## Come to Utility Workers 335 rally July 11 to protest imposed contract

Creve Coeur - A rally to protest a contract imposed by Missouri American Water Co. on its employees will be held at 3:45 p.m. Monday, July 11, at the company headquarters, 727 Craig Rd., just south of Olive Boulevard.

Missouri American Water Co.told the employees' union, Utility Workers Local 335. that the company will impose its "last, best and final offer" on the day of the rally.

"We would greatly appreciate a show of solidarity and support from all our union brothers and sisters throughout the area, and we urge everyone who can make it

to come to the July 11 rally," said Local 335 President Tom Schneider.

The rally will be similar to one held June 7 at the company headquarters, at which members of Utility Workers Local 335 were joined by almost 100 members of other unions in a public protest.

Protesters made the public aware of consumer rate hikes and steep employee cuts planned by the water company.

The local rally was part of a nationwide series of actions held at other water companies owned by New Jersey-based parent American Water Co.,

## 2011 Lincon MKS: It's what's inside that counts

My pappy said, "Son, you're gonna drive me to drinkin', if you don't stop drivin' that Hot Rod Lincoln."

With Mercury just a memory, like that golden oldie by Commander Cody and the Lost Planet Airmen, Ford has left it to Lincoln to fill the gap and has done so by offering an expanded model lineup that ranges from the Fusion-sized MKZ for the well-heeled Facebook crowd, to the elegant flagship Town Car to the Navigator SUV, which has more front grille space than Weber. Smack in the middle is the Lincoln MKS, Lincoln's full-size luxury sedan.

The MKS is based on Ford's D3 platform, which is shared with the current Ford Taurus and comes in front-wheel drive or optional all-wheel drive. The MKS is powered by a 3.7 L Duratec V6 mated to a 6-speed automatic transmission. For a little fun, the optional EcoBoost 3.5 L twin-turbo, direct injection V6 is also available. The MKS has a base MSRP of around \$41,500 and is built at Ford's Chicago Assembly plant.

On outward appearances, the 2011 Lincoln MKS vaguely resembles a Ford Taurus, which is significantly less expensive. But if you want a Lincoln, you should expect to pay the price for the prestige it connotes.

Like the Taurus, the Lincoln MKS benefits from a spacious interior, a long list of standard features and a gigantic trunk. It compares with the Acura TL, Buick LaCrosse, Cadillac CTS or Hyundai Genesis. As one of two fullsize sedans in the Lincoln lineup, the MKS complements the rear-wheel drive Town Car, in the same way that the final generation of the Lincoln Continental (1995-2002) did.

To further differentiate it from the Taurus, Ford has endowed the Lincoln MKS with the largest selection of technologies and comfort and convenience features in its class. The

2011 MKS comes in three trim levels: FWD, AWD and EcoBoost. The FWD and AWD models come standard with 18-inch alloy wheels,

parking sensors, foglights, rain-sensing wipers, heated power sideview mirrors with memory, integrated blind-spot mirror and auto-dimming on the driver side, automatic headlamps, automatic



high beams, keyless entry/ignition and a slick version of Ford's venerable touchpad entry system that's embedded in the base of the B-pillar.

Interior standard features include a power rear sunshade, cruise control, an auto-dimming rearview mirror, leather upholstery, power tilt-telescoping steering wheel, dual-zone automatic climate control, heated and cooled eight-way power front seats (with power lumbar), heated rear seats, driver memory settings, the Sync voice activation system (includes turn-turn directions), a THX-certified sound system with an in-dash six-disc MP3 changer, satellite radio and an auxiliary audio jack. The EcoBoost is similarly equipped but has a more powerful twin-turbocharged engine and 19-inch wheels.

The all-wheel-drive EcoBoost model is powered by a twin-turbocharged 3.5-liter V6 that makes 355 hp and 350 lb-ft of torque. The EcoBoost is considerably quicker and actually gets better fuel economy at 17/25/20. However, you'll find yourself punching the premium fuel button at the gas station as this is the grade recommended for the EcoBoost engine.

The MKS's platform-mate, the Ford Taurus, offers the same powertrain and many available technological features, starting at an MSRP of \$10,000 less than the MKS.

## **OSHA fines Honeywell \$119,000**

Metropolis, Ill. (PAI) -The Occupational Safety and HealthAdministration(OSHA) has proposed fining Honeywell \$119,000 for the December 2010 release of hydrogen fluoride from its uraniumprocessing plant here.

The accident occurred during a lockout of workers that just passed the one-year mark. The mishap also underscored the danger of using scab labor

in a plant that requires sophisticated and trained workers. To make things worse, Steelworkers Local 7-669 said

on June 6, and then Honeywell reneged the next day.

"Fortunately, the accident occurred in a non-regulated area of operation, meaning away from the handling of yellow cake uranium," the union said.



## Hearing loss can sneak up on you

Three retirees, each with a hearing loss, were taking a walk one fine March day. One remarked to the other, "Windy, ain't it?" "No," the second man replied, "It's Thursday." The third man chimed in, "So am I. Let's have a beer."

As we age, our hearing gradually deteriorates — sometimes so gradually that we aren't even aware that we're blasting the TV and talking too loudly in restaurants about our hemorrhoids. According to the National Institutes of Health, an estimated one-third of Americans between the ages of 65 and 75 and close to half of those older than 75 have some degree of hearing loss.

Doctors believe that heredity and

chronic exposure to loud noises — like if you're a jackhammer operator or wedding DJ — are the main factors that contribute to hearing loss over time. Other factors, such as earwax blockage, can prevent your ears from colducting sounds as well as they should.

You can't reverse hearing loss, but you don'thavetolive without sound, either. You and your doctor or a hearing specialist like those at

Hear USA, whose ad you see on these pages, can take steps to improve what you hear.

#### HOW YOUR EARS WORK

Hearing occurs when sound waves reach the structures inside your ear, where the sound wave vibrations are converted into nerve signals that your brain recognizes as sound. Your ear consists of three major areas: the outer ear, middle ear and inner ear. Sound waves pass through the outer ear and cause vibrations at the eardrum. The eardrum and three small bones of the middle ear — the hammer, anvil and stirrup — amplify the vibrations as they travel to the inner ear. There, the vibrations pass through fluid in the cochlea, a snail-shaped structure in the inner ear.

Attached to nerve cells in the cochlea are thousands of tiny hairs that help translate sound vibrations into electrical signals that are transmitted to your brain. The vibrations of different sounds affect these tiny hairs in different ways, causing the nerve cells to send different signals to your brain. That's how you distinguish one sound from another.

#### IS THIS YOU?

Because it can be so gradual, you may not even realize that you are losing your hearing. Here are some signs and symptoms to look for:

Muffled quality of speech and other sounds.

• Difficulty understanding words, especially against background noise or in a crowd of people.

• Frequently asking others to speak more slowly, clearly and loudly.

Needing to turn up the volume of the television or radio.
Withdrawal from conversations.

• Avoidance of some social settings.

#### DO YOUR EARS RING?

A common condition that affects as many as 37 million people is tinnitus - roaring, buzzing, clicking, whistling, hissing, or high pitched ringing in the ears or inside the head. Tinnitus may be constant or occur intermittently in one or both ears and varies greatly among individuals ranging from a mild occasional sound to an ever present chronic condition. Some people report their tinnitus is so bothersome that it interferes with their quality of life.

Many people with hearing loss also experience tinnitus although it is possible to have normal hearing and still have tinnitus. If tinnitus is suspected, a medical evaluation and a hearing test by licensed professionals should be conducted. It is important to have a medical examination to determine if there is an underlying condition causing the tinnitus.

Since tinnitus is a symptom associated with various disorders, there is no single treatment that will help everyone. The



most effective treatment is the removal or prevention of the cause. Unfortunately, the cause of tinnitus usually cannot be identified or corrected. Therefore, tinnitus itself may need to be treated. There are a number of treatment options available including the use of amplification (hearing aid), which allows the wearer to hear background sounds in the environment, which takes away the focus on the tinnitus. **Now hear this:**

• Hearing loss is called 'the invisible handicap' because there are no outward signs of difficulty or disorder and the loss is almost always gradual, usually over a period of years, and there is no pain.

• Among seniors, hearing loss is the most prevalent medical condition, following arthritis and hypertension. • People with diabetes are twice as

 People with diabetes are twice as likely to have hearing loss than those who do not have diabetes.

 Smokers and overweight individuals are also at increased risk for hearing loss.
 Men who regularly use aspirin, acetaminophen and non-steroidal antiinflammatory drugs experience more hearing loss.

• Also, men who take phosphodiesterase (PDE) inhibitors are twice as likely to develop hearing loss as men who do not. You can find more facts about hearing at at www.hearusa.com. The companies — Glaxo-SmithKline, LLC (GSK) and SB Pharmco Puerto Rico (SB Pharmco) — will pay the states a total of \$40.75 million as part of the settlement.

The settlement stems from allegations that GSK and SB Pharmco engaged in substandard manufacturing practices of several medications produced at a plant located in

The adulterated batches of drugs covered by this agreement have been recalled for many years.
