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JUDGE HATCHER: Let's go on the record. First, I would like to ask everyone to please mute themselves unless they are speaking. That will cut down not only on the noise level, but prevent audio feedback.

Today is June 23rd, 2021. The Missouri Public Service Commission has set this time for a local public hearing in Case Number GR-2021-0108, which is captioned as In the Matter of the Spire Missouri Inc. d/b/a Spire's Request for Authority to Implement a General Rate Increase for Natural Service Provided in the Company's Missouri Service Areas. The Commission has scheduled this local public hearing to give members of the public a chance to comment about Spire's application.

The Missouri Public Service Commission regulates the rates charged by public utility companies in Missouri to ensure that those rates are just and reasonable. The Commission also the regulates the quality of service and safety of the operations. The Commission is made up of five members. The commissioners are appointed by the Governor and confirmed by the Senate. The commissioners employ a staff of engineers, accountants, attorneys, financial analysts, and other specialists in the field of utility regulation.

My name is Charles Hatcher and I am the regulatory law judge and I will be presiding over this hearing.

     So just out of curiosity, how many representatives are here

                      Spire has more than 1.7 million customers making
24
     it the fifth largest publicly traded natural gas company in the
2.5
     country according to their homepage. How many more than 1.7
```

million out of curiosity? I kind of got that answer.

Spire's homepage says Spire's committed to transforming a business and pursuing growth through growing organically, 2) investing in infrastructure, 3) advancing through innovation. But the homepage does not say anything about pursuing growth through rate increases. Spire's proposed rate increase would be an average increase of 328 or 5.6% per month which translates to approximately 596,000 per month or about \$67 billion per year over and above what they currently take in, just for reference. So what it's 66.912 million to be exact based on average rate requested.

I always thought apparently mistakenly that infrastructure improvements were done for the profits gained from the company's income where you would not necessarily make as much profit in that particular year, but you have to make an infrastructure investment. But it appears, you, Spire that is, make infrastructure improvements at the expense of the customers. Again, to maximize stock returns for stockholders. Publicly traded companies are more concerned with turning a profit for stockholders than any concern for the customers in this current environment where too many people are currently struggling to make ends meet.

By the way, Spire owns 81.66% of the company stock. So since only the remaining 18.34% is publicly held it appears that the main concern for maximizing stock returns is

for Spire, not the public shareholders. I was not able to find out what percentage of these stock executives hold, but based on some of my personal investments, I would guess the percentage is higher and therefore a larger incentive to maximize returns for the executives of upper management more than anything else.

Don't get me wrong, I don't have anything

against people making money but when people are making large amounts of profits at the expense of their customers because they control a monopoly, I have a big concern about that type of business model. How many of these Spire representatives hold stock in Spire? How many wish to share much stock they hold or stand to profit on if this rate increas request is approved?

This is kind of derogatory, but are you currently paying dividends? I ask because my stocks that used to pay dividends have suspended them due to the economic crisis of the last 16 months. I actually know the answer to that question. According to TD Ameritrade, Spire is still paying an annual dividend yield of 260 or 3.44% while Spire is now asking this Commission to approve asking their customers to pay additional approximate amount of 328 or 5.6 per month -- percent per month, excuse me. Based on 2-- 60% dividend for the period March 1st, 2021 through April 14th, 2021, the quarterly dividend rate was 06/10 of '21 and payment date is 07/02 of '21.

Spire's website, their homepage, they have a growing dividend for 18 consecutive years, 18 years. An

attractive yield of 3.6%, which they proudly put on their
homepage. That's offensive. Spire's homepage also says that in
the last five years you have quadrupled your enterprise value.

Now more than 6 billion. Not many businesses can make such a
claim.

It also says Spire has a robust five-year plan with a 7 to 8% annual ratebase growth of 3 billion. If this is accurate, then Spire is definitely making a substantial amount of money and profits apparently not being used for infrastructure.

This is an impressive annual rate and base growth while you are asking for 5.6% monthly rate increase from customers. It appears that in today's financial environment while most of the people in this country are struggling financially, you are requesting a rate increase at the most awkward moment in time and customers have to pay because they cannot go get a better rate at a competitor because there are no competitors to utilities like the gas, electric and water monopolies.

I was wondering how often the Missouri Public Service Commission denies these types of rate increases for utility companies because I don't know that. I did some research. I couldn't find any. Do the representatives from Spire or the Missouri Public Service Commission honestly believe that Spire deserves or actually needs a rate increase at this

                      We have always been able to provide assistance
     to those who low income, elderly, disabled, as well as a lot of

     other pandemic-related programs that are currently available
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right now. Utilities are a critical component of keeping people stably housed and this is particular true for many of the folks on the call today as well as who could from various forms of services and support offered through Spire as well as the United Way.

One of the key elements of United Way is the work we have done with Spire on a daily basis. The care and attention Spire pays to help get ratepayers in need of assistance the help they require has been a huge part of what we have been able to accomplish over the last year. A particular help is the non-profit built by Spire. It makes it very easy to work with customers' account as well as make financial pledges for assistance. Their customer support team is also extremely knowledgeable, responsive and helpful to reach out about customers' accounts.

Again, as somebody that personally provided utility assistant, that is a make or break deal in terms of expediency of assistance to prevent disconnection of services or restoration of services. The support of Spire through ratepayers, the United Way has been more essential to helping our committee all across the state and we are very grateful for their partnership and I'm happy to have this opportunity to testify about Spire's role in the committee. Again, please call 2-1-1 or look at the Spire website if you need assistance. And I thank you for the time.

JUDGE HATCHER: I apologize. It's -- we've been 1 2 having a couple of issues this afternoon. I'm sure that's on my end. Mr. Duvinsky, please go ahead and give us your comments. 3 THE WITNESS: Okay. The mail out documents that 5 were sent out, they are using a 5.6% increase per month and that 6 is based on \$3.28 for roughly 63 berms of fuel used. And that 7 equates to roughly a nickel a berm. And in the question and 8 answer period I had asked whether or not this was going to -- if 9 \$3.28 was going to replace the current, on my bill, \$2.78 or if 10 it would be added. And the comment that was received was that 11 the current \$2.78 was going to be rolled into the general rate 12 and therefore the ISRS charge would reset back to zero and we 13 would be starting out at \$3.28. 14 I have objections to that because that \$2.78 15 will never go away. It's not part of the permanent rates. And 16 it should not be added to the current rate. So their average is 17 63 berms. I average -- I've done the math and -- on that and I 18 average 91 berms. So for me, that is going to be an increase of 19 \$4.73, which exceeds their estimate of \$3.28. That comes out to 20 \$56.79 annually where currently at 278 per month I'm paying 21 \$33.36. So if you take the new rate if you have the two 22 together \$7.51 for me, that is \$90.15 annual estimated cost. 23 you do that math, that's 170% increase. So I just think that is 24 excessive and I want to know where --25 They've been collecting this ISRS back since

2005 that I have. It started out at $0.20 and then it has

     significantly -- it is all over the map. Some years it's $0.70;
     some years it is $.86. The highest was $3.94 back in 2017.

                      So I just kind of feel this is a -- just a money
 5
     grab and like some of the other comments, they are just trying
 6
     to recover their $1.6 billion but they've had 17 years to do

     this since 2005. So where is all that ISRS for the last 17

     years? Where has been done -- what's been done with that -- all
