24 I am going to say that the commissioners will not be able to answer any of your questions today, and 25

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that's because they have to remain impartial until after all the evidence is presented at the evidentiary hearing. That's one of the reasons that they couldn't sit in on the question-and-answer portion of the hearing, and neither can I. Now the Commission has not made any decisions in this case, and the Commission is interested in hearing your comments, and we'll use them in conjunction with evidence the party present in making their decision.

I'm going to call the first witness who signed up for this hearing, and that is Richard Hatfield. Is Mr. Hatfield present this evening?

Mr. Hatfield. I will say Mr. Hatfield had signed up for last night's hearing and did not appear. He is the only name I have at this time signed up for this hearing, which was originally scheduled as kind of an overflow hearing.

Now is there anybody else who would like to offer testimony today? This is the last of three local public hearings on this rate case, and the Commission will have an opportunity to read the transcripts of comments from all three hearings and the submitted written comments. But this is really your only opportunity to tell the Commission with your own voice your thoughts about Liberty's request. So I'm going to

     Commission that I've never done -- never participated in
24
     a rate increase hearing thing. I'm currently a new --

     well, I'm a recently new homeowner, so I don't -- I
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talked to the Liberty Utilities Representative a little bit ago in the question-and-answer part of this and I just -- still having a hard time wrapping my head around why they -- why the rate increase is needed for recuperating cost.

I am a mechanic, so I kind of understand the maintenance cost of things and change. But I don't have a degree or anything fancy like that. I do kind of have the mindset of you don't spend money you don't have. So if they spent money that they can afford to spend, why do they have to recoup costs or increase costs without major improvement to the system, if that makes sense.

I mean those costs should already be covered by your -- you don't spend money before you have it, so I just don't understand the purpose of the rate increase, I guess is the simplest way to put that.

JUDGE CLARK: Okay. I follow what you're saying Mr. Keeling. Is there anything -- I understood the comment about not spending money you don't have. Is there anything in particular about this that you wanted to tell me about outside of that?

MR. KEELING: No, sir, I'm just -- this is kind of a learning experience for me, so I'm just trying to get my opinion out there, and opinions are like eyebrows, everybody's got two.

Okay. Well, thank you very 1 JUDGE CLARK: 2 much. Let me ask you a question: Have you had any 3 4 experience with Liberty's customer service? MR. KEELING: Very little. I manage most of 5 6 my bill paying I do is through there over-the-phone service, the automatic service. I've never really had a 7 8 huge issue with their service that they provide, I 9 just -- I mean I look at my bill and it's Greek to me, but I'm sure it makes sense to somebody. 10 11 JUDGE CLARK: Okay. You had an opportunity to 12 ask some of the parties about the proposed rate increase 13 tonight that involved certain questions. If you have --14 if you have questions about your individual bill, you 15 might consider contacting Empire's customer service 16 number and I would be happy to give that to you if you 17 would like. 18 Likewise, if you have questions about how 19 Liberty does its billing, you're welcome to call the 20 Public Service Commission consumer services, and I have 21 that number also if you would like. Would you be 22 interested in having either of those numbers? 23 MR. KEELING: Sure. I have Liberty's customer 24 service representative number on the bill. But let me grab a pen real quick and I will write down the consumer 2.5

As I said before, this is the last of three hearings so this will be the last opportunity for the public to offer comments in person and live. You're still welcome to offer written comments, and I'll tell you how to do that at the end of the hearing.
