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1 JUDGE DIPPELL: The Missouri Public Service 2 Commission has set this time for a local public hearing in Case 3 Number GR-2006-0387 in which Atmos Energy Corporation seeks to 4 implement a general rate increase. The Missouri Public Service 5 Commission regulates the rates charged by investor-owned 6 utilities in Missouri to insure that those rates are just and 7 reasonable. The Commission also regulates the quality of service and safety of the operations of investor-owned utilities. 8

9 My name is Nancy Dippell. I'm the regulatory law 10 judge assigned to this case. And it's my job is to facilitate 11 the hearing tonight. As you can tell, we're video conferencing 12 this hearing from our offices here in Jefferson City. I have 13 with me here in Jefferson City, Commissioner Lin Appling and 14 Commissioner Robert Clayton is there in Hannibal with you all.

We're also streaming this conference over our website 15 so it's -- the video is being streamed via the Internet. 16 The 17 Commission is made up of a total of five commissioners. The 18 commissioners are appointed by the governors to fixed terms and 19 employ a staff of engineers, accountants, attorneys, financial 20 analysts and other specialists in the field of utility 21 regulations. And we have some other staff members in Kirksville 22 this evening including Kevin Kelly from our information office 23 and

24 Mr. Tom Imhoff from our commission staff, who is also counsel 25 from the Office of Public Counsel, I believe there, and Mr. Marc

1 Posten.

2 And in addition, Atmos has several representatives 3 present. Mr. Fischer, would you like to introduce yourself and 4 your staff or your Atmos staff?

5 MR. POSTEN: Yes, Judge. My name is Jim Fischer. 6 I'm outside counsel for Atmos Energy Corporation. I also have 7 with me tonight the vice president of regulation, Pat Childers and Steve Green who is in charge of Missouri operations along 8 9 with a number of local people. To the extent that any of our 10 consumers have comments regarding billing problems or quality of service or anything that we can try to take care of here tonight, 11 12 we'd like to do that. Thanks you.

JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you. Also here in Jefferson City with me is staff counsel, Mr. Bob Berlin and from our staff, Lisa Cramer. I'd like to thank the high school, Hannibal high school for providing us with a facility and just state that the comments and statements being made here tonight are in no way associated with or not the opinion of the high school.

19 This is an official public hearing of the Missouri 20 Public Service Commission and statements and testimony of 21 witnesses will be recorded by a court reporter and will be taken 22 under oath or affirmation. In addition to this hearing, a trial 23 type evidentiary hearing may be held beginning on November 27th 24 at the commissions offices in Jefferson City. That hearing is a 25 public hearing where the company will have the burden of proving

1 that its proposal is just and reasonable.

The purpose of tonight's hearing is to receive comments from the public regarding the rate increase. The company will not present witnesses and will not answer questions while we're on the record, but as Mr. Fischer indicated, if there are billing or other issues, the company will be there and be happy to talk to people when they're not directly on the record.

8 And the commissioners are also not here to answer 9 questions tonight. But this is your opportunity to comment, and 10 your remarks will be made part of the official record of the 11 case. The commissioners who are not be able to be here this 12 evening will read the comments and take those into consideration 13 when making a decision.

14 If you wish to testify and you haven't already done 15 so, please see Mr. Kelly to put your name on the sign-up sheet. 16 Otherwise, I'll call the name of each witness that signed up. 17 And after everyone who's been called, if someone else decides the 18 would like to comment or someone comes in while we're going, then 19 I'll ask if anyone else would like to speak.

20 When your name is called, I'll ask you to please come 21 forward and speak into the microphone. Please spell your name 22 for the court reporter so she can put it in the record correctly. 23 I'll also ask a few preliminary questions just like your address 24 and if you're a customer of Atmos. There may then be some 25 questions from the commissioners after you've made your comments,

1 and there may also be some questions from the attorneys. I'll 2 give them an opportunity to ask. So I'll ask you to please stay 3 at the microphone until I excuse you.

4 Right now I'd like to ask the attorneys to go ahead
5 and make official entries of appearance. I'll begin with Mr. Bob
6 Berlin.

MR. BERLIN: Yes. I'm Bob Berlin. I'm appearing on
behalf of the staff of the Missouri Public Service Commission,
address, Post Office Box 360, Jefferson City, Missouri, 65012.
JUDGE DIPPELL: And Mr. Posten.

MR. POSTEN: Thank you, Judge. Marc Posten appearing
on behalf of the Office of Public Counsel, Jefferson City.

13 JUDGE DIPPELL: Mr. Fischer?

MR. FISHER: Yes. Appearing on behalf of the
company, James Mr. Fischer, law firm of Fischer & Dougherty, P.C.
101 Madison Street, Suite 400, Jefferson City, Missouri, 65101.
Thank you.

18 JUDGE DIPPELL: Commissioner Clayton, would you like 19 to make some openings remarks?

20 COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: Thank you, Judge. We only 21 have a few people here and so I'm not going to repeat some things 22 that I said earlier today. I want to welcome Ms. Burkhead and I 23 want to welcome Representative Bringer for being here tonight. 24 And I wanted to mention to you, Judge, that one person -- that at 25 least one person brought some written remarks that they asked be

1 made part of the record. I don't know if the parties have an objection to that. They were not able to stay. It was a 2 3 typewritten letter that I've given to the court reporter. I 4 thought perhaps we could mark it as an exhibit and then it could 5 be offered, and if any party has an objection to receiving that, 6 that can be so made. 7 But having said that, if you want to address that issue first, and then Representative Rachel Bringer is the first 8 9 witness. 10 MR. FISCHER: The company has no objection. JUDGE DIPPELL: Okay. I'll mark that as Exhibit 11 12 Number 1. And you can just give that to the court reporter. 13 COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: It is done. JUDGE DIPPELL: And it can be attached to the 14 transcript. And I heard that the company had no objection. 15 Would there be any objection from either of the other parties? 16 17 MR. POSTEN: No objection. JUDGE DIPPELL: Mr. Posten? 18 MR. CLAYTON: He said no, Judge. 19 20 JUDGE DIPPELL: Okay. Thank you. Did you have 21 anything further, Commissioner? 22 COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: No. And the first witness 23 would be Representative Bringer. I think that's all I'll say for 24 right now. JUDGE DIPPELL: All right then. Representative, 25

1 would you please come forward.

2 Thank you. Can I get you to raise your right hand so3 I can swear you in.

4 (Whereupon Representative Bringer was sworn by Judge5 Dippell.)

6 JUDGE DIPPELL: Could you state your name and spell 7 it and give us your address?

8 REPRESENTATIVE BRINGER: My name is Rachel Bringer,
9 R-a-c-h-e-l, B-r-i-n-g-e-r. I live at 504 South Main in Palmyra,
10 Missouri. The zip code is 63461.

JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you. Please go ahead with your comments.

13 REPRESENTATIVE BRINGER: Thank you very much. I just want to thank the Public Service Commission for having this 14 hearing here in Hannibal. I certainly welcome all of you to 15 16 Hannibal. I think it's wonderful that you're coming to this part 17 of the state to receive some comments. I would just like to make 18 a couple of comments that I've observed over the past few months 19 and some comments that have been given to me by some of my constituents. There certainly is a tremendous amount of 20 21 financial pressure that so many of my constituents are facing 22 right now, particularly those who are senior citizens and those who are disabled. 23

24 NECAC, which is our Northeast Community Action Group,25 that provides utility assistance, received twice as much

1 assistance funding as they had been the summer before and used it all. There were still needs remaining even with double the 2 3 assistance that they received. That doesn't even count the folks 4 who don't qualify for the assistance. The tax and income 5 guidelines are very, very difficult for many families to meet. 6 Yesterday, in fact, I received a letter from a senior citizen who 7 explained to me that she was having tremendous financial difficulty. And payments that she mentioned were her house 8 9 payments, her utilities and her groceries. We're struggling to 10 find some assistance for her. She wasn't even mentioning her medical costs or any other additional costs that she had, for 11 12 example, like a car. The three that she mentioned were her house 13 payment, her utilities and her groceries.

14 Just last week -- and I certainly appreciate the assistance of the Public Service Commission as well as Atmos 15 Energy with this particular issue. But there was an eighty-nine 16 17 year-old woman in Palmyra who was suffering such financial 18 distress that her utilities were shut off. And thankfully the 19 Public Service Commission and Atmos Energy was able to help that particular constituent. But obviously she suffered tremendous 20 21 stress and financial pressure, until she reached the point of 22 having her utilities shut off. I know that the Public Service 23 Commission has tremendous responsibility in balancing the needs of the many citizens and the businesses of the state. 24 25

And I'm confident that the Public Service Commission

1 will carefully consider this particular request and make sure 2 that all of northeast Missouri is treated fairly, particular those who are senior citizens and those who are disabled and 3 4 those who are living in low or lower middle income families. 5 Thank you very much for the opportunity to testify. 6 And again I'm very grateful that you came to Hannibal tonight. 7 JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you, Representative. Commissioner Clayton, did you have any questions that 8 9 you wanted to ask the Representative? 10 COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: I never pass up an opportunity to ask a politician questions when she's under oath, Judge, so 11 I'd be happy to ask a few questions. 12 13 First of all, Representative, thank you for coming 14 out tonight. I appreciate your interest in utilities issues and I appreciate the fact that you recognize how they affect everyone 15 in your district and everyone throughout the state. 16 17 What I wanted to mention to you is that the Public 18 Service Commission is limited in the role that it has. We 19 regulate utilities, we set rates, we can develop certain policies 20 at certain levels. But we look also to the state capitol to the 21 ideas that members of the House and members of the Senate may 22 have in addressing many of these issues. We would always look to 23 increase funding associated with the Utilicare program, lobbying our Washington colleagues for increased funding for lobbying, and 24 25 also dealing with the difficult issues associated with

weatherization. As you're aware, this community, like many
 others in the state, has older homes, older structures, that cost
 much more to heat during the cold winter months.

4 So I wanted to mention those as we approach the 5 winter heating season, that you keep those in your mind when you 6 go back to the legislature as I'm sure that you will, in January 7 of this year.

8 I did want to ask you a couple of questions. First, 9 I wanted to ask you if you were aware of -- how you became aware 10 of this public hearing, whether you read about in media reports 11 or whether it was through communication from our office. 12 MS. BRINGER: I received communication from your

MS. BRINGER: I received communication from your office. And that's when I first became aware of it. I subsequently, I believe, saw it an article in the paper maybe about it.

16 COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: You did see an article in the 17 Hannibal newspaper?

18 REPRESENTATIVE BRINGER: I thought that I did. The 19 first contact I had though was an e-mail from the Public Service 20 Commission.

21 COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: Okay. Are you aware of 22 whether the notice was published in the Palmyra Spectator? 23 REPRESENTATIVE BRINGER: I'm not sure. 24 COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: Not sure?

25 REPRESENTATIVE BRINGER: Since it was already on my

calendar I might have seen it and just overlooked it since I
 already had it down.

3 COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: Okay. The only other thing 4 that I wanted to mention to you -- and I think you mentioned a 5 number of things associated with the quality of service. If you 6 ever have any issues associated with any regulated 7 utility-related quality of service, billing issues or customer service, please let us know. And if you ever have any interest 8 9 in learning more about what we do over at our building in 10 Jefferson City, please do not hesitate to call. You have an open invitation. 11

12 REPRESENTATIVE BRINGER: Thank you very much. I 13 certainly appreciate your comments about the utilities assistance 14 and obviously I'll continue to support that and hope that the 15 legislature as a whole will continue to support increased 16 assistance and more sensible income guidelines for folks who 17 truly are in need and to relieve a lot of financial pressure 18 northeastern Missourians are facing right now.

19 JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you. Commissioner Appling, do 20 you have questions for the Representative?

21 COMMISSIONER APPLING: Judge, I have no questions 22 because I have total confidence that Commissioner Clayton will 23 nail down all of your thoughts and intents. So thank you very 24 much. Good to see you, Robert, and thank everybody for coming 25 up.

JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you. Are there any questions 1 from the attorneys? Mr. Berlin? 2 3 MR. BERLIN: No questions. 4 JUDGE DIPPELL: Mr. Posten? 5 MR. POSTEN: No questions. JUDGE DIPPELL: Mr. Fischer? 6 7 MR. FISCHER: No questions, Your Honor. 8 JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you, Representative. We 9 appreciate you coming out this evening. 10 REPRESENTATIVE FISCHER: Thank you very much for the opportunity. 11 12 JUDGE DIPPELL: You have someone else signed up, 13 Commissioner? COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: Yes. The next witness is 14 Ms. Zona Burkhead. 15 JUDGE DIPPELL: Ms. Burkhead, would you come forward, 16 17 please. Could I get you to raise your right hand? 18 (Whereupon Ms. Burkhead was sworn by Judge Dippell.) 19 20 JUDGE DIPPELL: Could you state your name and spell 21 it, please. 22 MS. BURKHEAD: Zona Burkhead, Z-o-n-a, 23 B-u-r-k-h-e-ad. 24 JUDGE DIPPELL: Could you give us your address? MS. BURKHEAD: 120 Harris Lane, Hannibal, Missouri. 25

1 JUDGE DIPPELL: And are you a customer of Atmos 2 Energy? 3 MS. BURKHEAD: Yes, I am. 4 JUDGE DIPPELL: Go ahead with your comments then. 5 Thank you. 6 MS. BURKHEAD: I did not come here prepared to speak 7 publically and -- but since I'm here, I would say, my reason -- I 8 will be -- I'm eighty-five years old, I have no family. I live 9 on Social Security. It seems like every time you turn around, it 10 seems to me there's an increase in the cost of living and this cost will amount to a lot to my income. And I don't feel like 11 that this is anything I can do about it. I only came here to 12 13 listen to see what was going on if possible and then I was 14 persuaded to speak publically. 15 Other than that, I really don't have anything to say other than just trying to find out if I can have anything to do 16 17 with lowering the cost of anything that comes to me in like a 18 bill. JUDGE DIPPELL: We appreciate your coming out to 19 20 participate this evening. Commissioner Clayton, do you have some 21 questions for Ms. Burkhead? 22 COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: I do. Thank you, 23 Ms. Burkhead. Thank you very much for coming out. It's good to 24 see you. I appreciate your willingness to come out. I wanted to 25 ask you, first of all, how you knew about -- how you found out

1 about this hearing tonight.

2 MS. BURKHEAD: I got a letter from the gas company that they were -- there was this town hall type of meeting. I 3 4 don't think that was the word they used. But I thought, well, 5 I'll come to this and see what's going on. 6 COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: Was that in your bill? Was 7 that like an insert? 8 MS. BURKHEAD: No, it was a separate letter. 9 COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: It was a separate letter. 10 Okay. MS. BURKHEAD: I have it in my purse. I don't have 11 12 the envelope. 13 COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: Do you remember how long ago you received the notice? 14 15 MS. BURKHEAD: A week, ten days ago. 16 COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: About a week or ten days ago. 17 Okay. MS. BURKHEAD: Uh-huh. 18 COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: But it was a time period where 19 you were able to prepare and plan your schedule to be here 20 21 tonight? 22 MS. BURKHEAD: Yes. I guess, yeah. 23 COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: I asked that because we look 24 around the room and you're the only one who showed up tonight. 25 MS. BURKHEAD: Well, I have a free evening so --

1 COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: I understand.

2 MS. BURKHEAD: I'm eighty-five years-old. I'm not 3 employed but I do charity work and volunteer every day somewhere. 4 COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: I understand. I'm sure you're 5 very busy. I wanted to ask you a few very brief questions. 6 First of all, I wanted to ask you if you are satisfied with the 7 quality of service that you receive from Atmos Gas, Atmos Energy. 8 Does the heat work when you turn it on? Or if it doesn't work, 9 do they fix it in a timely manner? 10 MS. BURKHEAD: I've never had any problem with the

10 service. The only thing that I would criticize is that they took 11 service. The only thing that I would criticize is that they took 12 the billing, the collecting office away from Hannibal and which 13 it makes me pay by mail. When I was paying downtown, why, I was 14 downtown every day on some kind of charity work and made no extra 15 trip if I made a payment then. Now then I have to put a stamp on 16 an envelope.

17 COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: They don't have that building 18 downtown, do they?

19 MS. BURKHEAD: Not that I know of.

20 COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: Who operates that building 21 now?

22 MS. BURKHEAD: I think the bank.

23 COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: I think the bank does. I
24 think you're exactly right.

25 MS. BURKHEAD: They have their trust department

1 there.

COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: I understand. I understand. 2 3 So the gas -- the heat works when you turn it on, generally 4 speaking. How about billing issues? Have you ever had a bill 5 that was not accurate or any problems with the bill that you 6 received? 7 MS. BURKHEAD: No. I wouldn't know how to find out 8 if it was not correct. I just -- I pay all of my bills when I 9 get them. 10 COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: I understand. MS. BURKHEAD: So --11 12 COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: It's never looked out of whack or out of proportion to what it's been in the past? 13 14 MS. BURKHEAD: I think I'm on the budget plan now so I don't have anything to complain about there. 15 16 COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: Have you ever had to call the 17 customer hotline? Have you ever had any issues where you had to call the company for assistance, and if you have, have you had 18 any problems or what kind of -- Have you been happy with it? 19 20 MS. BURKHEAD: I can't complain about it because I've 21 never called. But I've often thought that I would like to dig 22 but I'd have to call ahead of time, digging in the yard and work 23 in the yard. I'm not exactly sure where the line is. 24 COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: I see. 25 MS. BURKHEAD: So before I start digging, why I would

1 have to call them to get permission to dig.

2 COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: I understand. What, are you 3 digging a pool in your backyard yourself or something? 4 MS. BURKHEAD: Well, flowers. 5 COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: Flowers. 6 MS. BURKHEAD: And weeds. I haven't done that for a 7 couple of years. At my age I don't do all that. 8 COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: You're throwing that age 9 around. But it seems like you're pretty active, you've got a lot 10 of things going on. MS. BURKHEAD: Well, don't ask me tomorrow what I did 11 12 today. 13 COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: That's all right. We've got a 14 court reporter that's written it down for you. 15 Ms. Burkhead, thank you for coming out tonight. I appreciate you coming up and talking to us even when you didn't 16 17 plan on it. MS. BURKHEAD: I'll know better than to come next 18 19 time. 20 JUDGE DIPPELL: Commissioner Appling, do you have any 21 questions for Ms. Burkhead? 22 COMMISSIONER APPLING: No. I thank Mrs. Burkhead for 23 coming out. I have no further questions. Seemed like our good 24 friend, Commissioner Clayton, has asked all the questions. 25 MS. BURKHEAD: I'll correct you. I'm a Miss not a

1 Mrs.

2 COMMISSIONER APPLING: Okay. Thank you. 3 JUDGE DIPPELL: Mr. Berlin? 4 MR. BERLIN: No questions. 5 JUDGE DIPPELL: Mr. Posten? 6 MR. POSTEN: No questions. 7 JUDGE DIPPELL: Mr. Fischer? MR. FISCHER: Thank you for coming out. I have no 8 9 questions. JUDGE DIPPELL: Thank you so much for participating, 10 Ms. Burkhead. Even if you didn't plan to, we appreciate your 11 12 comments. 13 Commissioner, is there anyone else? COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: Is there anyone else here that 14 is interested in testifying? Going once, going twice. Judge, 15 I'm embarrassed to say that that's all we've got tonight. 16 JUDGE DIPPELL: Well, we must have planned this one 17 18 on top of some much more interesting activities in Hannibal. COMMISSIONER CLAYTON: Well, may I say that there are 19 a lot of parking spaces outside but they're all full tonight. 20 21 But we didn't have a problem parking so I'm not going to cause 22 you any grief. 23 JUDGE DIPPELL: Okay. Well, we do appreciate the two 24 commenters that we had and the commissioners that weren't here tonight will read these comments and the commission takes them 25

1 very seriously. Thank you all for participating. And this concludes the hearing. We can go off the record.
