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PROCEEDINGS 1 2 JUDGE PRIDGIN: All right. Good 3 morning. We are on the record. 4 This is the initial arbitration meeting 5 in Case Number TO-2009-0037, Petition of Charter б Fiberlink-Missouri, LLC, for arbitration of 7 interconnection rates, terms, conditions and related 8 arrangements with CenturyTel of Missouri, LLC, pursuant to 47 U.S.C., section 252 (B). 9 10 I am Ron Pridgin. I am a regulatory law 11 judge with the Commission, and I have been appointed 12 arbitrator. I also have with me an arbitration 13 advisory staff, and if I could get them to introduce themselves, please. 14 MS. DIETRICH: Natelle Dietrich. 15 MR. VAN ESCHEN: John Van Eschen. 16 MR. COUCH: Myron Couch. 17 JUDGE PRIDGIN: And thank you very much. 18 And I would like to get oral entries of appearance 19 20 from counsel, beginning with Charter Fiberlink-21 Missouri, LLC. 22 MR. COMLEY: Thank you, Judge. Let the 23 record reflect the entry of appearance of Mark W. 24 Comley, Newman, Comley & Ruth, PC, 601 Monroe Street, Suite 301, Jefferson City, Missouri 65101, on behalf 25

1 of Charter Fiberlink of Missouri, LLC.

2 And also let me introduce to you those 3 who are on the phone today, Mr. K.C. Halm of Davis, 4 Wright, Tremaine, LLP, 1919 Pennsylvania Avenue N.W., 5 Suite 200, Washington, D.C., 20006, and also Clifford б K. Williams of Charter Fiberlink Missouri LLC, 12405 Powers Court Drive, St. Louis, Missouri 63131, 7 all of us on behalf of Charter Fiberlink of Missouri. 8 JUDGE PRIDGIN: Mr. Comley, thank you. 9 Mr. Halm, Mr. Williams, welcome. 10 Any counsel entering appearance on 11 behalf of CenturyTel of Missouri, LLC, please? 12 13 MR. DORITY: Thank you, Judge. 14 Appearing on behalf of CenturyTel Missouri, LLC, Larry W. Dority, Fischer & Dority, PC, 101 Madison, 15 16 Suite 400, Jefferson City, Missouri 65101. 17 Also participating by phone this morning 18 are Paul M. Schudel and Thomas J. Moorman with the firm of Woods & Aitken, LLP. Their address, your 19 20 Honor, is for Mr. -- for Mr. Schudel is 301 South 21 13th Street, Suite 500, Lincoln, Nebraska 68508, and 22 for Mr. Moorman, his office address is 2154 Wisconsin Avenue, N.W., Suite 200, Washington, D.C. 20007. 23 24 And I would note, Judge, that we had 25 filed a petition for leave to enter appearance and be

admitted pro hoc vice on behalf of Mr. Schudel, James 1 2 Overcash and Mr. Moorman, and we would ask leave for 3 them to appear and participate this morning. 4 JUDGE PRIDGIN: All right, Mr. Dorothy, 5 thank you. Mr. Comley or Mr. Halm, Mr. Williams, any objection to Mr. Dority's request? 6 7 MR. COMLEY: None. 8 JUDGE PRIDGIN: All right. Hearing 9 none, Mr. Dority, thank you. Mr. Schudel, 10 Mr. Moorman, thank you and welcome. And Mr. Comley 11 or Mr. Halm, Mr. Williams, you don't have to answer 12 now if you're not ready, but do you have any 13 objection to the petition for leave to enter 14 appearance Mr. Schudel, Mr. Overcast or Mr. Moorman? 15 MR. COMLEY: I don't think we have any objections, Judge. K.C., Mr. Halm, Mr. Williams, do 16 17 you have any objection to their appearance? 18 MR. HALM: No. MR. OVERCASH: No, your Honor. 19 20 MR. WILLIAMS: No. 21 JUDGE PRIDGIN: All right. Very good. 22 I will confirm it in writing, but I will grant that 23 petition for leave to enter appearance on behalf of 24 Mr. Schudel, Mr. Overcash and Mr. Moorman. 25 MR. DORITY: Thank you, Judge.

1 JUDGE PRIDGIN: Thank you, Mr. Dority. 2 Is there anything that counsel needs to bring to my 3 attention before I kind of give you my viewpoint on a 4 procedural schedule? 5 MR. DORITY: Judge, if I may? б JUDGE PRIDGIN: Certainly. 7 MR. DORITY: We've had some brief 8 discussions just this morning, Mr. Comley and I, 9 regarding a proposed schedule. As your Honor is well 10 aware, the Commission's Chapter 36 rules provides a 11 very compressed time frame for processing these 12 arbitrations, and I think a review of the 13 Commission's records would certainly indicate that extension of the time frames is probably certainly 14 the norm as opposed to the exception in looking at 15 16 some recent arbitration cases before this body. 17 We have circulated to Charter through their counsel a proposal that would actually extend 18 the current time frame for 90 days, which, again, I 19 20 would respectfully submit has become sort of the norm 21 here. 22 There is some recent cases that would 23 adopt such a proposal. I have those available and I 24 would be happy to provide them to you if you'd like. 25 But the Commission is certainly on record in support

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of extending a schedule and has cited FCC precedent 1 2 for that.

3 It would be my thought, your Honor, that 4 if the parties could have some time this morning to 5 review the proposal and try to have a meeting of the б minds as to a joint proposal that we might be able to offer, that that would be a good use of our time. 7 8 And to the extent that we need some 9 direction or counsel from you or your advisory staff 10 in that regard, perhaps we could ask to reassemble and do that. But my thought would be perhaps if we 11 could go off the record and have an opportunity to 12 13 visit about the proposal that we circulated. 14 JUDGE PRIDGIN: Okay. Mr. Comley, any 15 comments? MR. COMLEY: Oh, I agree with 16 17 Mr. Dority, and I think that it would serve the parties well if we did have the occasion this morning 18 19 to look into the proposal that CenturyTel has 20 supplied to us. 21 Again, we had a few moments to look at 22 it. We're going to probably need some time to look at it a little bit more before we engage in any 23

lengthy discussions with CenturyTel, but I think 25 Mr. Dority has outlined a very good proposal for this

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1 morning. 2 JUDGE PRIDGIN: Thank you, counsel. And 3 I don't mean to exclude other counsel. Any comments 4 from any other counsel? 5 MR. OVERCASH: No comments, your Honor. б JUDGE PRIDGIN: All right. All right. Thank you. So as I understand it, the parties would 7 8 wish to go off the record in just a moment to discuss 9 a possible procedural schedule that you might be able 10 to agree on? 11 MR. COMLEY: Yes, your Honor. 12 JUDGE PRIDGIN: All right. That's 13 certainly fine with me. I'm a little -- personally, I'm perfectly fine with what you're suggesting and I 14 have no problem extending the 90 days. 15 16 I don't know if it's a jurisdictional 17 question, but I think we have quite competent counsel that would not lead me down the path of something 18 19 that's not legally accurate. 20 And I've read a case or two or glanced 21 at it from the FCC that talks about a 90-day 22 extension, so I'm not unfamiliar with it. 23 MR. DORITY: Judge, if I may? 24 JUDGE PRIDGIN: Certainly. 25 MR. DORITY: I would be happy -- and I

have copies here. I think this may be the most 1 2 recent decision of the Commission that I'll be happy 3 to hand out and provide a copy to counsel and to you, 4 Judge. 5 And what I'm handing out is the order б adopting procedural schedule that was issued 7 August 30, 2007, in the MCI, Metro, Verizon, Access 8 and Embarg arbitration. 9 JUDGE PRIDGIN: I actually looked at that this morning. 10 11 MR. DORITY: Okay. Then over on page 12 2 --13 JUDGE PRIDGIN: Yes, sir. MR. DORITY: -- is the area that I would 14 direct your attention. 15 16 JUDGE PRIDGIN: In that FCC order, yes, 17 sir. MR. DORITY: And it does talk in terms 18 of the FCC order and I think it was the AutoTel 19 20 decision. And again, I would submit that this 21 appears to be sort of the norm now as opposed to the 22 exception. 23 JUDGE PRIDGIN: And that's perfectly 24 fine. Like I said, I just kind of stumbled across this this morning, and I'm certainly willing to 25

consider that and in all likelihood grant that 90 1 2 days. I think it would serve the parties well and 3 certainly wouldn't hurt me at all either. 4 So let me -- before I -- before we go 5 off the record, I believe, Ms. Dietrich, you handed б me a note, and I have a copy of the note and I have 7 two copies of the note, neither of which I can find, 8 but you wanted the parties to submit when they submit their final -- their final offers, is it, that they 9 10 could do that via Word copy so that we can work from 11 it more easily --12 MS. DIETRICH: On the matrix. 13 JUDGE PRIDGIN: -- on your matrix? Anyone have any problems with that? 14 15 MR. DORITY: I don't believe so. 16 JUDGE PRIDGIN: Okay. 17 MR. DORITY: Paul, do you have any issue with that? 18 MR. SCHUDEL: No. In fact, that's 19 20 anticipated and is a part of our schedule, your 21 Honor. I do have one question whenever it would be 22 appropriate. 23 JUDGE PRIDGIN: Okay. Mr. Comley, is 24 submitting via Word copy going to work for you and 25 your client?

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1 MR. COMLEY: Mr. Halm, Mr. Williams, 2 does that sound acceptable? 3 MR. HALM: Yes, that would be fine. 4 JUDGE PRIDGIN: Okay. Thank you. And 5 I'm sorry, someone have a question? б MR. SCHUDEL: Yes, your Honor. This is Paul Schudel. Just a quick question to perhaps 7 8 provide the parties with some guidance as we go off 9 line. Is there any time that you would like to direct us that your Honor and your -- and/or your 10 staff are unavailable for hearing during let's say 11 12 the months of October and November? I only ask that 13 because obviously the hearing becomes sort of a driver of a lot of the other milestones that we'll be 14 considering. 15 JUDGE PRIDGIN: Yes, sir. And I'll let 16 17 my staff answer. I had not anticipated this and I was looking at earlier dates. The fun part may be 18 finding a hearing room. I am available and I expect, 19 20 if nothing else, we could use this smaller hearing 21 room that we're in now. We may be a little 22 compressed, but I expect we could find -- we could 23 find days for the hearing. 24 I don't have the calendar in front of

25 me, but I think we'd be able to accommodate everyone.

And I don't know if anybody on my staff has any 1 2 conflicts, looking at October and November? 3 MS. DIETRICH: NARUC is in November, but 4 I don't know the dates off the top of my head. 5 JUDGE PRIDGIN: Okay. I bet Mr. Dority 6 knows. 7 MR. DORITY: I think I do. 8 JUDGE PRIDGIN: Middle of November, 17th, 18th, somewhere in there? 9 MR. DORITY: I have it November 16th 10 11 through the 19th. JUDGE PRIDGIN: Okay. Well, I was 12 13 right. 14 MS. DIETRICH: But that would be the Commissioners, so I would be before that, I think. 15 16 MR. DORITY: So you're probably looking at the 13th, 14th time frame? 17 MS. DIETRICH: Probably 14th, 15th, 18 19 through the dates you said. MR. DORITY: Okay. Friday the 14th 20 21 through the 19th might be a problem for Ms. Dietrich 22 so... 23 MR. SCHUDEL: That was November? 24 MR. DORITY: Yes. JUDGE PRIDGIN: So November 14th through 25

the 19th would be a problem. Otherwise, I would be 1 2 available and we would likely be able to find a 3 hearing room. 4 MR. DORITY: Okay. 5 MR. SCHUDEL: Thank you, Judge. That's 6 helpful. 7 JUDGE PRIDGIN: You're quite welcome. 8 Does counsel need anything else from me before we go off the record? 9 10 MR. DORITY: Just in terms of reporting back to you, Judge. I realize the court reporter 11 12 will probably be leaving, and I don't know what 13 you're comfortable with in terms of our getting back with you to let you know where we are. 14 15 JUDGE PRIDGIN: If -- if the parties --16 obviously if the parties reach an agreement, I would 17 obviously appreciate a pleading that everybody signs. 18 If you cannot agree, I would also expect pleadings saying we talked, we couldn't agree, we need a --19 20 here are our alternative schedules, would you please 21 pick ours? 22 But just something -- because the court 23 reporter won't be here and I don't know how much time 24 you need, so just something so I know. And the 25 sooner, the better.

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MR. DORITY: Sure. 1 2 JUDGE PRIDGIN: Would the parties 3 anticipate at least knowing one way or the other 4 sometime today? 5 MR. DORITY: I believe so, Judge. б JUDGE PRIDGIN: Okay. All right. And obviously you know where my office is if you just 7 8 want to say, hey, we have an agreement, or no, we 9 don't, just so I can be on the lookout for whatever pleadings may be coming in. 10 11 MR. DORITY: That sounds fine. 12 JUDGE PRIDGIN: Okay. 13 MR. DORITY: Paul, did you have any other questions at this point? 14 15 MR. SCHUDEL: No, I don't, thank you. 16 JUDGE PRIDGIN: Is there anything further from counsel before we go off the record? 17 18 (NO RESPONSE.) JUDGE PRIDGIN: Okay. Anything from the 19 20 advisory staff? 21 (NO RESPONSE.) JUDGE PRIDGIN: Okay. And I'm sorry, do 22 you want or need the advisory staff here or would you 23 24 rather them leave the room? I certainly don't want 25 to -- you're certainly welcome to talk in private.

1 I'm just not sure what you want or need.

2 MR. COMLEY: My thoughts would be if we 3 absolutely would need them, we could call them on the 4 phone. 5 JUDGE PRIDGIN: That's fine, that's 6 certainly fine. I just didn't want to excuse them 7 and then you say wait a minute, we need to -- we want 8 to visit with them. And same with me. I mean, I'm up on the ninth floor. You can find me. 9 10 MR. COMLEY: I don't think there would be any harm in discharging them. 11 12 JUDGE PRIDGIN: Very good. 13 MR. DORITY: Judge, one other thing. And I do apologize, but for the record, I did want to 14 introduce Becky Kilpatrick who is manager of 15 16 Government Relations for CenturyTel who is with me 17 this morning and will be participating in the 18 discussions. I apologize. JUDGE PRIDGIN: That's quite all right. 19 20 Ms. Kilpatrick, welcome. 21 MS. KILPATRICK: Thank you, Judge. 22 JUDGE PRIDGIN: You're quite welcome. 23 Anything further? 24 (NO RESPONSE.) JUDGE PRIDGIN: All right. If there's 25

nothing further, if you'd please stay on the line, we'll go off the record, and then we'll let you visit. All right. Thanks very much. We're off the record. б (WHEREUPON, the recorded portion of the arbitration hearing was concluded.)
