PROCEEDINGS

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2 JUDGE STEARLEY: It's Wednesday, June 30, 3 2010. Missouri Public Service Commission is set this 4 time for a public hearing in File No. GR-2010-0192 in 5 which Atmos Energy Corporation seeks to implement a б general rate increase for its national gas service here in Missouri. My name is Harold Stearley. I will 7 8 be presiding over this hearing. With me tonight is the chairman of the commission, Robert Clayton. And 9 10 let me ask the chairman, would you have any introductory remarks. 11

CHAIRMAN CLAYTON: Thank you, Judge. First 12 13 of all, I apologize for making everyone wait. I had to drop some stuff off in the car. It is my pleasure 14 to be back in Kirksville. This is not my first time 15 16 visiting here. I've been here for I think all the 17 Atmos Public Hearings as well as some of the other utilities that have conducted hearings for -- that 18 serve this area. It's important for us to be out in 19 20 the communities and hear from customers on how they 21 are treated by the utilities that we regulate. We 22 need to learn about any problems that you have, any concerns that you have regarding the service, and also 23 24 you're more than welcome to chime in how the rates are 25 designed and what the rate impacts would be associated

1 with this case.

2 There are five commissioners on the 3 commission. We cannot all make it to every local 4 public hearing that we have, so we kind of spread out 5 all over the state, and we'll be visiting southeast б Missouri associate and western Missouri in this case later on -- or actually not later this month, but next 7 8 month, and a transcript will be made of this case and 9 will be available for all the commissioners to read. 10 We have tried to change our local public hearing process to make it more two-way, not just 11 one-sided where you come in and talk to us, but we 12 13 also want to have the ability to communicate with you, 14 provide information about who the public service commission is, what we do and why we do it, how we 15 16 interact with utilities so that you can have a better 17 understanding of the role that we play in how rates 18 are set. Hopefully the first part of the program 19 allowed for you to ask plenty of questions, get some 20 of your questions answered, and give you an idea of 21 what we do. In this part of the hearing, we're 22 certainly interested in hearing from you, what you have to say, and I look forward to the testimony that 23 24 comes up, so thank you for coming tonight. 25 JUDGE STEARLEY: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

We will begin by taking entries of appearance from 1 2 counsel, starting with Atmos Energy Corporation. 3 MR. DORITY: Thank you, Judge. Please let 4 the record reflect the appearance of Larry Dority with 5 the firm Fischer & Dority in Jefferson City on behalf б of Atmos Energy Corporation. I have submitted a 7 written entry of appearance with our specific 8 information. And Mr. Chairman, I would indicate that 9 there are representatives of Atmos here with us this 10 evening. They have been introduced and will be available to answer any questions that come up. 11 JUDGE STEARLEY: Thank you, Mr. Dority. 12 13 For the staff of the Missouri Public Service Commission. 14 15 MR. DEARMONT: Thank you very much, Judge. 16 Eric Dearmont on behalf of the staff of the Missouri 17 Public Service Commission, P.O. Box 360, Jefferson 18 City, Missouri 65102. JUDGE STEARLEY: Thank you, Mr. Dearmont. 19 20 And for the Office of the Public Counsel. 21 MR. POSTON: Thank you. Mark Poston 22 appearing for the Office of the Public Counsel and the 23 public. 24 JUDGE STEARLEY: Thank you, Mr. Poston. I 25 don't believe we have any representatives here for the

intervenors that we have in this case, so we will let
 the record reflect that the intervenors have not
 entered an appearance by counsel.

4 What I am going to do is I'm going to go 5 down our sign-up sheet and call names, and the person 6 being called to testify, if they'd please step forward 7 to the podium. We have a microphone up here, and I 8 believe Mr. Kelly's informed me it does have to be 9 held by the speaker to work properly. So we'll start 10 down our list. The first name we have, Dr. Edward 11 Norman. Good evening, Mr. Norman. 12 THE WITNESS: Good evening.

JUDGE STEARLEY: If you would please begin by stating and spelling your name for our court reporter so we can make our record accurate. MR. NORMAN: My name is Edward M. Norman, E-d-w-a-r-d, middle initial M, N-o-r-m-a-n.

18 JUDGE STEARLEY: All right, Mr. Norman. I 19 need to swear you in.

20 EDWARD M. NORMAN, being sworn, testified as follows:
21 JUDGE STEARLEY: Thank you very much and
22 you may proceed.

23 MR. NORMAN: First thing I'd like to do is 24 show you a May 20th Wall Street Journal. Inflation's 25 at a 44-year low, so that is just a prop basically.

1 I've never participated in anything of this sort. I 2 do have a few figures here for ya. I am an Ameren --3 or not Ameren, but an Atmos customer. I'm a 4 residential customer and a business customer. I went 5 through -- went online to DNR. Atmos is currently not б spending the money they've allocated for energy efficiency initiatives. There's a bunch of money left 7 8 in there. They don't make any kind of effort to do 9 that. The DNR made testimony to that. They -- they are requesting return of equity at 10.9 percent. 10 Their dividends last quarter, they paid 4.79 percent, 11 12 almost 4.8 percent. And in their earnings report 13 outlook, in this statement of their earning report, and I quote, "The leadership of Atmos Energy remains 14 15 focused on enhancing shareholder value by delivering 16 consistent earnings growth." Make no mention of 17 serving the customers. Their gross margins last year were 18.83 percent and a net profit margin of 18 4.19 percent. Sounds to me like they need a little 19 20 bit of their profitability. 21 Now, what I have here is I've went in and 22 figured up my rates and what they will be increased to. Currently I pay \$20.61. Their proposed rate is 23

25 53 percent increase, at \$137.40 a year. This is for

\$33.23, an increase of \$11.45 a month, which is a

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residential customers. But the actual increase with 1 2 the taxes and the fees that they tack on would be --3 \$25.31 is what we're paying now. It would go to 4 \$38.70, a 65 percent increase. The annual cost would 5 be \$303.72 and proposed would be \$464.40, a 65 percent б increase. That's just to supply the gas. That's 7 not -- the gas is a pass through. We've already 8 learned that from the people here from Atmos and 9 everybody that we're talking about.

10 My business, this is the bigger deal. My current rate is the same as my residential rate. I 11 told the gentleman from Atmos. I have the same gas 12 13 meter, same line, same everything. As a small 14 business, their proposed rate increase would be \$51.65, an increase of \$31.04 a month, 115 percent 15 16 increase. The annual rate -- the annual cost would go from \$247.32 to \$619.80, a \$372.48 a year increase. 17 18 The actual cost, with the taxes and the fees, would go from \$26.30 to \$60.78. It would go from \$315.60 a 19 20 year to \$729.36 a year, an increase of \$413.76, a 231 21 percent increase with the taxes and fees that they 22 tack on. My gas costs last year -- we're talking about efficiency. I bought a computer-controlled 23 24 thermostat, cut my gas use by half. My gas costs, 25 like I said, were \$304. For them to supply the gas

1 would cost me \$729, cost me over a thousand dollars a 2 year. My current -- with that, I don't have the 3 figures, but the fees would be 239 percent more than 4 the gas cost me. Now, that's an incredible increase. 5 And like I said, they're a well-run 6 company. These guys are looking out for themselves. 7 That's really about all I have to say. But, you know, 8 they send these mailings. It looks to me like they 9 need to cut their overhead a little bit instead of 10 trying to stick it to us. They're buying the gas from -- the analogy I'd like to give you is paying 11 12 Shell a fee to go and buy their gas from them cause 13 you can buy gas for the same price anywhere. That's 14 all I have to say. 15 JUDGE STEARLEY: Dr. Norman, if you'd 16 please remain at the podium for just a couple moments, 17 I'm going to check to see if the Chairman would like 18 to ask you some questions. Counsel, in your presence, 19 might like to ask you some questions, so Chairman 20 Clayton. 21 CHAIRMAN CLAYTON: Dr. Norman, I don't 22 think I have any questions. Thank you very much for 23 coming. 24 MR. DORITY: No questions. 25 JUDGE STEARLEY: Dr. Norman, have you had

1 any service or billing issues with the company? 2 MR. NORMAN: I have not had any issues 3 with the company. 4 JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. So your main 5 concerns are with the rate increases? б MR. NORMAN: Absolutely. That's why I'm 7 here tonight. I've never participated in anything of 8 this nature, but I'm here tonight because I think this is ridiculous. I mean, it's just such an incredible 9 10 increase. 11 JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. Well, thank you very much. We appreciate your testimony. 12 13 Next person who I have on my list who listed that they wanted to testify Elaine Schutter 14 15 (phonetic). 16 MS. SCHUTTER: Schutter. And I defer to 17 Dr. Norman -- or to Mr. Norman. I thought he did a 18 great job. Thank you very much. JUDGE STEARLEY: And the next person I have 19 20 is Karl Schneider. Would you please raise your right 21 hand? 22 KARL SCHNEIDER, being sworn, testified as follows: 23 JUDGE STEARLEY: Thank you. And if you 24 would please state and spell your name for our court 25 reporter.

Karl, K-a-r-l, Schneider, 1 Α. 2 S-c-h-n-e-i-d-e-r. 3 JUDGE STEARLEY: And you may proceed, sir. 4 MR. SCHNEIDER: All right. You want me to 5 hold this? б JUDGE STEARLEY: I think that the 7 microphone works better, but you don't have to. We 8 can certainly here you quite well. 9 MR. SCHNEIDER: I represent Truman State 10 University. We're a large customer. The rate that applies to us is classified as interruptible large 11 12 volume gas service. And the rate that I asked 13 questions about, it's quoted here, it's called the distribution commodity rate per CCF. The current rate 14 is \$.0689 per CCF, and the proposed rate is \$.1240515 16 per CCF. If that's correct, the way I'm reading it, 17 that's about an 80 percent increase. That would be a 18 significant impact to Truman State University. Our budget is tight. This past 12 months we have spent 19 20 about \$128,000 in this portion of our bill. And an 21 80 percent would result in about an additional hundred 22 thousand dollars expenses that we would have to pay on top of what we've been paying. 23

24 So I just want to express that we have a 25 concern about the impact on our -- our expenses. As

1 you know, we're -- our revenue is limited, and so 2 additional expenses have an impact on us, and it's a 3 serious concern that we have. We understand that 4 there are a lot of other considerations that are 5 considered for the rate increase, the company's costs б and their allowable rate of return and those kind of 7 things. But we want to express concern because this 8 is a significant financial impact to Truman State 9 University. That's all I wanted to say. 10 JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Chairman? 11 CHAIRMAN CLAYTON: Mr. Schneider, thank you very much for coming. I do have some questions. On 12 13 the part of the University, you all have a lot of 14 buildings. You got a lot of space, a lot of areas that need to be heated --15 16 MR. SCHNEIDER: Yes. 17 CHAIRMAN CLAYTON: -- during the winter 18 months. Does Truman State have a policy on 19 efficiency? Have you all taken any steps on, you 20 know, having a plan on, you know, making sure you're 21 being efficient in the energy you use? 22 MR. SCHNEIDER: We're in the process of making some changes, yes. We have -- this summer 23 24 we're installing a small, we call it a trim boiler, in 25 our central steam plants. That's more efficient. We

have two relatively large boilers, and in the fall and spring months, it's -- they're less efficient with lighter loads, and so we're installing a smaller boiler to run more efficiently during the lighter load period.

б CHAIRMAN CLAYTON: And have you all reached out to Atmos or received any assistance from Atmos in 7 8 trying to make efficiency upgrades or changes? 9 MR. SCHNEIDER: They -- you know, they send out an E-mail newsletter that has energy saving tips, 10 but I'm not aware of any financial incentives that 11 12 they have. And it's possible that they may have some 13 kind of consulting available possibly, but I'm not 14 really aware of that other than informational stuff 15 that they send out periodically.

16 CHAIRMAN CLAYTON: You may want to maybe 17 ask that question while you're with some of the 18 officials that are here. Obviously you have a lot of space that needs to covered, and there may be some 19 20 programs out there to give you assistance. But I 21 don't know for sure, I'm just suggesting it. 22 MR. SCHNEIDER: In addition to what I mentioned, we -- the central steam distribution system 23 24 that we have is not as efficient as having boilers in 25 each building, hot water boilers, and so we actually

1 are starting to install for -- when we do building 2 renovation, we're typically putting in a building 3 boiler. It's a hot water boiler, which is more 4 efficient generally than a steam boiler, and so that's 5 another thing that we're doing to improve efficiency. 6 CHAIRMAN CLAYTON: Thank you very much for 7 coming here. 8 JUDGE STEARLEY: Any questions from counsel 9 for this witness? 10 MR. DORITY: I don't have any questions, but Mr. Schneider, I believe you had some interaction 11 with some of the Atmos representatives, and as 12 13 Chairman Clayton pointed out, I would just encourage 14 you to visit with them regarding the energy efficiency and conservation programs that they have to see if 15 16 there's anything that they may do to be able to assist 17 you. 18 MR. SCHNEIDER: Thank you. JUDGE STEARLEY: All right. On my list I 19 20 do not have anyone else who marked that they wanted to 21 testify, but we're ready for any testimony. 22 MR. WESTERN: I signed the paper, maybe I signed in the wrong place. 23 24 JUDGE STEARLEY: That's guite all right. 25 If you'd like to come forward, sir. Are you Mr.

1 Western? 2 MR. WESTERN: Yes. 3 JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Western, if you'd 4 please state and spell your name for our court 5 reporter. б MR. WESTERN: My name is Samuel Western. 7 That's Sam Western. That's S-a-m W-e-s-t-e-r-n. 8 JUDGE STEARLEY: Would you please raise 9 your right hand? 10 SAMUEL WESTERN, being sworn, testified as follows: 11 JUDGE STEARLEY: Thank you very much. You 12 may proceed. 13 MR. WESTERN: Thank you. Thanks for being here and thanks for letting me speak. I don't have 14 all the figures like Dr. Norman had, and I commend him 15 16 for that. I think it's great. But as a small 17 businessman of 32 years and a residential customer of 18 Atmos, I want you to know I have no complaints with Atmos. As far as service, we had one issue my wife 19 20 spoke about at our home, but in my business we're 21 happy with Atmos. 22 I think, gentlemen, that my biggest 23 concern, and I think you all need to think about why 24 you're here, and I think it's quite clear that you had this meeting in the end of June instead of the middle 25

of January because I really think in the middle of January you'd have had this room packed out if you'd have had this when people are going to get hit with these higher gas bills. They're going to be in shock. The old women that are living alone and can't pay their bills and the people that are having a hard time.

8 I don't know whether you realize, we are in 9 the middle of a really bad recession, on the verge of 10 possibly a depression. So this is not about something that we're going -- that's going to make Atmos 11 12 customers and their -- excuse me -- Atmos shareholders 13 more money or show a better profit for the company to give to their shareholders. This is about survival in 14 today's world. And our -- I'm concerned about the 15 16 future business and small business and not only in 17 Missouri but across America. You know, where does it 18 end? What are we going to do if we keep asking for 19 rate increases? 20

And you know, the profits of a small company, I can't go to a commission and ask for a rate increase. You know, you got to think about what you're asking for here. I would ask you just to consider the small businessman and the small person out there that has trouble paying the bills, and

1 that's really all I have to say, and I appreciate your
2 time.

3 JUDGE STEARLEY: Mr. Chairman? 4 CHAIRMAN CLAYTON: Mr. Western, I don't 5 think I have any questions. I mean, your message 6 comes through loud and clear. I guess the one thing 7 that you mentioned that it was a clever intention on 8 our part having this during warmer months. Our 9 process is an 11-month process, and we don't control 10 when the companies ask. So when they make their ask, there's a schedule that's set out, and usually the 11 12 hearings occur in the third or fourth month. So they 13 may have the ability to do that, but I understand exactly what you're saying. Some of our hearings are 14 in the dead of winter and --15 16 MR. WESTERN: I understand. 17 CHAIRMAN CLAYTON: -- and we do get a lot 18 of people. MR. WESTERN: I was at the Ameren UE 19 20 meeting this winter here, and Ameren UE showed a 21 profit last year of \$250 million, and they still got

21 profit last year of \$250 million, and they still got 22 the rate increase. And so, you know, I think you need 23 to think about as a commission -- you're -- this is a 24 public service commission. This is not a utility

25 service commission. You know, you're here for the

1 public, and you need to remember who -- who's out 2 there. 3 CHAIRMAN CLAYTON: Sir, I do remember, and 4 I voted against that rate increase. 5 MR. WESTERN: Thank you. б CHAIRMAN CLAYTON: I thank you for coming 7 tonight. 8 MR. WESTERN: Thank you. 9 JUDGE STEARLEY: One moment before you sit 10 down, Mr. Western. Let me just ask, does counsel have any questions for this witness? 11 12 MR. DORITY: I don't have any questions. 13 MR. POSTON: No. 14 MR. DEARMONT: No. MR. WESTERN: I wanted to make one other 15 16 comment if I can. We at Westerns, we run a small 17 company that employs about 25 people, and we do look 18 at all conservative possibilities that we can do to conserve energy. And we just built a new building in 19 20 '08, and we built it with -- it's very efficient and 21 very -- there's actually no heat or cooling in the 22 building. And it's -- it is so insulated that it 23 controls its own -- with the heat from the motors that 24 run, we don't have to have any heat or cooling in that 25 building. We've saved a lot of money by doing that.

So we do think about things. We have instant gas,
 automatic water heaters that create water as needed,
 and we do a lot of things at Westerns. So we are
 concerned about that.

5 CHAIRMAN CLAYTON: Have you worked with the 6 company or taken advantage of any programs that the 7 company offers? Have you tried -- have you reached 8 out to them?

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9 MR. WESTERN: No.
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10 CHAIRMAN CLAYTON: There are a number of 11 programs that are out there. I don't know if for 12 business or not, but I know there are many programs on 13 the residential side. There may be on the commercial 14 side as well. I'd urge you to meet with them, see 15 whether those investments are eligible investments for 16 you.

17 MR. WESTERN: Thank you.

JUDGE STEARLEY: Thank you, Mr. Western.
Is there anyone else present who would like to provide
the commission with comments or testimony tonight?
I'm hearing none. Mr. Chairman, do you have any
closing remarks?
CHAIRMAN CLAYTON: I don't have any other

24 questions. There were a few more names on the list,
25 but it was kind of a sign-up sheet. We just want to

1 make sure we afford a full opportunity for anyone who 2 does want to testify. So before the judge gives it 3 the once, the twice, the game over, now's the time to 4 speak.

5 JUDGE STEARLEY: Okay. And I do want to 6 remind everyone that the commission does have several 7 avenues for comments, and I believe that information 8 is on our handouts tonight. But comments can be 9 E-mailed, they can be mailed to us, they can be phoned 10 in. You can actually go online to our electronic 11 filing system and post written comments directly in 12 the case itself. So the commission does want to hear 13 from the public, and anyone who did not testify here tonight, if you'd like to provide comments in a 14 different format, we'd certainly welcome it. Seeing 15 16 that no one else would like to offer testimony, the public hearing in File No. GR-2010-0192 is hereby 17 adjourned, and thank you all very much. 18 19 WHEREUPON the public hearing was concluded. 20 21 22 23 24
