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1	PROCEEDINGS
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3	JUDGE JONES: This is the local public
4	hearing for Missouri-American Water Company's request
5	for a rate increase.
6	My name is Kennard Jones. I'm the presiding
7	judge over this matter, and I wish to welcome all of
8	you this evening.
9	At this time, we will have appearances for
10	the parties in the case, beginning with
11	Missouri-American Water.
12	MR. ENGLAND: Thank you, Judge. Let the
13	record reflect the appearance of Trip England, an
14	attorney for Missouri-American Water Company.
15	JUDGE JONES: And for the Office of the
16	Public Counsel?
17	MS. BAKER: Thank you, your Honor. Christina
18	Baker, PO Box 2230, Jefferson City, Missouri 65102,
19	appearing on behalf of the Office of the Public Counsel
20	and the ratepayers.
21	JUDGE JONES: Thank you, Ms. Baker.
22	And for the Staff and the Commission?
23	SHELLEY BRUEGGEMAN: Your Honor, Shelley

Brueggeman, representing the Staff of the Commission.

Our address is 200 Madison Street, Jefferson City,

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- 1 Missouri 65102.
- JUDGE JONES: Are there any other parties
- 3 present who wish to enter their appearance?
- 4 (No audible response.)
- Okay. Hearing none, we'll move on.
- 6 As you ratepayers are probably aware, this is
- 7 an opportunity for you to voice your opinions about
- 8 Missouri-American and the probable request for a rate
- 9 increase.
- 10 Those of you who have signed up to testify
- 11 will be called in the order that you have signed up
- 12 there at the podium. You will be sworn in, and then
- 13 you will be directed to give your testimony.
- 14 Thereafter, commissioners or perhaps a party
- 15 may have questions for you, and I ask that you remain
- 16 at the podium until you are excused by myself.
- 17 Mr. Kelly?
- MR. KELLY: Yes, sir.
- 19 JUDGE JONES: Did you have a list of persons
- who have signed up?
- 21 MR. KELLY: Yes, I do. The first person --
- JUDGE JONES: Please call the first person.
- MR. KELLY: David Sizemore.
- 24 JUDGE JONES: Mr. Sizemore, will you please
- 25 raise your right hand, sir?

- 1 Do you solemnly affirm that the testimony you
- 2 are about to give is the truth?
- 3 MR. SIZEMORE: Yes, I do.
- 4 JUDGE JONES: I didn't hear you, sir.
- 5 MR. SIZEMORE: Yes, I do.
- 6 JUDGE JONES: Okay. And could you please
- 7 spell your last name for the court reporter?
- 8 MR. SIZEMORE: S-I-Z-E-M-O-R-E.
- 9 JUDGE JONES: Thank you, Mr. Sizemore. You
- 10 may go ahead with your testimony.
- 11 MR. SIZEMORE: Your Honor, I'm City
- 12 Councilman for the City of Galena, Kansas, and I was
- 13 asked to represent the Council and the community.
- 14 And last year we received a 60 percent
- 15 increase. This year we're looking at another
- 16 26.4 percent. That's a little less than 90 percent.
- 17 Last year the City of Galena actually absorbed half of
- 18 the 60 percent.
- 19 We are a low income community. We have a lot
- 20 of elderly on social security. The people just can't
- 21 absorb that kind of a rate increase all at one time.
- 22 Right now we're having some budget problems because we
- 23 did absorb that.
- 24 Anyway, let me -- dollar amount, if I go by
- 25 what some of the questions that was answered there on

- 1 dollar amount, 26.4 relates to about nine -- between
- 2 nine and \$10 a month. That 60 percent was related to
- 3 about 18. So you're looking at \$27 a month.
- 4 Social security gave people a three percent
- 5 increase, approximately, and we have a lot of people on
- 6 social security. So it is really causing a hardship on
- 7 us.
- 8 That's all.
- 9 JUDGE JONES: Thank you, Mr. Sizemore.
- 10 Commissioner Murray, do you have any
- 11 questions?
- 12 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: No, I don't.
- 13 Thank you, Mr. Sizemore, for your testimony.
- 14 JUDGE JONES: Any questions from any other
- 15 parties?
- 16 (No audible response.)
- 17 Seeing none, thank you, Mr. Sizemore. You
- 18 may be excused. We appreciate you coming.
- 19 MR. SIZEMORE: Thank you very much.
- MR. KELLY: Jane Daniels.
- JUDGE JONES: Ms. Daniels, will you please
- 22 approach the podium, and will you please raise your
- 23 right hand?
- 24 Do you solemnly affirm that the testimony you
- 25 are about to give is the truth?

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1 MS. DANIELS: I do.
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- 2 JUDGE JONES: And is your name spelled as it
- 3 sounds?
- 4 THE WITNESS: I'm sorry. I didn't understand
- 5 you.
- 6 JUDGE JONES: Is your last named spelled
- 7 D-A-N-I-E-L-S?
- 8 THE WITNESS: Yes, sir, it is.
- 9 JUDGE JONES: Okay. Thank you.
- 10 You may proceed with your testimony.
- 11 MS. DANIELS: I am vehemently opposed to this
- 12 increase, your Honor. We have suffered through one.
- 13 And now we're talking about a 28 percent increase for
- 14 the average citizen and 42 percent increase for the
- 15 commute -- or I'm sorry, commercial. And we all know
- 16 that that's going to be passed on to us, because
- 17 they're going to -- the businesses we use are going to
- 18 pass that on to the consumer too.
- 19 And we have a large -- like Galena, we have a
- 20 large retirement community here. It only goes so far.
- 21 So I hope in one time historically that this whole rate
- 22 increase is denied. Thank you.
- JUDGE JONES: Thank you, Ms. Daniels.
- 24 Any questions, Commissioner Murray?
- MS. DANIELS: No questions from me.

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1 JUDGE JONES: Any questions from any other
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- 2 parties?
- 3 (No audible response.)
- 4 Thank you, Ms. Daniels. You may be seated.
- 5 MS. DANIELS: Thank you.
- 6 MR. KELLY: Russ Leinmiller.
- 7 JUDGE JONES: If you would, sir, would you
- 8 please raise your right hand?
- 9 Do you solemnly affirm that the testimony
- 10 that you are about to give is the truth?
- 11 MR. LEINMILLER: Yes, sir.
- 12 JUDGE JONES: Okay. Maybe move a little
- 13 closer to the mike for your testimony.
- 14 Will you please spell -- you can put your
- 15 hand down now.
- 16 Will you please spell your last name for the
- 17 court reporter?
- 18 MR. LEINMILLER: It is L-E-I-N-M-I-L-L-E-R.
- 19 Leinmiller.
- 20 JUDGE JONES: Thank you, sir. You may
- 21 proceed with your testimony.
- MR. LEINMILLER: I oppose the rate increase
- 23 myself. I'm 48 years old. I got hurt on the job, so
- 24 I'm on disability right now, and I can't make it
- 25 myself.

- 1 So I just, you know, oppose it myself too,
- 2 you know. I mean, they had a rate increase, you know,
- 3 like the people said, a year ago, you know. We got a
- 4 2.3 percent cost of living raise. The government last
- 5 year or last August said, you know, it was five percent
- 6 for the cost of living. So it exceeded their
- 7 expectations of, you know, cost of living. So it hurts
- 8 me, you know.
- 9 And that's it. Thank you.
- 10 JUDGE JONES: Thank you, sir.
- 11 Commissioner Murray, do you have any
- 12 questions?
- 13 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: No questions. Thank
- 14 you.
- 15 JUDGE JONES: Any questions from any other
- 16 parties?
- 17 (No audible response.)
- 18 Seeing none, thank you, Mr. Leinmiller. You
- 19 may seated.
- MR. LEINMILLER: Thank you.
- 21 JUDGE JONES: I appreciate your testimony.
- MR. KELLY: Maurice Filson.
- JUDGE JONES: Good evening, sir. Will you
- 24 please raise your right hand?
- Do you solemnly affirm that the testimony you

- 1 are about to give is the truth?
- 2 MR. FILSON: Sure do.
- 3 JUDGE JONES: Thank you. Will you please
- 4 spell your last name for the court reporter?
- 5 MR. FILSON: F-I-L-S-O-N.
- 6 JUDGE JONES: Thank you, Mr. Filson. You may
- 7 proceed.
- 8 MR. FILSON: Well, we have heard a lot of
- 9 profit and loss tonight, which I will take it for
- 10 granted that they're giving us the straight dope.
- 11 And after hearing all of this about finances,
- 12 I'm going to present you with a problem that is in my
- 13 neighborhood, if it's -- if it ain't oil, it must be
- 14 water. And it belongs to somebody, and somebody's
- 15 paying for it. It's in the alley between New Hampshire
- 16 and Vermont on 8th Street in Joplin. Now, if there's a
- 17 leak there -- I'm just an old simple country boy --
- 18 there's leaks other places. Let's fix 'em.
- 19 I have told the Missouri Water trucks about
- 20 this on three occasions and it is still running, and
- 21 somebody is paying for that or losing for it.
- I even sent a note in with one of my bills.
- 23 Guess what? Nothing.
- 24 Somebody needs to straighten up a profit and
- 25 loss sheet somehow.

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1 That's all I have.
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- JUDGE JONES: Thank you, Mr. Filson.
- 3 Commissioner Murray, do you have questions?
- 4 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: Just briefly. How long
- 5 have you been aware of that leak?
- 6 MR. FILSON: Ever since we lived here in
- 7 Joplin. Since '04. It's eating away at the asphalt.
- 8 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: Have you talked to the
- 9 staff of the Commission about that?
- 10 MR. FILSON: I've talked to just about
- 11 everybody I know how to get ahold of. I talked with a
- 12 woman tonight that drives an American Water truck
- 13 personally.
- 14 They were down doing repair work on
- 15 8th Street within a half a block of this a little over
- 16 a year ago, and I told them. And again, it -- you
- 17 could go out there and get you a drink of water,
- 18 because it's running.
- 19 Everybody knows about it. They should,
- 20 because I've told 'em.
- 21 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: Thank you. I'm sure
- 22 that our staff will be following up with you on that.
- MR. FILSON: I hope so. I'm not deaf and
- 24 dumb.
- 25 JUDGE JONES: Any questions from either of

- 1 the parties?
- 2 (No audible response.)
- 3 Hearing none, thank you, Mr. Filson. You may
- 4 be seated.
- 5 MR. FILSON: Thank you.
- 6 MR. KELLY: Alan Scherle is next.
- 7 Darby Marcum will be after Mr. Scherle.
- JUDGE JONES: Mr. Scherle, will you please
- 9 raise your right hand?
- 10 Do you solemnly affirm that the testimony you
- 11 are about to give is the truth?
- MR. SCHERLE: It is.
- JUDGE JONES: Thank you, sir.
- 14 Will you please spell your last name for the
- 15 court reporter.
- MR. SCHERLE: It's S-C-H-E-R-L-E.
- 17 JUDGE JONES: Thank you. You may proceed
- 18 with your testimony, Mr. Scherle.
- 19 MR. SCHERLE: Okay. I've got several
- 20 questions related with water problems. Two years ago
- 21 they trespassed across my property for 165 feet of
- 22 pipeline. They tore my driveway up. I got estimates
- of \$500. It's been two years. They have not fixed the
- 24 thing. Hear a lot about profit, but a thousand dollars
- 25 to fix their stuff.

- 1 My wife's got hurt and her medical bills have
- 2 not been paid for two years. Her truck's been damaged,
- 3 \$1,500. They have not paid none of that.
- 4 I've had an attorney work on it for a year
- 5 and a half. He's about ready to file a lawsuit until
- 6 two months ago, he passed away. I went to a new
- 7 attorney to take over my case.
- 8 Missouri-American is not a very good water
- 9 company.
- 10 JUDGE JONES: Okay. Commissioner Murray, do
- 11 you have any questions?
- 12 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: Yes.
- 13 Have you spoken with anyone from the Public
- 14 Service Commission?
- 15 MR. SCHERLE: I brought this to their
- 16 attention last year, to the Public Service. I mailed
- 17 them the cost. I never heard nothing back about it.
- 18 I'll send it certified this time, pictures of them
- 19 tearing it up.
- 20 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: All right. And you've
- 21 never filed a complaint?
- MR. SCHERLE: Yeah. I complained last year
- 23 about it. And the water company never come out and
- 24 fixed nothing. They haven't paid no bills.
- 25 I've talked to three attorneys, and they said

1 that the water company is liable for all the damage out

- 2 there.
- 3 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: All right. Thank you.
- 4 JUDGE JONES: Are there any questions from
- 5 any of the parties?
- 6 (No audible response.)
- 7 Hearing none, thank you, Mr. Scherle. You
- 8 may be seated.
- 9 We will hear from Darby Marcum.
- 10 MR. KELLY: Right. Next after Ms. Marcum
- 11 will be Lynette Higginbotham.
- MS. MARCUM: Yes.
- JUDGE JONES: Ms. Marcum, will you please
- 14 raise your right hand?
- Do you solemnly affirm that the testimony you
- 16 are about to give is true?
- MS. MARCUM: Yes.
- 18 JUDGE JONES: And you may need to speak up
- 19 just a little bit, ma'am. We can barely hear you.
- MS. MARCUM: Yes.
- 21 JUDGE JONES: Will you please spell your last
- 22 name for the court reporter?
- MS. MARCUM: M-A-R-C-U-M.
- 24 JUDGE JONES: Thank you, Ms. Marcum. You may
- 25 proceed with your testimony.

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1 MS. MARCUM: You know, I've heard so many
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- 2 percentages of increases bantered around here this
- 3 evening, I'm a little confused. So I'm going to go
- 4 with the percentages that were quoted to me by the
- 5 Public Service Commission when I talked to them late
- 6 last week.
- 7 And it is my hope that Joplin city leaders
- 8 and our local state of representatives are represented
- 9 here tonight as consumers and to hear the people.
- 10 I understand from the Public Service
- 11 Commission, the last increase of 68 percent for
- 12 Missouri-American Water was for replacement and repair
- 13 of infrastructure.
- 14 The proposed increase of 38 percent plus is
- 15 for the operation of that new infrastructure. I agree
- 16 with the gentleman who has since left, repair and
- 17 replacement sales are a budgetary item; something that
- 18 should have been addressed through the years as needed.
- 19 I just want to know what happened. What
- 20 inspecting entity failed to notice the infrastructure?
- 21 When Missouri-American Water purchased the water
- 22 operation from the last company, I am sure they
- 23 inspected the infrastructure.
- 24 The purchase of an interest is largely based
- on projections of future profits, which often means a

- 1 long-term investment, or at least it did before the
- 2 21st century.
- 3 My question is, "Is Missouri-American Water
- 4 willing to make a long-term commitment to the people,
- 5 the consumer?"
- 6 We have seen the results of hasty and
- 7 short-term investments. Just this week we saw Lehman
- 8 Brothers and Merrill Lynch hit the wall. Prior to
- 9 that, Barons, FannieMae, and FreddyMac.
- 10 There will come a day when the infrastructure
- 11 will be paid for and that 68 percent increase will
- 12 linger as revenue and profit.
- I begrudge no man an honest profit. It is a
- 14 good thing. What troubles me is profiteering and the
- 15 burden other people, who once were valued consumers,
- and now it appears that we have become cash cows to
- 17 companies, corporations, the government to -- and
- 18 actually, used to perpetuate cash flow.
- 19 Enron defines for us the harm corporations
- 20 can do to the people. In their arrogance, chief
- 21 executives of Enron recorded their own conversations in
- 22 house. One in particular caught my attention, and I
- 23 quote, as they laughingly spoke, "Those people keep
- 24 begging us not to raise rates but never ask to reduce
- 25 them ." The assumption being, raise the price the

- 1 people will acclimate. There comes a point in which
- 2 the people cannot adjust, the point at which cost
- 3 exceeds the ability to pay.
- 4 If this last proposed increase is approved by
- 5 the Public Service Commission, the consumer will
- 6 realize over 115 percent increase in less than
- 7 two years.
- 8 The people are faced with many increases.
- 9 Gas for cars. Electricity. Gas to heat our homes.
- 10 Food to feed us. Clothes to cover us. And on and on
- 11 and on. Homeownership is being threatened every day by
- 12 people's ability to survive from month to month. The
- 13 stock market is suffering the pains of correction.
- 14 I am asking Missouri-American Water to do the
- 15 same. I am asking the Public Service Commission not to
- 16 allow the increase and, further, to decrease the latest
- 17 68 percent increase.
- 18 And in addition to that, encourage the PSC to
- 19 consider Empire District, Missouri Gas Energy, that
- 20 they receive the same consideration for their last
- 21 increases.
- 22 It is also my understanding that there --
- 23 first I was told it was a matter of passing an act of
- 24 legislation where a fee is given each month by each
- 25 resident in order to cover any problem, maintenance

- 1 wise or unexpected cost. A city official told me it
- 2 would take an act of legislation.
- 3 A Public Service Commission representative
- 4 told me that all it would have to do to be is to avoid
- 5 the radical increase in pricing for what is a natural
- 6 resource to this community.
- 7 Thank you. (Applause.)
- 8 JUDGE JONES: Commissioner Murray, do you
- 9 have any questions?
- 10 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: No questions.
- 11 JUDGE JONES: Thank you. You can go ahead
- 12 and be seated. There aren't any questions for you.
- 13 Thank you.
- MS. MARCUM: Thank you.
- JUDGE JONES: Now for Lynette Higginbotham.
- MR. KELLY: Next will be Tammy Walker.
- 17 JUDGE JONES: Will you please raise your
- 18 right hand?
- 19 Do you solemnly affirm that the testimony you
- 20 are about to give is the truth?
- MS. HIGGINBOTHAM: I do.
- JUDGE JONES: Thank you. Will you please
- 23 spell your last name for the court reporter?
- MS. HIGGINBOTHAM: Yes.
- 25 H-I-G-G-I-N-B-O-T-H-A-M.

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JUDGE JONES: Thank you, ma'am.
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- 2 You may proceed with your testimony.
- 3 MS. HIGGINBOTHAM: Thank you. I am a
- 4 controller with Cliffstar Corporation here in Joplin,
- 5 Missouri. We are a private label fruit manufacturer
- 6 and we feel many of the pains as everyone else in this
- 7 room does.
- 8 Basically, last year we did incur an increase
- 9 of 64 percent. That to us was over \$55,000. And this
- 10 year I thought it was going to be a 32 percent
- 11 increase, and again that's over \$45,000 for us in a
- 12 year's time.
- 13 This evening I found out instead of a
- 14 32 percent increase for businesses, its going to be
- 15 40 percent.
- 16 So basically, I would just like them to look
- 17 at this and to realize that we are a large volume user,
- 18 but we're really not a large, large business. So to
- 19 increase our costs over 100,000 in one year's time
- 20 makes it difficult for the manufacturing companies in
- 21 the local area. Because unlike some of the big
- 22 corporations who do just past their costs on to
- 23 consumers, we don't actually have that luxury. We do
- 24 our best not to do that.
- 25 And of course, we're selling not directly to

- 1 the consumer but, you know, to different other
- 2 companies who, you know, purchase the juice and sell it
- 3 on into the consumer.
- 4 So I would just like to state that a lot of
- 5 times, you know, on the brochures, it seems to be still
- 6 a significant amount, but when you're looking at
- 7 businesses, it's a much larger amount.
- 8 That's all.
- 9 JUDGE JONES: Thank you, Mrs. Higginbotham.
- 10 Commissioner Murray, do you have questions?
- 11 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: No questions. Thank
- 12 you.
- 13 JUDGE JONES: Any questions from any of the
- 14 parties?
- 15 (No audible response.)
- 16 Seeing none, Ms. Higginbotham, you may step
- 17 down. Thank you.
- 18 MR. KELLY: Next is Tammy Walker, and then
- 19 Edward Giles, please.
- JUDGE JONES: Ms. Walker, will you please
- 21 raise your right hand?
- 22 Do you solemnly affirm that the testimony you
- 23 are about to give is the truth?
- MS. WALKER: Yes.
- 25 JUDGE JONES: Thank you. You may proceed

- 1 with your testimony.
- 2 MS. WALKER: My name is Tammy Walker, and I'm
- 3 the Director for Community Development at Economic
- 4 Security Corporation, and I'm here representing them.
- 5 We are a community action agency that serves
- 6 Barton, Newton, Jasper, and McDonald counties. We have
- 7 programs that serve low income people and people who
- 8 are homeless.
- 9 We are aware that Missouri-American Water has
- 10 a program called H20 Help, which assists low income
- 11 people with their water bill. We have made referrals
- 12 to this program, and it has been very successful.
- 13 It is understandable that periodic
- 14 improvements must be made to infrastructure, but the
- 15 proposed increase is not affordable for the people with
- 16 low incomes. With the price of everything going up --
- 17 and everybody's stated that tonight -- the families and
- 18 individuals that our agency serves cannot afford this
- 19 increase.
- That's all I have.
- JUDGE JONES: Thank you, Ms. Walker.
- 22 Commissioner Murray, do you have any
- 23 questions?
- 24 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: No questions. Thank
- 25 you.

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1 JUDGE JONES: Any questions from any other
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- 2 parties?
- 3 (No audible response.)
- 4 Seeing none, you may step down. Thank you
- 5 for your testimony.
- 6 Next we'll hear from Edward Giles.
- 7 MR. KELLY: After Mr. Giles will be Novella
- 8 Webster, please.
- 9 JUDGE JONES: Mr. Giles, will you please
- 10 raise your right hand?
- 11 Do you solemnly affirm that the testimony you
- 12 are about to give is the truth?
- MR. GILES: I do.
- 14 JUDGE JONES: Thank you, sir. Will you
- 15 please spell your last name for the court reporter?
- MR. GILES: G-I-L-E-S.
- 17 JUDGE JONES: Thank you. You may proceed
- 18 with your testimony.
- 19 MR. GILES: I'm a resident of Joplin, and I'm
- 20 a senior citizen on fixed income. The two requirements
- 21 you have to testify for is service and about the rate
- 22 increase.
- The service I have received has been
- 24 excellent. The only complaint I have is that they have
- 25 trouble reading my meter every year. But I understand

1 that's to be corrected because they put electronic

- 2 reader on it.
- 3 The second thing I have would be the rate
- 4 increase. We have received rate increases, as you have
- 5 heard, from several different areas. And I don't know
- 6 how far the spiral will go, but it's certainly going
- 7 up. And we can only stand so much.
- 8 I thank you.
- 9 JUDGE JONES: Thank you, Mr. Giles.
- 10 Commissioner Murray, do you have any
- 11 questions?
- 12 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: No.
- 13 Thank you, Mr. Giles.
- 14 JUDGE JONES: Questions from any other
- 15 parties?
- 16 (No audible response.)
- 17 Seeing none, Mr. Kelly, will you call the
- 18 next person?
- 19 MR. KELLY: Novella Webster. And then the
- 20 next person on the list will be John T. McDonald.
- JUDGE JONES: Ms. Webster, will you please
- 22 raise your right hand?
- Do you solemnly affirm that the testimony you
- 24 are about to give is the truth?
- MS. WEBSTER: I do.

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JUDGE JONES: Thank you, ma'am. And you may
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- 2 proceed with your testimony.
- 3 MS. WEBSTER: I'm rather perplexed about this
- 4 average that's given for Joplin residents, \$26 and 20
- 5 cents a month.
- 6 My -- I'm a single person. I seldom use my
- 7 dishwasher. I take short showers. I don't even water
- 8 my lawn. I have a rain barrel. And yet my -- my -- on
- 9 average, my income -- or my payment is \$45.93 a month.
- Now, even if you take out eight dollars for
- 11 wastewater, that's still \$37.93. I'm assuming that
- 12 this 26.20 is based on a family of four. So I'm rather
- 13 perplexed by that.
- 14 Second, I know that other people are -- that
- 15 are single are tending to get about this same rate. So
- 16 I just wonder how that's being decided on.
- 17 Second, I have a friend of the family that
- 18 went to India a year ago -- about a year ago in
- 19 February, and they noted to me that when they were
- 20 gone, it showed that they were using the same amount of
- 21 water as when they were there, even though they were in
- 22 India. So again I wonder, you know, how is this being
- 23 decided as to how much water is actually being used?
- I've recently move. The neighborhood that I
- 25 was living in before, I regularly took walks with my

- 1 dogs, and I have to say I regularly saw water leaks.
- 2 I -- like Ms. Webster was talking about, I
- 3 did call them in when I saw them, and I have to say
- 4 that generally they did seem to come out, you know, to
- 5 do something about it, but there were several that
- 6 seemed to happen over and over again, same area.
- 7 I'm being told by a friend that lives near
- 8 where I do now that there is one of those recurrent
- 9 ones at 25th and Indiana. I can't speak to that
- 10 directly myself because I haven't seen it, but she says
- 11 that she's been seeing it for years and it's never been
- 12 addressed.
- I think that it's unfair that we would have
- 14 almost 100 percent increase in a year's time, and now
- 15 we're being told in the question and answer period that
- 16 we can actually expect another increase next year
- 17 because they still have lots of work to do, and we have
- 18 nothing to say about how much that's going to be.
- 19 They haven't done the work yet, you know, so
- 20 it seems to me that we should be able to in some way
- 21 negotiate with them to say, "Well, do this much work so
- 22 that we can have this much increase, " as opposed to
- 23 them being able to do as much as they want.
- I am reminded of the accounting practices of
- 25 Halliburton, that they were given the opportunity to

- 1 charge as much as they wanted, you know, whatever they
- 2 spent, then they got a certain percentage beyond that,
- 3 which encouraged them to go ahead and spend as much as
- 4 they wanted because then they would get more money.
- I have no idea whether that's the type of
- 6 accounting practices that are going on here, but
- 7 certainly we know that corporations are not beyond that
- 8 kind of accounting practices and that it can be said
- 9 over only, you know, getting five percent profit, when
- 10 actually, you know, they are -- you know, they're not
- 11 included this or that or this other thing, so that the
- 12 CEO can indeed be getting a hundred thousand plus or a
- 13 million plus a year.
- 14 So it seems to me that if we know that there
- 15 are expenses are going to be coming down the line, then
- 16 that needs to be budgeted. Like the gentleman in the
- 17 question and answer session was talking about, you
- 18 know, everybody else gets to budget.
- 19 Certainly with industry, that if the woman
- 20 with the fruit company knows that it's going to be a
- 21 32 percent or a 40 percent increase, they can budget
- 22 for that, as opposed to suddenly they have another
- 23 eight percent that hasn't been budgeted for.
- 24 So that's my comments.
- JUDGE JONES: Thank you, Ms. Webster.

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1 Commissioner Murray, do you have any
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- 2 questions?
- 3 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: I have no questions.
- 4 JUDGE JONES: Questions from any other
- 5 parties?
- 6 (No audible response.)
- 7 Thank you, Ms. Webster. You may be excused.
- 8 (Applause.)
- 9 JUDGE JONES: Now we'll hear from John
- 10 McDonald.
- 11 MR. KELLY: Bryan Stevenson would be next,
- 12 please.
- 13 JUDGE JONES: Raise your right hand.
- MR. McDONALD: Somebody is trying to run me
- 15 out of here.
- 16 JUDGE JONES: Do you solemnly affirm to tell
- 17 the truth?
- MR. McDONALD: Can you hear me?
- 19 JUDGE JONES: Yeah. I can now. Thank you.
- 20 MR. McDONALD: Okay. Yes, I do swear.
- 21 JUDGE JONES: Will you please spell your last
- 22 name for the court reporter?
- MR. McDONALD: M-c-D-O-N-A-L-D.
- 24 JUDGE JONES: You may proceed with your
- 25 testimony.

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1 MR. McDONALD: Actually, I have questions as
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- 2 well as the testimony. Are questions allowed?
- JUDGE JONES: No.
- 4 MR. McDONALD: Then I'll make comments.
- I don't know what you have paid for your
- 6 technical service here tonight, so I'm going to ask you
- 7 if you paid in advance.
- 8 You don't have to answer. It's rhetorical.
- 9 Because if you paid in advance, you got stiffed.
- 10 Whoever is running the technical outfit on
- 11 this needs to go back to school -- and I don't mean
- 12 MSSU -- because they're just piercing our ears
- 13 throughout this whole thing. It is almost as if
- 14 they're in the pay of the company to drive people away.
- 15 Do you read me? Now, that's a question, and it's
- 16 rhetorical too.
- 17 Anyway, the point is, yeah, I live alone, and
- 18 my bills have gone too high because, unlike the
- 19 previous person, I don't have a dishwasher. I use
- 20 paper plates. I use disposable forks that I buy in the
- 21 store. So I don't even have to wash much.
- I haven't had to use any water to water the
- 23 lawn the last year because of the rains we've had. I
- 24 don't have a rain barrel, but I'm thinking about
- 25 getting one because maybe I could get more water there

- 1 that I can use cheaper, because my bills have gone from
- 2 37, 38, \$39 total.
- Now, this is including the trash pickup and
- 4 whatever the city is charging. But my total bill has
- 5 gone up to 41, 42, \$43, along in through there. I live
- 6 alone. And I'm not using that much water. I know I'm
- 7 not because I've lived in Joplin most of my life.
- The company, by the way, is not Missouri.
- 9 It's not American. It's a German company. Right?
- 10 Right. Where's our money going? Right.
- I'm almost through.
- 12 I think -- oh, I've got to say one more
- 13 thing. I wrote in and complained a couple of years
- 14 ago. And I got a letter back, and they said that they
- 15 had checked and I didn't have any leaks. No leaks were
- 16 found on our property.
- 17 So my question is, "Why is my bill so high?"
- 18 I'm one person living alone. Why is my bill total,
- 19 I'll admit, including all charges, 38, 39, 40, 41, \$42?
- 20 And they want to tack on another 20, 30, \$40? Come on.
- 21 Come on, people. Where's the money going? Where's the
- 22 money going?
- 23 Something was said in a movie once, "show me
- 24 the money." That's a good point, isn't it? Show me
- 25 the money. Where is it going?

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I don't believe what they tell me. I can't,
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- 2 because they have not addressed my problem. Okay?
- 3 That's it.
- 4 JUDGE JONES: Thank you.
- 5 Commissioner Murray, do you have any
- 6 questions?
- 7 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: No questions.
- 8 JUDGE JONES: Any questions from any other
- 9 parties?
- 10 (No audible response.)
- 11 Mr. McDonald, you may be excused. Thank you
- 12 for your testimony.
- Bryan Stevenson?
- MR. KELLY: Sky Carr is next, please.
- 15 JUDGE JONES: Mr. Stevenson, will you please
- 16 raise your right hand?
- 17 Do you solemnly affirm that the testimony you
- 18 are about to give is the truth?
- 19 MR. STEVENSON: I do.
- JUDGE JONES: Thank you, sir. Will you
- 21 please spell last name for the court reporter.
- MR. STEVENSON: S-T-E-V-E-N-S-O-N.
- JUDGE JONES: Thank you. Go ahead,
- 24 Mr. Stevenson.
- 25 MR. STEVENSON: Thank you.

- 1 My name is Bryan Stevenson. I am a local
- 2 attorney. My wife and I own a large number of rental
- 3 properties. I'm also elected state representative of
- 4 128th legislative district. I have had my phone
- 5 ringing off the wall from concerns by my constituents
- 6 who are very, very concerned about the increases.
- 7 I have had a large number of my constituents
- 8 tell me that they will not be flushing the toilet after
- 9 each time they use it, that they will instead use the
- 10 toilet four, five, six, and seven times before they
- 11 flush it. I am very concerned about the health hazards
- 12 that this will ensue in our legislative district.
- Now, in spite of the triple average rainfall
- 14 that we have received this year, in the next few years
- 15 southwest Missouri is going to be facing a major water
- 16 shortage as our population continues to grow.
- Now, I am well aware that the German company
- 18 operated as Missouri-American Water provides a valuable
- 19 need to the people of the state of Missouri. However,
- 20 there must be some balance to what they provide.
- Now, I myself have received -- have had
- 22 extreme difficulty getting response from
- 23 Missouri-American Water for service issues -- for
- 24 tenant water related service issues. I am very blessed
- 25 because I happen to know the regional manager by being

1 a member of Rotary Club. So I knew how to get ahold of

- 2 her.
- 3 However, I am well aware that there are many,
- 4 many of my constituents, as you have heard testimony
- 5 here tonight, who have a very, very serious problem
- 6 having their service issues addressed.
- 7 It is imperative as the population of
- 8 southwest Missouri continues to grow that someone
- 9 mandate that Missouri-American Water have a customer
- 10 service center in every town that has a population of
- 11 over 40,000 people. (Applause.)
- 12 If you have utility issues with Empire
- 13 District Electric Company, you can walk into their
- 14 office. If you have issues with Missouri Gas Energy,
- 15 you can walk into their office. If you have issues
- 16 with service with Missouri-American Water, your only
- 17 recourse is to call a 1-800 number. It is a problem.
- 18 It is a very severe problem, and it needs to be
- 19 addressed.
- 20 In addition to that, the very large increase
- 21 that we have seen over the last year is sufficient at
- 22 this time to address the needs, and I strongly urge the
- 23 commission not to support the proposed increase.
- 24 (Applause.)
- 25 JUDGE JONES: Commissioner Murray, any

- 1 questions?
- 2 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: I have no questions,
- 3 but thank you, Representative Stevenson. I'm sure your
- 4 constituents appreciate you being here this morning.
- JUDGE JONES: Any other parties?
- 6 (No audible response.)
- 7 Hearing none, Mr. Stevenson, you may be
- 8 seated. Thank you.
- 9 MR. STEVENSON: Thank you.
- 10 JUDGE JONES: I will hear from Sky Carr.
- 11 MR. KELLY: And next will be Kathy Wilson.
- 12 JUDGE JONES: Mr. Carr, will you please raise
- 13 your right hand?
- 14 Do you solemnly affirm that the testimony you
- 15 are about to give is the truth?
- MR. CARR: Yes.
- 17 JUDGE JONES: And will you please spell your
- 18 last name for the court reporter? And then you may
- 19 proceed.
- 20 MR. CARR: C-A-R-R.
- 21 My concern is kind of a trend I've been
- 22 seeing. It's been going on for probably since 2000.
- 23 We've had what I call like an operating cost or an
- 24 infrastructure cost in this country, rates going up.
- 25 Basically, the cost of doing business, like cost of

- 1 utilities. I heard on the news one day that the cost
- 2 of building a road went up two, 300 percent. I was
- 3 like, "what?" And I couldn't believe that.
- 4 And these higher prices that are basically
- 5 building costs, working costs to run a day-to-day
- 6 business that have gone way up are going to cause a lot
- 7 of trouble to this country.
- 8 And I was going to come in here tonight and
- 9 say something about -- you know, about how you raise a
- 10 water price and that's going to affect a business.
- 11 Somewhere in town, somebody uses water to wash
- 12 something or whatever, and you just had somebody show
- 13 up tonight, that fruit business, comes in that uses a
- 14 lot of water.
- 15 And these rates are going to cripple what
- 16 this country is really supposed to be all about. It's
- 17 supposed to be all about creativity. It's supposed to
- 18 be all about us working together. It's supposed to be
- 19 about a vibrant economy. We should have the best
- 20 economy in the world.
- 21 And I was kind of watching the news, you
- 22 know, and every year they come back with this inflation
- 23 rate that, you know, still stays the same. It's about
- 24 five or six percent. Whatever our inflation rate is
- 25 every year. And it stays about the same even though

- 1 our price of utilities has gone way through the roof,
- 2 and even though the price of a lot of other things has
- 3 gone way up.
- 4 And I think I finally figured out this has a
- 5 lot to do with these imports we're getting from China
- 6 now. Wal-Mart had -- ever since about 2000 has been
- 7 lowering all the prices because of this influx of stuff
- 8 from China. And, you know, they have those smiley face
- 9 on the commercial, the slashing prices, getting
- 10 everything down, and it should have been a frowny face
- 11 because what is really happening is it's allowed all
- 12 these predators in this country to go nuts.
- 13 They've taken the fudge factor. Really, if
- 14 we have the biggest company in the world, Wal-Mart,
- 15 lowering all their prices, our inflation rate should
- 16 either stagnate or go down. And what that did is
- 17 allowed everybody who wants to play one of these
- 18 shenanigans going on in the corporate world, they got
- 19 away with it because it never did show up in the
- 20 inflation rate.
- 21 And I'm starting to finally see that show up.
- 22 And this rate right here and any other rate increase is
- 23 going to finally start to show up in these yearly
- 24 inflation rates. It's already started to finally see
- 25 that go up, because we've got everything in here we can

- 1 possibly get from China.
- 2 You go through -- I don't care if it's Target
- 3 now. I don't care if it's Wal-Mart. You can pull
- 4 anything off the shelf and just about everything is
- 5 coming in from China. And so we've maxed it out.
- 6 There's no more bottom end we can find. There's no
- 7 more gap through these companies that have run amuck to
- 8 play with anymore.
- 9 And, you know, I wanted to do stuff
- 10 artistically, creatively, or whatever, and you know,
- 11 every year I tell myself this is going to be the year
- 12 that I get ahead. This is going to be the year that I
- 13 get a little extra that I can start doing something
- 14 that I want to do. And what I'd like to notice is you
- 15 guys are happy that this stifled my creativity, that
- 16 this put me down?
- 17 And I'll tell you what this is I get in the
- 18 mail. This is a life sentence. Is that what this is
- 19 going to boil down to? That a mere existence, that
- 20 what we do to go to work is just that we can pay bills,
- 21 pay these silly utility bills?
- 22 A question about the people who were sitting
- 23 up here earlier. Are you from the water company?
- MS. BAKER: No.
- 25 MR. CARR: Okay. Next time leave them

- 1 sitting up here when the people come up here and talk.
- 2 It's like what do they do? They get to leave after the
- 3 question and answer session. Why aren't they staying?
- 4 Why aren't they sitting up here to listen to what we
- 5 got to say? Why am I even talking if they're not
- 6 sitting right there? I don't understand that.
- 7 You know, did they leave the building
- 8 already? Are they still here? (One hand raised in
- 9 hearing room.) Well, next time -- next time stay in
- 10 the seat so we can talk at you about this kind of
- 11 ridiculous nonsense.
- 12 And the deal about bringing all this stuff
- 13 into us and having all of us read all this stuff and
- 14 hear about all this stuff going on with the
- 15 Missouri-American Water, what's it got to do with us?
- 16 What's it got to do with me? What's that got to do
- 17 with anybody that pays the bills? It's your business.
- 18 You figure out how to run it.
- 19 I run a small business, and if I want to
- 20 change something in my business, if I want to grow the
- 21 business, that's my responsibility. If you don't got
- 22 enough money, go borrow some. Use your good credit.
- 23 Don't come down here to us. I don't buy it.
- 24 If you got -- if you're going to increase
- 25 your capacity by adding infrastructure, then you're

- 1 going to make more money. Use the added money that you
- 2 get. Or if you're more efficient than you used to be,
- 3 if you have better service than you used to have, then
- 4 you take that money, you pay your loan off.
- 5 This is ridiculous. It's not our job to run
- 6 your business. We're all tapped out.
- 7 What do we got? What do you want us to do?
- 8 You want me to start working a third job?
- 9 I'll give you an example. How would you like
- 10 it if you went in McDonald's tomorrow and you get your
- 11 mac and cheese, and the lady behind the counter said,
- 12 "Hey, you know, welcome to McDonald's. We're going to
- 13 open a new plant over here in Glenville, a place that
- 14 you don't live and you'll never go there, and for the
- 15 privilege of it, we're going to start charging a dollar
- 16 extra per hamburger. How would you like that? And
- 17 guess what? We're going to do it for life."
- 18 You know, I don't get it. This is a rate
- 19 increase that pays for what? It's a life sentence.
- 20 Does it ever go back down? It doesn't go back down.
- 21 That's not what this is for.
- 22 You got to take your private business matters
- 23 and handle it. Don't come to us with it.
- I do agree that these prices is kind of like,
- 25 you know, this is why all this predation isn't going to

- 1 work. Because now the water company has got to pay a
- 2 higher electricity price. Now it costs more for the
- 3 gas company to use water. Now it costs more money for
- 4 the electricity company to use gas.
- 5 As everybody raises prices, it's like a
- 6 domino effect. And what I would say to you is stop
- 7 looking downer nose at us. What did we do? These
- 8 people did no wrong. All they've ever done is pay
- 9 their bills religiously.
- 10 If you want to find a fix, look up. Look up
- 11 the food chain. Look up the ladder. That's where
- 12 you're going to find the shenanigans, sidewinder deals
- 13 and everything else going on.
- You want to conspire? There's all this
- 15 conspiracy going on in these snake tanks and closed
- 16 door meetings and all this stuff, so they can come out
- 17 with this manipulated -- this manipulating machine that
- 18 we've had to put up. And just turn on TV and watch it.
- 19 That's what you people ought to do is you ought to
- 20 conspire to do good instead of conspire to do bad.
- 21 You know, why don't you -- if you want to
- 22 stop this -- this country is going to be in trouble if
- 23 we keep raising these prices. How is anybody going to
- 24 start a business? How are we going to fix a road, fix
- 25 a bridge? How is that lady that runs the fruit

- 1 business, how is she going to stay in business?
- 2 So why don't you people all get together?
- 3 Why don't the gas company and the electric company and
- 4 water company, why don't all these businesses that have
- 5 fed each other get together and conspire and agree
- 6 they're not going to raise prices on each other so they
- 7 can stop this slide down hill?
- 8 I don't really know what this is. I don't
- 9 buy this that you got moneys you need for
- 10 infrastructure. Because the way you handle something
- 11 like this, "Okay. Well, the water is something the
- 12 city would grab ahold of. Okay. We got to build" --
- 13 like Glenville here, "We're going to upgrade Glenville
- 14 so that they pass a tax, a temporary tax for like a
- 15 year. We're going to raise taxes two percent so we can
- 16 pay for this." The citizens vote on it. They either
- 17 agree to it or they don't.
- 18 Let's say you pay for something like this.
- 19 This is a one-time cost. It's an up front cost. Once
- 20 you're done with it, it's over with. It's not supposed
- 21 to be a life sentence. When does the fee come back
- 22 down now that you got it all built and you're making
- 23 more money? That's what's ridiculous.
- That's about all I got to say.
- 25 JUDGE JONES: Commissioner Murray, do you

- 1 have any questions?
- 2 COMMISSIONER MURRAY: No questions. Thank
- 3 you.
- 4 JUDGE JONES: Any questions from either of
- 5 the parties?
- 6 MR. ENGLAND: Nothing.
- 7 JUDGE JONES: Mr. Carr, thank you for your
- 8 comments. You may be seated.
- 9 MR. CARR: Okay.
- 10 JUDGE JONES: Katherine Wilson, will you
- 11 please approach the microphone?
- 12 Will you please raise your right hand?
- 13 Do you solemnly affirm that the testimony you
- 14 are about to give is the truth?
- MS. WILSON: I do.
- JUDGE JONES: Thank you, ma'am. You may
- 17 proceed.
- 18 MS. WILSON: Okay. I am the executor and
- 19 founder of Hope House. It's a ministry. Men and women
- 20 coming out of prison home plan. They don't have a
- 21 home, home planned to Hope House.
- We are not for profit, which means we don't
- 23 make a profit, but yet the power company has us billed
- 24 as a business. So way pay a higher price than most
- 25 residents.

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1 Now, the thing is, the men and women that
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- 2 come into this program, their rent is based on our
- 3 expenses, and as our expenses go up, we can't afford to
- 4 charge them any more rent because they already have
- 5 expenses when they come in. Most of the men have had
- 6 child support payments that they have to pay, plus the
- 7 probation fee or parole fee. So there's only so much
- 8 we can charge them.
- 9 And the bottom line is, if the water company
- 10 continues to get these rate increases and the utility
- 11 companies continue to get their rate increases, we're
- 12 going to be forced out. And when we're forced out,
- 13 you've got these men and women that are going to be
- 14 going out on the streets. They're going to be homeless
- 15 which, by the way, our homeless population is really
- 16 increasing dramatically.
- 17 The saying "you're not there yet", that means
- 18 "you're eligible too." And the way we're going,
- 19 there's going to be a lot more of this.
- 20 And that's all I have to say. I violently
- 21 oppose this rate increase. It's way too much.
- The other thing that was pointed out tonight,
- 23 the water company said they're not making a profit.
- 24 And my question was, "If they're not making a profit,
- 25 then why are they paying their CEO \$1,150,000?" That's

- 1 an awful lot of money for a company that's not making a
- 2 profit. That's all I have.
- 3 (Applause.)
- 4 MS. WILSON: I'm sorry. I didn't hear you.
- 5 JUDGE JONES: Thank you, Mrs. Wilson. You
- 6 may be seated.
- 7 MS. WILSON: Okay.
- 8 MR. KELLY: Judge, that is all that we have
- 9 in terms of people who have signed up at this time.
- 10 I'll open it up and see if there's anyone else who
- 11 wishes to testify for this evening.
- Just a second. We have another person.
- MS. CAMERON: Hi. My name is Susan Cameron.
- JUDGE JONES: Okay. Susan?
- MS. CAMERON: C-A-M-E-R-O-N.
- JUDGE JONES: Did you say Cameron?
- MS. CAMERON: Yeah.
- 18 JUDGE JONES: Will you please raise your
- 19 right hand?
- 20 Do you solemnly affirm that the testimony you
- 21 are about to give is the truth?
- MS. CAMERON: Yes, I do.
- JUDGE JONES: Thank you. You may proceed.
- MS. CAMERON: Two years ago I moved into a
- 25 smaller house because I wanted to prepare to retire,

- 1 and my ut -- or my water bill, I noticed that -- I
- didn't say anything, but in January when the ice storm
- 3 hit, and they didn't come and read my meter for the
- 4 month of January, and then February was three times as
- 5 high as my August bill. I called and asked them what
- 6 did they do, and they said they estimated.
- 7 And I said, "Well, how could you estimate it
- 8 when it was three times higher than my August bill?"
- 9 And she didn't have an answer.
- 10 And then I said, "Why is my output of my
- 11 water higher than my intake?" And she says, "Well,
- 12 they're going by the person that lived in that home
- 13 before." And then I said, "Well, why don't you just
- 14 figure it on what I'm using?" And they said, "They
- 15 don't do it." To me, that's a scam.
- 16 And also I found out at that time in
- 17 December, January and February, they take your in and
- 18 average those three months to decide how much they're
- 19 going to charge you for outflow, and that's what you
- 20 pay for the full year. Well, since in February they
- 21 charged me three times as high that they normally
- 22 should, then I'm charged for the rest of the year for
- 23 out.
- Now, I found out that that goes back to the
- 25 city. So that makes, in my viewpoint, the City of

- 1 Joplin, they're frauding -- you know, we're being
- 2 frauded by our own city.
- 3 And I don't understand that. I think that's
- 4 unfair, and I think it's not right. And I feel and I
- 5 believe with these actions, this Missouri-American
- 6 Water Company, if they lied to me and do this to me,
- 7 then they'll run a lie to the Commission and they're
- 8 going to lie to the City of Joplin. And my solution to
- 9 retirement is I'm moving out of Joplin.
- 10 JUDGE JONES: Is there anyone else who would
- 11 like to testify? Please approach the mike.
- MR. KELLY: Yes, your Honor. Ralph Beasley.
- JUDGE JONES: Mr. Beasley, will you please
- 14 raise your right hand?
- Do you solemnly affirm that the testimony you
- 16 are about to give is the truth?
- MR. BEASLEY: Yes.
- JUDGE JONES: Now, would you please -- I
- 19 didn't hear you.
- 20 MR. BEASLEY: Yes.
- 21 JUDGE JONES: And will you please spell your
- 22 last name for the court reporter?
- MR. BEASLEY: B-E-A-S-L-E-Y.
- 24 JUDGE JONES: Thank you, sir. You may
- 25 proceed.

- 1 MR. BEASLEY: I'd just like to reiterate
- 2 Mr. Stevenson's comment about an office here in this
- 3 area. It's really frustrating to have questions. And
- 4 customer service? They ought to really think of
- 5 another name, because there's really not much service
- 6 left to it. You have to wait -- if you're busy, you
- 7 have to wait for many, many minutes. And if you happen
- 8 to punch the wrong button, then you're routed out. And
- 9 we know how that works.
- 10 But our rate, as this lady was saying here,
- 11 it was estimated in -- I think it was January. I can't
- 12 remember. But it might have been December. And it was
- 13 real high, way over. And what this customer service
- 14 representative said was it was on an average. And I
- 15 said, "Well, it's about two times higher than the
- 16 highest average that we've had that they charged us."
- 17 And I said, "Why was it estimated?" And they
- 18 couldn't give you an answer. And so finally they said,
- 19 "Well, it must have been maybe it was bad weather."
- 20 And, you know, all these guesses.
- 21 But you get put on hold, and they never find
- 22 an answer and tell you as to why exactly was your bill
- 23 estimated.
- 24 I said, "That sounds kind of strange to me."
- 25 And this lady, whoever it was, said, "Well, it is a

- 1 little strange, but that's the only thing I can give
- 2 you. "So then, you know, there you go. That's all you
- 3 got.
- 4 And if you happen to get through to somebody
- 5 that will give you a solid answer about, you know, some
- 6 areas like this, you're really lucky. But if you go
- 7 into an office and you go to the clerk and stand there
- 8 until they get you an answer, in my view, it's just
- 9 going to be a lot more efficient.
- 10 So if they're wanting this kind of a rate
- 11 increase, a little over 100 percent in the last year or
- 12 however long it's been, it just makes absolutely no
- 13 sense to not have an office here where customers can go
- 14 in and get some things straightened out.
- 15 I, too, have seen leaks. I reported two or
- 16 three leaks, if I remember right, over the three or
- 17 four years probably, and I've noticed over time these
- 18 leaks were never -- they're still leaks. They're still
- 19 there in the streets. And it just makes you wonder.
- 20 But I am -- in my view, I know I'm not the
- 21 only one, but this company is not very well managed
- 22 from the top down. And I spoke -- you happen to get
- 23 a -- one of these men that work on the lines, they will
- 24 tell you that there are problems within this company.
- 25 And some of them have worked there before this

- 1 Missouri-American Water Company, owned by a German
- 2 company, took over, it was a lot different. Things
- 3 began to change. But that's another issue.
- 4 But it's really frustrating to not be able to
- 5 get ahold of anybody and have them give you a real
- 6 answer about what's happening. Why are your rates
- 7 estimated when there was no reason?
- 8 Well, maybe your water -- maybe the manhole
- 9 cover was covered over with debris. And I said, "Well,
- 10 we've always kept our yard clean and there's never been
- 11 any debris on it. And if it's snow, well, no, snow
- 12 wouldn't stop it." And that was the only thing I could
- 13 think of why would they estimate the bill? She said,
- 14 "I don't know."
- Anyway, I guess that's about all I have to
- 16 say. Just kind of a ditto of some of the things that
- 17 I've heard here. But we really need an office here in
- 18 a metropolitan area like this area. We need an office
- 19 here at least half a day where you can go in and find
- 20 out some answers. And you can't go to -- at the
- 21 maintenance place, you can't get in there. So there's
- 22 no way to communicate with this company. Maybe write a
- 23 letter.
- But I guess that's all I have to say.
- JUDGE JONES: Thank you, Mr. Beasley.
