3	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Let's go on the record.
4	Morning. It's Thursday, September 4th at
5	11 o'clock a.m. We're in Hamilton, Missouri.
б	Missouri Public Service Commission has set this time
7	for a local public hearing in the case captioned as
8	"In The Matter Of The Application Of Grain Belt
9	Express Clean Line LLC For A Certificate Of
10	Convenience And Necessity Authorizing It To Construct,
11	Own, Operate, Control, Manage, And Maintain A High
12	Voltage, Direct Current Transmission Line And An
13	Associated Converter Station Providing An
14	Interconnection On The Maywood-Montogomery 345 kV
15	Transmission Line.
16	File number EA-2014-0207. My name's
17	Michael Bushmann. I'm the regulatory law judge that
18	will be presiding over the hearing this morning. With
19	me are Chairman Robert Kenney and Commissioner Steven
20	Stoll, Bill Kenney, and Daniel Hall. Mr. Chairman,
21	would you like to make any opening remarks?
22	CHAIRMAN KENNEY: Thank you, Judge.
23	Good morning, everybody. I want to thank
24	you for being here and for participating in this
25	process. This is the seventh local public hearing

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1	that we've held in this matter. We have one
2	additional one this evening at six in Carrolton,
3	Missouri, and that will include a string of eight.
4	We've tried to be as inclusive as possible
5	by holding as many hearings as possible in each of the
6	affected counties. The information that you will
7	provide and testimony will be transcribed by the court
8	reporter, and all the commissioners will have an
9	opportunity to review that testimony as a part of our
10	deliberations once the evidentiary hearing is
11	concluded or held, rather, in November.
12	So again, thank you for taking the time to
13	be here. We appreciate your participation and look
14	forward to hearing your testimony.
15	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Let's have attorneys make
16	their entries of appearance. For Grain Belt Express?
17	MR. STEELE: Jonathan Steele for Grain Belt
18	Express Clean Line LLC.
19	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Office of Public Counsel?
20	MR. OPITZ: Tim Opitz for the Office of
21	Public Counsel, P.O. Box 2230, Jefferson City,
22	Missouri 65102.
23	JUDGE BUSHMANN: For commission staff?
24	MR. WILLIAMS: Nathan Williams, Post Office
25	Box 360, Jefferson City, Missouri 65102.

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Page 5 1 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Missouri Land Owners 2 Alliance? 3 MR. AGATHEN: Paul Agathen from Washington, 4 Missouri, and Judge, I also represent David McKnight. JUDGE BUSHMANN: Any other attorneys 5 representing parties in this action I've not called? 6 7 Before taking any testimony today I wanted to provide you with some information about the 8 Commission and why the Commission is holding this 9 10 public hearing. 11 Grain Belt Express applied to the 12 Commission for approval of its plans to construct a 13 high voltage direct current transmission line and 14 associated facilities within Buchanan, Clinton, Caldwell, Carroll, Chariton, Randolph, Monroe, and 15 16 Ralls County, Missouri. As well as an associated 17 converter station in Ralls County. The Commission may grant permission if it 18 19 finds that the construction is necessary or convenient for the public service. The Commission cannot decide 20 any questions about eminent domain including whether 21 22 particular property can be taken or the amount of compensation that can be paid. Those questions can 23 24 only be addressed in circuit court. 25 The Commission has already scheduled an

evidentiary hearing for November of this year to take
 evidence regarding Grain Belt Express' application.

It has also scheduled hearings in each of the counties affected by the proposed transmission line to give members of the public a chance to state their support or opposition to the project. That's the purpose of today's hearing.

8 For those of you who would like to provide 9 testimony, I'm going to call the names listed on the 10 sign-up sheet. If you signed up but testified in a 11 previous hearing, please wait until the end of the 12 list to testify so that others may who have not 13 already testified.

14 When I call your name, please come down to the microphone and stand here in front. I'll put you 15 16 under oath and ask you to state your name and where 17 you live, and then you can offer your comments to the 18 Commission. There are a lot of people here today who 19 would like to speak, so please keep your remarks to 20 under five minutes so that everybody has a chance to testify. I'll give you a five-minute warning, and 21 22 then try to conclude your remarks shortly after that. 23 The commissioners won't be able to answer any of your questions today because they have to remain impartial 24 25 until after the evidence is presented as at the

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Page 7 1 evidentiary hearing. 2 If you do have questions, please speak to 3 representatives of Grain Belt Express or Commission staff or any of the other parties that are here. My 4 final request is to please be polite and courteous for 5 everyone who's speaking and treat them as you'd like 6 7 to be treated. 8 Let's go ahead and start with the testimony. The first name that I have on the list is 9 Mark Mutchel. 10 11 SPEAKER: Can you turn the mic up just a little, please? 12 13 JUDGE BUSHMANN: I'll certainly try. 14 MIKE MUTCHLEI, of lawful age, produced, sworn, and says: 15 16 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please, state your name 17 and spell your last name. 18 MR. MUTCHLEI: Mike Mutchlei, 19 M-U-T-C-H-L-E-I. JUDGE BUSHMANN: And where do you reside? 20 MR. MUTCHLEI: My residence is 401 Camelot 21 22 Drive in Liberty, Missouri 64068. JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please, go ahead. 23 24 MR. MUTCHLEI: Approximately four years ago my wife and myself decided we wanted to buy some 25

1	property in which we could spend some time on the
2	weekends with our children, teach them some fishing
3	and hunting skills and hiking, and we spent about
4	two-and-a-half years looking for that property. We
5	found a piece of property located just south of
б	Kingston, we really liked the piece of property, and
7	we thought the asking price was very fair so we put in
8	for a full asking price as an offer. Well, of course,
9	the sellers came back and accepted our offer.
10	However, when they provided the seller's
11	disclosure, they disclosed that the property was going
12	to be intersected or impacted directly by one of the
13	proposed paths of Clean Line Grain Belt Express. So
14	immediately, we stepped back and say, whoa, what are
15	we going to do here? We added contingency to our
16	contract, and if I could enter my contract, my land
17	contract, into evidence, and I will read, if I can
18	read it. I will read directly from our contract here.
19	I'm sorry. I can't read it. It's so
20	small, and the lighting is poor here. What it states
21	is the seller must provide evidence that Clean Line or
22	Grain Belt Express would not impact the property;
23	otherwise, we would back out of the entire deal.
24	There wasn't an issue about land value. It was an
25	issue about whether or not the seller could actually

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1 sell the property.

2	We were asked we were giving full price.
3	The value had not diminished, but the salability of
4	that property had dropped to zero. The sellers
5	unfortunately were an elderly gentleman that needed
6	money for medical expenses, and luckily for them and
7	for us, the proposed path was moved south on a
8	different route and we settled on that piece of
9	property with them.
10	However, that didn't stop my concerns. I'm
11	a Missouri citizen, and I appreciate, Your Honor, the
12	Chairman and Commissioners for listening to us as
13	Missouri citizens, you're representing the Missouri
14	public and our rights as citizens of this great state.
15	And so I stand here and fight for those
16	rights, not only the right to protect what I own, but
17	the rights of those people who already own that
18	property and would like to sell it, perhaps, retire,
19	and sell that property, they won't be able to do that.
20	They're going to be stuck in a position where they
21	can't sell the property, not a matter of value.
22	People that come out solo, people are going to look at
23	it and say, I'm not going to buy that piece of
24	property. I'm going to go north or south. I'm going
25	to go to Kansas or maybe Illinois. I'm not going to

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1	stay in this location. And we're going to lose that
2	incentive and that ability to sell property to
3	interested people who may want to move to the state or
4	which to stay in the state, and that's my concern.
5	Like I said, I have evidence that it
6	doesn't affect, necessarily the value, I can't prove
7	the value, but I can show by my contract that it
8	directly impacted the ability of the seller to sell
9	the property outright. Thank you.
10	JUDGE BUSHMANN: You say you have evidence
11	that you wanted to submit into the record?
12	MR. MUTCHLEI: That is correct.
13	JUDGE BUSHMANN: What are the two documents
14	that you'd like to
15	MR. MUTCHLEI: Well, I have one document,
16	and it's the real estate land contract which has a
17	contingency noted in here which states that we would
18	not accept the sale of the property, we would not buy
19	the property if Clean Line or Grain Belt Express
20	impacted our property.
21	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Is there any confidential
22	information in there that you need to redact before
23	you submit that?
24	MR. MUTCHLEI: I don't believe so. I did
25	cross out the signatures and initials so those won't

support of the Clean Line project. My title is Macon County Economic Development Director, and I feel this project is extremely valuable to this region, the north part of Missouri and the state as a whole. The project is not going to go through our county, but we still feel it will benefit our community, the companies and the region. Obviously, the jobs are very important to Missouri, as well as the investment that the company is making that would benefit to the community through the tax dollars. Not only that but infrastructure is a big tool in Missouri's tool chest for attracting companies, and the more electricity that we have in our grid and renewable energy, the more attractive we are to companies outside of the state to try to get and bring businesses here to this area. We need to take this step to build 20 the infrastructure so we can stop using fossil fuels. 21 22 And that's it. JUDGE BUSHMANN: Any questions? Thank you. 23 24 Janice Stonum? MS. STONUM: I would like to yield, if 25

POLLARD: Chariton County, Missouri. 15 16 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Go ahead. 17 MR. POLLARD: I am a citizen of Chariton County. I strongly support the Grain Belt electrical 18 19 transfer project across Missouri. Nationally we are 20 properly moving to renewable energy resources and we're --21 22 THE COURT REPORTER: What was that, sir? 23 MR. POLLARD: Nationally we are properly 24 moving to renewable energy sources and reducing our 25 dependence on fossil fuels, it's time. Winds of the

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1	great plains are an important source of non-carbon
2	air. The electricity has to be transported
3	distributed and transported from the source to the end
4	user. We can compare it to all the gas lines, coal
5	trains, river (inaudible), transport trucks, and the
6	electrical transmission monitors. Some companies
7	represent, in quote, for profits. They have authority
8	for eminent domain of the regulation of Missouri
9	Public Commission. Project objections have surfaced.
10	Those objections have not turned my opinion. Damage,
11	real or imagined, need to be addressed. Those damages
12	will require mitigations and compensation. The
13	Missouri Public Service Commission is a regular agency
14	that should oversee this.
15	This (inaudible) the project is energy
16	generation without cars and nationally and global
17	issues. There are also local economic benefits.
18	These will be discussed or have been discussed or can
19	be discussed more thoroughly. That concludes my
20	comments.
21	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Any questions? Thank you,
22	sir.
23	Marshall Stonum or Stomer?
24	MR. STONUM: I'd like to donate my time to
25	Shannon Christopher.

Page 16 1 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Sherry Christopher. 2 SHERRY CHRISTOPHER, of lawful age, produced, sworn and says: 3 4 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please state your name and spell your last name. 5 MS. CHRISTOPHER: Sherry Christopher, 6 7 C-H-R-I-S-T-O-P-H-E-R. 8 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Where do you live? 9 MS. CHRISTOPHER: I live in Polo, Missouri, 10 Caldwell County. 11 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Go ahead. 12 MS. CHRISTOPHER: I'm pretty angry and a little emotional, so I apologize. I am a hundred 13 percent opposed to Clean Line building high voltage 14 power lines across our state. We have been sick 15 16 inside waking up at night. 17 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Move a little closer to 18 the microphone. 19 MS. CHRISTOPHER: I'm skeptical of their 20 true intentions and extremely concerned with their lack of experience in putting up a line of this 21 22 magnitude. One of my fears is they are just a front to obtain public utility status and allow eminent 23 24 domain to be used to get our property. 25 Their partners are the National Grid, and

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Page 17 1 I'm afraid that some day a (inaudible) of land going 2 through our state would be owned by the National Grid 3 instead of our country. 4 In March we received a certified letter stating that they had an interest in our property with 5 vaque details. Our town's name wasn't even listed on 6 7 the map. About a month later my husband received a call and said they wanted to meet with us, he told 8 them our land is not for sale or lease, and we didn't 9 hear anything else about it for a while. 10 11 I called them the end of June, first part 12 of July and asked them if they would please send us 13 some information stating their actual intent on our property. I would like to see more details because we 14 own a hundred acre cattle ranch where we raise 15 16 wholistically fed, grass fed beef. And he said that 17 he wanted us to meet with his agent, and I said no, 18 please mail it us to. I voiced my concerns as an RN. 19 I'm well aware of the tragedy that affects families 20 when someone comes down with cancer, and he said he had some research he was sending me that stated how 21 22 safe being around these power lines would be. I didn't receive any of that information. 23 24 I received a brochure that was generic, like a July newsletter-type brochure, stating that 25

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1 these meetings would be coming up and that's all I 2 received. 3 Last Saturday I got a call from Kyle, and 4 he is the agent in our area, and I agreed to meet with him so we could see the details that we never 5 received. So he will be coming to visit with us 6 7 Saturday. We've lived in our barn house on this hundred acres since 2003. We've been saving for our 8 9 dream home to build right there on that property. We 10 now have found out that they're planning to put these towers literally over the top of us. Our property 11 12 line right behind our barn is 200 feet to the property 13 The towers are supposedly coming right across line. there, so you know, the power lines would be right 14 15 over our home. 16 We were planning to build a home there this 17 spring, now it's on hold. I can remember the day my 18 husband called and told me that this was going to 19 happen, and my heart sank because I know what we're up 20 against. We raise our animals wholistically, no chemicals, no hormones, no antibiotics. We've been 21 22 working to improve our pastures, we've been doing 23 conservation projects on this property for five years. 24 We weren't able to renew our five-year project for

25 conservation project this last week because we're

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Page 19 1 afraid we'll be forced to move because we choose not 2 to live with these power lines. 3 This was going to be our retirement income, 4 and we were planning to retire in about 10 to 15 years and continue to raise grass fed beef to supplement our 5 retirement income so we are not dependent on the 6 7 Social Security or the hope our pension plan will 8 still there be there. The heart of my issue with the proposed 9 10 power line, and you can do your own research, is the 11 study of the serious health risk. There is a probable 12 link between cancer and leukemia in humans and 13 studies. I've never had cancer, but being a nurse I've cared for many people with cancer, and it's a 14 tragedy to see someone have to go through that kind of 15 16 suffering. 17 The fact that they are still doing research and some studies show inconclusive results, and 18 19 especially the fact that a power line of this magnitude has never been built and has health effects 20 documented shows me they have still have a lot of 21 22 questions about it. I have also a paper, I just did a little 23 research. Cattle herd numbers in the United States 24 25 have reduced dramatically over the last several

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1	decades. They would be taking our herd, we have an
2	80-head herd right now and we're growing. It would
3	continue to erode the cattle herd for the beef supply
4	in the United States. You can look that up on the
5	computer easily yourself.
6	I also have several excerpts, and I won't
7	try to read all of them, but there were some that were
8	really concerning to me. These are studies done off
9	.gov studies, some of them are HubMed. If you are
10	concerned about EMF exposure, your first step should
11	be to find out where the EFM exposures are and move
12	away from them or limit the time you spend near them.
13	The electric power industry contributed
14	about half of the 45 million dollars spent on EMF
15	rapid program to research the health effects of these
16	lines, and basically have proven that they don't
17	really know for sure.
18	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Five minutes.
19	MS. KILMER: I'd like to yield my time to
20	my mother, please.
21	JUDGE BUSHMANN: What's your name?
22	MS. KILMER: Jocelyn Kilmer.
23	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Okay. Go ahead.
24	MS. CHRISTOPHER: The same study from the
25	NIEHS study they did with the EMF rapid program, it

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1	says, Using criteria developed by the International
2	Agency for research on cancer, a majority of the
3	members of a working group concluded that exposure to
4	power frequency is a possible human carcinogen. We
5	are not sure which aspects of the magnetic field
б	exposure (inaudible) future research may reveal that
7	even off of EMF reductions measured based on today's
8	limited understanding are inadequate or irrelevant.
9	So as you can see, there's a lot more
10	studies that need to be done before a power line needs
11	to be put up of this magnitude. So I am asking you to
12	please, please do not grant them the right to become a
13	public utility. They should not be allowed to derail
14	landowners, reduce our property value, force us to
15	move for our fear of health risk.
16	We've heard studies that it reduces the
17	fertility of cattle. That's our livelihood. You will
18	hear from my husband, and you're going to derail that
19	man's whole life since he's been a little boy of what
20	he wanted to grow up and become. I think you're
21	affecting a lot more people than us, and I think it
22	needs to be recognized that the people who want the
23	line to go through are not the ones that are having to
24	live under it. And that's all I have.
25	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Thank you.

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Page 22 1 Shannon Christopher. 2 SHANNON CHRISTOPHER, of lawful age, produced, sworn and says: 3 4 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please state your name and spell your last name. 5 MR. CHRISTOPHER: Shannon Christopher, 6 7 C-H-R-I-S-T-O-P-H-E-R. 8 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Where do you live? 9 MR. CHRISTOPHER: Polo, Missouri. 10 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please go ahead. 11 MR. CHRISTOPHER: I want to -- there's a 12 whole lot that boils up inside of a man, and there's a 13 whole lot of things that you can say at this opportunity that you just can't squeeze into a small 14 15 amount of time. I represent a whole lot of people 16 here, not just myself. I do want to take this moment 17 and thank you all to hear my opinion and these other 18 people behind me, both sides. 19 It's not just about one person here today, 20 everything you just heard from the others and you're about to hear from me is one person's view, but it's 21 22 the same thing that affects many. 23 My property is only so -- a certain size, but my neighbors on either side of me deal with the 24 25 exact same issues that I'm dealing with. And it would

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1	be redundant to stand up here and to have you hear 700
2	ranchers, cattlemen, landowners, property owners,
3	gardeners, address you with the same issues over and
4	over. But essentially, that's what we're missing out
5	on is there's every neighborhood to my each
б	direction, east and west of that line has the same
7	concerns. A lot of them don't have the ability to get
8	up or want to speak. It's a big challenge for public
9	speaking. I'm not very good at it, but I'm willing to
10	stand up and do the best I can.
11	I've got a few bullet notes here that are
12	incredibly hard to fit on a note pad, but I'm going to
13	tell you how this is going to affect my life.
14	All I've ever wanted to do is raise cattle
15	and do what I've done for other men in my life, they
16	mentored me, and then as I took it upon myself and put
17	myself through college because I wanted to raise
18	cattle and know how to do it, and do it well, and I
19	put myself through. I made the investments to do
20	that. I bought land, not with power lines on it, I
21	bought land that was conducive to growing good forage
22	and to be a place where I could raise a family and
23	look out for the health and the concern, that had good
24	waters on it and a good place to raise cattle, a good
25	community, which I am in. Those things were very

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1	important to me. Now, that is being questioned and
2	being eroded. My property values. This is my
3	retirement. This is everything. I built the
4	infrastructure. I'm two-thirds into this life plan,
5	two-thirds into it. I'm about ready to pull the pin.
6	I had to have a city job to pay for my dreams. Here I
7	am today on my knees in front of you asking please
8	don't destroy what I have built and trying to do in
9	the great state of Missouri, and I thought as a
10	landowner, these are my rights to do these things
11	without somebody imposing their will on me without me
12	having a say so. I just don't understand that. When
13	I got out of college, I went to the military, I served
14	my country. And what did I do, what was my belief in
15	doing that? That was for the rights of every person
16	that lived in the United States of America, that's who
17	I went to work for every day. And my belief was that
18	I was protecting the back porches of every household
19	in here to have the rights, the freedoms that we were
20	given in this country. I see that being diminished
21	and diluted, and that is beyond acceptable. That's
22	one thing we cannot give up is our rights to choose.
23	When you buy a piece of land, who other
24	than you has the right. We all pay our I pay my
25	taxes. I obey all the rules in society, I should have

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Page 25 1 no reason, no one should be able to come in and 2 dictate and remove my plan, future plans, our current 3 plans. 4 That's -- this project is of a scale and of a caliber that's never been done before, it's not a 5 utility company coming to you to ask that -- like 6 7 KCP&L that's been doing it for years. That concerns me greatly. Any time you do something for the very 8 9 first time, is not always going to be the best, that's 10 just -- we've got a lot to learn. There's a whole lot of things there that's going to have some 11 12 ramifications and some consequences about, you know, that we're going to learn from and get better. 13 14 Hopefully, the people that don't live under these lines can have some compassion for the people 15 16 that do. These lines are going to be directly over 17 the barn I live in right now because I had to buy -everything has come through my work and sweat equity. 18 19 I've had to buy the land first, had to build the barn 20 to put my livestock and equipment in for my investments to protect it, to take care of my 21 22 livestock properly, but then the last but not least is when I could get on my feet, I would build my family 23 home that we would retire in and stay on this 24 25 property. Which has been absolutely -- and I ask you

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1 to put yourself in not just my position, but every 2 landowner this comes across. It's easy to say when 3 you live a mile or two or three or four or continued 4 further, when you pay with a pile of flesh, it means a heck of a lot more when I'm standing there bloody than 5 when somebody else doesn't give a stray. It's easy to 6 7 say we should bring these things and do these things. I agree that we should find alternative ways and get 8 away from the fossil fuel, I agree with that. Let's 9 just find a healthy way that it doesn't jeopardize 10 someone's livelihood or their health or find -- let's 11 do the research and make sure that we're making the 12 right decisions, not just a knee-jerk reaction. Let's 13 find out that their grandchildren that play under 14 these lines across the state of Missouri are going to 15 16 be healthy because right now there's statistics that 17 somehow leukemia rates are greatly increased by 18 children. 19 For example, these are facts, up in South 20 Dakota, there's power lines that run across that are much smaller in scale, but the cattlemen up there and 21 22 there's a gentleman here that can support this, you can talk to cattlemen all over this state or anywhere 23 you want to go, and you can't drive a cattle 24

25 underneath these power lines. They won't graze. The

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Page 27 1 electron magnetic field interrupt their grazing. They 2 do not breed. When an open cow does not give me a 3 calf every year, that is a substantial money loss. 4 Where is the men, where is the justification, where is -- are they going to be when my cattle don't breed and 5 my income gets significantly dropped? Nobody can 6 answer that. Sorry for me, sorry for my brothers and 7 sisters that this is happening to, and if they give me 8 9 \$50,000 for coming across my property, and my property value drops 350,000, anybody want to do that math, 10 because it don't come out for the landowner that has 11 12 obeyed the laws, paid his taxes, developed his life plan, two-thirds through his life plan. I'm 50. I 13 don't get to restart and do this over again. I'm 14 committed. I've got the infrastructure, the barns, 15 16 the tractors, the trucks, the livestock purchased. 17 I'm committed. I can't afford to lose. And they can't either. And it's not just about me. I'm just 18 the guy up here presenting the information to you 19 20 asking you to consider people like myself in this situation. 21 22 And as you've heard, there's a whole lot of 23 other situations that doesn't involve livestock, but it does involve property values decreased. Nobody 24 25 wants to buy it. Who would buy ground that looks in

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1	the paper and when this comes and it's and you see
2	it for miles, who's going to say, hey, you know that
3	piece of ground over there, you know, right underneath
4	that great big power line, you know, boy, I think that
5	looks nice. I I would I would ask any of you
6	I don't believe you would want to buy or purchase that
7	piece of ground because we all choose if we have a
8	choice and there's a lot of other ground around, we're
9	going to go somewhere else so all of our property is
10	reduced.
11	I don't know what that value is, but it's
12	greatly reduced and if you can't run your retirement
13	plan on it, boy, you're taking it in the mouth twice.
14	The foreign country issue is something that
15	brings me just speechless. The United Kingdom has
16	40 percent of it and has a right to purchase more at
17	any time across I, for one, am American made.
18	That's what I buy, that's what I support, and I'm not
19	looking to give up an easement through my property or
20	this state of Missouri to the United Kingdom, to
21	another country? Boy, there is a question that needs
22	to be answered and a whole lot of facts needs to come
23	out about that, but I don't know many of the people
24	behind me that thinks that's a very good idea. A
25	tornado, these things are 200 foot tall, 150, 250 foot

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1	tall, seven across a mile, what happens, because we
2	don't know these things but I'm going to present a
3	question to you. We have tornados in the state of
4	Missouri. When the tornados or high winds spins these
5	up with this mega wattage that's more stronger than
6	the Hoover Dam, the power that comes out of the Hoover
7	Dam in Las Vegas, Nevada, this is a magnitude far
8	greater than that, so when the tornados bring these
9	wires down and it lands on my barn which is directly
10	underneath, this thing is going to go up like a Roman
11	candle with my children, my grandchildren, we've got
12	five children. I would like to know the safety
13	issues, and how this is going to take effect.
14	The bottom line is, what's next? Once this
15	door gets opened and you grant them public utilities
16	commission and then they get to run free reign. And
17	private gain for eminent domain is a sin. That's not
18	what this eminent domain was set up for. Big
19	corporate America should not be able to impose little
20	small guys like me stomp us out. No farms, means
21	no food. I don't know anybody in here that can do
22	very good without having a lunch, breakfast, or a
23	dinner today. No food is a big deal. And it starts
24	out on small scale, but you're stomping the farmers if
25	you make these decisions. There's consequences to all

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1	decisions, let's look at them and make sure we're
2	doing the right things, make sure we've equally
3	weighed them on all sides, not just my side, and I
4	know you are, but this is our opportunity. Once
5	again, I thank you for hearing our concerns and an
6	extremely heartfelt and there's so much more I
7	could say, but I'm going to keep it short and try to
8	be very concise. I ask that we just protect our
9	rights to our land and give us the right to protect
10	our families and our health and our family's health
11	and our property values.
12	What else what else can happen to a
13	person in a family that's more of a kick in the gut
14	than this? I mean, we have to see it, you have to
15	deal with the health effects, and the property value
16	and your retirement plan. Wow, I can't think of a
17	bigger kick in the stomach, and with that, I ask that
18	God be with each Missouri landowner and God bless
19	Missouri.
20	COMMISSIONER STOLL: Thanks for your
21	testimony.
22	JUDGE BUSHMANN: James Feil.
23	JAMES FEIL,
24	of lawful age, produced, sworn and says:
25	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please state your name and

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1	spell your last name.
2	MR. FEIL: James Feil, F-E-I-L.
3	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Where do you reside?
4	MR. FEIL: Cowgill, Missouri.
5	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please, go ahead.
6	MR. FEIL: You know, I'm here today not
7	just for me, but for all my neighbors and friends and
8	family. I'm no medical expert. I don't know if these
9	power lines are going to cause us to have three-eyed
10	kids or anything like that. But I can tell you I'm
11	from a fourth and fifth generation farm as well as
12	most of my neighborhoods.
13	We've worked for generation after
14	generation to get these farms the way we want them and
15	then the fact that you guys want to come through here
16	or some company does and put power lines through
17	we're all proud to be from Missouri. We're all proud,
18	or at least I am, to be from Caldwell County. Without
19	a doubt it's one of the poorest counties, but it's one
20	of the proudest counties that you'll find in Missouri.
21	And I'd hate to see it come to the point, you know,
22	you can only push somebody so far and not think they
23	won't push back. It's an embarrassment for me to see
24	what happened down in Furgeson, Missouri, but if you
25	don't think that it's not possible for something of

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1	that magnitude to happen right here in Caldwell
2	County, you're mistaken. And I don't mean this as a
3	threat to anybody or anything like. It's just a
4	simple fact. You have generation after generation
5	after generation of landowners, and we're not going to
6	sit down and take this without fighting back, and
7	we're going to do what it takes.
8	And I hope that you guys can see that, you
9	know, we don't want this. You know, I look out in
10	this audience today, and there's not hardly a member I
11	don't know, that I went to school with their brothers
12	or sisters or uncle or someone. We all know one
13	another. We are a tight, tight group here in Caldwell
14	County, and we're telling you as a county, we do not
15	want these power lines coming through our county.
16	That's my testimony.
17	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Any questions?
18	Thank you.
19	Leonard Vanderpool? Or Underpool?
20	Linda McElwee, M-C-E-L-W-E?
21	MS. McELWEE: Two Es.
22	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Two Es? Sorry about that.
23	MS. McELWEE: Thank you for getting it
24	right. Most people don't.
25	LINDA MCELWEE,

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1	of lawful age, produced, sworn and says:
2	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please state your name and
3	spell your last name.
4	MS. McELWEE: Yes, I'm Linda M-C, capital
5	E-L-W-E-E.
6	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Where do you reside?
7	MS. McELWEE: I live in Cowgill, on a farm
8	outside of Cowgill.
9	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please proceed.
10	MS. McELWEE: Thank you, sir.
11	First of all, I want to say welcome to
12	Caldwell County. I appreciate the time and energy
13	that you have exerted to bring these hearings to us.
14	It would be so easy for you to sit at a desk in
15	Jefferson City and stamp whatever, but I think it
16	shows great courage and character for you to face
17	people that you know are opposed to a thing and you're
18	going to have to be the people that make that
19	decision.
20	First of all, a lot of us were born here,
21	and went away to school and chose to come back. We
22	have a lot of people who have come here for the chance
23	to look out in the morning and see a beautiful sunrise
24	or the horizon or the sunset without opposition and
25	obstacles. Grain Belt Express doesn't understand that

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1	and doesn't care. I have an issue with the easements.
2	The easements that will be given to this project are
3	signing away our rights to that land forever, and if
4	Grain Belt Express cannot fulfill their obligation,
5	they have the right to sell that easement to anybody
6	for any reason, and they don't care. I worked as a
7	public health nurse for 26 years and ran the county
8	health department, and in that time I was privileged
9	to work with CDC on many projects and National
10	Association of County and City Health Officers about
11	20 years ago. We had a cluster of deaths in young
12	men, and as we began to look at the medical histories
13	of these seven young men, they all had strange and
14	rare cancer. The common denominator in these deaths
15	was that they were all linemen.
16	I sent a request to the Department of
17	Health to have an investigation done, and they sent me
18	back that seven was too small a number to do
19	statistics, but I will tell you, seven young men taken
20	out of a community that had the common denominator,
21	and they were all had a strange and rare cancer
22	that left a big hole in families and in the community.
23	I will believe until the day I die that those men died
24	because of their occupation.
25	We also come to an issue that we have, and

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1	no one has mentioned it before, and that's Life
2	Flight. Because we are so remote, we count on Life
3	Flight to do our medical ambulances by air from Kansas
4	City to Trenton and Chillicothe, which are the two
5	major hospitals that will go right over this power
б	line. I talked to them a couple of weeks ago, and
7	while they are not pleased with the idea of these huge
8	towers, especially in foggy conditions, they'll work
9	around them. But I have issues when I think about
10	my dad was in a tractor accident when I was 12, and
11	what if someone couldn't get to him because he was
12	under one of these towers somewhere or something? So
13	I think we need to think about things that we probably
14	haven't thought about before.
15	My husband and I are both born in Caldwell
16	County, came back to Caldwell County and bought a
17	farm, and that was our life's dream. Maybe crazy, but
18	nevertheless and for all those years he worked at
19	Ford Motor Company for 30 years, and most of those
20	years were 58 hours a week. And he would come home,
21	crawl in the tractor and bail hay until midnight and
22	get up at 4:00 a.m. And at that time I worked at the
23	hospital, and the health department. I worked two
24	jobs, and that's so we could afford to give our kids
25	the chance to live in the country. This proposed line

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1	goes across the very best pieces of our land, and we
2	have sweat a lot of years and some of the stories we
3	should never tell of the things that happened to us.
4	I think that all of us do believe in
5	renewable energy and that we have to be careful with
б	our natural resources, towers in the area are not the
7	same as cables and conduits underground. And I don't
8	think anyone has talked about that before, and I think
9	that's something that maybe ought to be considered
10	somewhere along the line.
11	I am concerned also that giving Grain Belt
12	Express public status sets a precedent in this state
13	that may not be a good thing in times to come. I have
14	no idea what are the things, but think about
15	possibilities. When I worked with CDS on projects we
16	would have brainstorming sessions, and we would sit
17	down and think what if, what if, what if, and one of
18	our exercises was what if you were a terrorist, and
19	how could you wipe out big pieces of the United States
20	population? And if you sit down and think about some
21	of those things, it will scare you to death. Same
22	thing with what you're doing for granting status to
23	Grain Belt Express.
24	I do want to thank you again for coming and
25	letting us have our say, and I beg you and implore
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1	you, do not, do not give them status because if you
2	do, it shows the people in Missouri that you don't
3	care either, and I don't believe that for one minute.
4	I believe you do care.
5	Do you have any questions for me?
6	COMMISSIONER STOLL: Thank you for your
7	testimony.
8	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Thank you, ma'am.
9	Marji Martin?
10	MARJI MARTIN,
11	of lawful age, produced, sworn and says:
12	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please state your name and
13	spell your last name.
14	MS. MARTIN: Marji Martin, M-A-R-T-I-N.
15	Kansas City.
16	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please go ahead.
17	MS. MARTIN: I believe this line would be
18	really good for the area. It will be good for the
19	economy. There will be more jobs for local companies,
20	there will be people who are building a line will stay
21	at motels, gas and restaurants, and landowners will
22	get fair market value for their property and get their
23	land to use. I personally own a small farm. I don't
24	have beef, but I do have wheat, and it hasn't affected
25	the price of my property. And as far as the fossil

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1	fuels, we need to get away from the fossil fuels. We
2	need to get where we get the wind energy and solar
3	transmission going, and our country is sadly lacking
4	in a lot of high transmission lines. Thank you.
5	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Any questions? I'd also
6	mention that I'm hearing comments during testimony. I
7	ask that you do not make any comments and be courteous
8	while a witness is testifying.
9	Next witness is Steve Schultz.
10	STEVE SCHULTZ,
11	of lawful age, produced, sworn and says:
12	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please state your name and
13	spell your last name.
14	MR. SCHULTZ: Steve Schultz, S-C-H-U-L-T-Z.
15	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Where do you live?
16	MR. SCHULTZ: Boone County, Missouri. I
17	apologize for the confusion. I'm here to speak in
18	favor of Clean Line. I didn't know I should be
19	checking my shirt color before coming in today.
20	I'm here to speak in favor for the benefit.
21	I'm hear to speak for the project for the greater
22	whole of the state of Missouri. Renewable aspects
23	will provide renewable energy to the state, as well as
24	the great resources that we have. It will put us into
25	a unique position to be able to tap into that line for

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increased rates from other sources or if there's a
reduction in nuclear or coal power plants.

In addition to that, if the -- the line is 3 4 not going over any property owned; however, if it did, it would be unfortunate, and I would probably be up 5 here speaking different. There are risks that I take 6 7 every day in life. I have an electric outlet every night by my bed. I use a cell phone next to my ear. 8 I'm a civil engineer, and I deal with treating water 9 and waste water in that. I deal with fertilizer run 10 11 off from crop production that has to be treated. 12 There are themes and risks in life that you have to 13 take for the greater whole, so I can have food source and supply. 14

15 Whenever I design a highway that goes 16 through a person's property, that person is always 17 against that; however, it provides a greater route for 18 safety and safe transmission of people, students, 19 kids, and in addition to farmers being able to bring 20 grains and things of that nature to my doorstep. Ιf there's nothing else, my comments are concluded. 21 22 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Any questions? 23 COMMISSIONER KENNEY: No, thanks. 24 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Thank you. 25 Carolyn Shaffer?

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Page 40 1 MS. SHAFFER: I'd like to defer my time to 2 Mike Ford. 3 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Jamey Youse? 4 JAMEY YOUSE, of lawful age, produced, sworn and says: 5 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please state your name and 6 7 spell your last name. 8 MS. YOUSE: My name is Jamey Youse, 9 Y-O-U-S-E. 10 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Where do you live? MS. YOUSE: I live -- I have a Clarence 11 12 address. I live in Monroe County. 13 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please go ahead. 14 MS. YOUSE: I work for Hubble Power Systems, a large manufacturer of transmission 15 16 distribution substation electrical products located in 17 Centralia, Missouri. We have primarily about 600 18 different employees that work there in Centralia 19 offices, and a project such as Grain Belt Express 20 coming through would be an additional benefit not only to our company, but to the communities, surrounding 21 22 communities, as well as, again, we have employees that live in the Clarence area, and I have, and have done 23 24 so for 20 years of my life in that same location. The benefit would bring approximately 65 25

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new jobs to my company, not only supporting those		
communities and the families within them and provide	2	
benefits to them as well, but the community, my		

3 benefits to them as well, but the community, my 4 company, provides, you know, they input money back 5 into this community. Right now we're working on 6 halfway through a \$9 million project rebuilding our 7 older facilities, our test labs, engineering labs, 8 manufacturing areas within the company as well, so 9 we're putting that back into the community in support.

10 I fully support Grain Belt Express and the line coming through not only on a business purpose, 11 12 but personally as well. I live -- I have land in both 13 Shelby County and Monroe County. I am a landowner. I've had a transmission line across my land, and we 14 have farmed under it for years, never had an issue. 15 16 I'm also the president of the school board at Mason 17 C3. The tax benefit alone to small communities, we're a 1A school, have about 340 students in our school. 18 19 And with reducing the amount of tax revenue that we 20 get on an annual basis, every year we get cuts more and more, and for us to educate our children in a 21 22 manner that they need to be at and build them up so we 23 send them off to college and they're prepared for the world, we've got to have that money, and it's not --24 it's getting reduced every year, and so the additional 25

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Page 42 1 tax benefits that we see from that land is a big thing 2 for me or on a personal basis, so I see it trifold. I 3 understand everybody's comments, you know, with land 4 and everything. I'm right there with you, but at the 5 same time, I've lived in a remote area all my life, grew up, you know, for 42 years. I've been in the 6 7 same -- within a two-mile radius, always lived there, and I'm never going to move, but I'm tired of being on 8 9 the back-burner for developments. You know, I'm all 10 for renewable energies and yet, I can't get broadband in my neighborhood, why can't -- I want more 11 12 development, I -- I want renewable energy. I think we need to be moving forward away from fossil fuels. 13 That's my comments. Do you have any questions for me? 14 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Any questions? 15 MS. YOUSE: Thank you. 16 17 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Thank you, ma'am. Tom Silvey? 18 19 TOM SILVEY, 20 of lawful age, produced, sworn and says: 21 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please state your name and 22 spell your last name. 23 MR. SILVEY: Tom Silvey, S-I-L-V-E-Y. 24 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Where do you live? MR. SILVEY: I live here in Hamilton. 25

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1	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Go ahead.
2	MR. SILVEY: I am the Caldwell County Farm
3	Bureau president, have been for going on ten years.
4	And I was on the board for some time before that.
5	I can tell you that I have received more
6	phone calls over this issue than any other issue since
7	I've been on the board, as well as my other board
8	members, and none of those were in favor of Grain Belt
9	Express.
10	So the Caldwell County Farm Bureau Board
11	voted to oppose Grain Belt getting utility status. We
12	believe that the benefits that for Caldwell County
13	and the state of Missouri that the line would provide
14	do not outweigh the loss that the landowners would
15	receive. Thank you.
16	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Any questions?
17	COMMISSIONER KENNEY: Thank you for your
18	testimony.
19	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Thank you, sir.
20	Rachel Myslivy. May not be saying that
21	right.
22	MS. MYSLIVY: It's Rachel Myslivy.
23	RACHEL MYSLIVY,
24	of lawful age, produced, sworn and says:
25	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please state your name and

Page 44 1 spell your last name. 2 MS. MYSLIVY: Rachel Myslivy, 3 M-Y-S-L-I-V-Y. 4 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Where do you live? MS. MYSLIVY: Jefferson County, Kansas. 5 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Go ahead. 6 MS. MYSLIVY: First of all, I'd like to 7 thank you for the opportunity to address you today and 8 9 the good work that you do. I work with the climate 10 and energy project. I'm representing the climate and energy project, which is a region nonprofit based in 11 12 Hutchinson, Kansas since 2007. My organization has 13 worked with stake holders across Missouri, Kansas, and to promote renewable energy and energy efficiency 14 policy and practice. Wind energy is good for the 15 16 environment and safe water. Additionally, the 17 economic benefit of energy is well documented. In addition to producing low-cost, clean energy, it 18 19 promotes thousands of jobs for manufacturing, 20 construction, operations, and maintenance. Projects like the Grain Belt Express will 21 22 also bring a long-term benefit in the form of property taxes, the taxing district, and benefits [inaudible]. 23 With the Clean Line energy and Grain Belt will present 24 an additional \$7 billion of new wind farm and benefit 25

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1 to its region. 2 The climate and energy project has attended the past several of these meetings, and we have found 3 4 them to be fair and transparent as they deal with landowners and citizens, starting landowner 5 negotiations in the early stages of development is a 6 7 [inaudible] landowners fairly. Missouri has the 8 chance to gain access to low-cost renewable energy and current and renewable energy by approving Grain Belt 9 Express. The application will enable Clean Line 10 11 energy to reign the nation to Missouri communities 12 with a strong demand of clean, low cost, power while 13 reducing pollution, saving water, and growing the state's economy. I thank you for your time. 14 15 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Any questions? Thank you, 16 ma'am. 17 Kelly Rotert? 18 KELLY ROTERT, of lawful age, produced, sworn and says: 19 20 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please state your name and 21 spell your last name. 22 MS. ROTERT: Kelly Rotert, R-O-T-E-R-T. 23 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Where do you live? 24 MR. ROTERT: Camdenton, Missouri. 25 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Go ahead.

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Page 46 MR. ROTERT: I am -- I represent the 1 2 professional service industry. We're a technical engineering company. We're here, we're not contracted 3 with Clean Line in any way, shape or form. But we are 4 -- we pursue this type of work as part of our industry 5 in support of the infrastructure that brings about 6 7 green and renewable resources. I am responsible for 8 offices in -- on both sides of the state, and have approximately 45 Missouri employees. This will add 9 six to ten additional jobs to our company roles. And 10 we're supportive of that in the jobs and the taxes and 11 12 the things that come with that. That is all. 13 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Any questions? 14 COMMISSIONER KENNEY: Thank you. JUDGE BUSHMANN: Thank you. 15 16 Jenn Leyden. 17 MS. LEYDEN: It's Leyden. 18 JENN LEYDEN, of lawful age, produced, sworn and says: 19 20 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please state your name and 21 spell your last name. 22 MS. LEYDEN: Jenn Leyden. L-E-Y-D-E-N. 23 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Where do you live? 24 MS. LEYDEN: I live -- I have a Lathrop 25 address, but I'm a Caldwell County resident.

1	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please proceed.
2	MS. LEYDEN: I come in opposition. I am
3	not we are landowners, but we are not in the path
4	of this proposed path of Grain Belt. I come as a Navy
5	veteran who signed up to service, just like a lot of
6	those before me. I believe in helping those that need
7	the help. I don't believe that this Grain Belt line
8	overrides the rights of landowners.
9	As Mr. Christopher stated, the precedence,
10	and the lady before me, the precedent that that sets
11	when we allow this to come through is unfounded.
12	That's what's great about America, that's what I love
13	about being an American. Capitalism,
14	entrepreneurship, this is just the beginning. These
15	other lines that they're talking about, they're not DC
16	lines. This is the first time for the DC line. We're
17	about to set a precedent here. The sky's the limit.
18	It's what Americans do. They take an opportunity and
19	they up the ante.
20	I'm raising my kids to be proud Americans
21	to take opportunities to the next level, and that's
22	what Grain Belt's going to do. And that's not good
23	for the state of Missouri.
24	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Any questions?
25	Thank you.

Page 48 Two names on the next line, Mike Ford and 1 2 Rena Ford. I'm not sure which would like to testify. 3 MS. FORD: I'm Rena Ford. I'm going to yield my time to Mike. 4 5 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Okay. Mr. Ford, come forward, please. 6 7 MIKE FORD, of lawful age, produced, sworn and says: 8 9 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please state your name and 10 spell your last name. MR. FORD: My name is Mike Ford, F-O-R-D. 11 12 I live in Cowgill. 13 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please go ahead. 14 MR. FORD: I'm a retired cement mason. I worked in Kansas City all over, different states, took 15 16 me 30 years to pay for a farm, the cattle ranch that 17 I'm in now. This power line was an -- I was on one of the routes. And it would put me out of business 18 19 because I'm a cow/calf producer. I can't help my cows 20 first of January, through February, and March, I don't have any barns. All I got is brush trees, ditches and 21 22 drawls. These people want to come through and make a 200 wide swaft [sic] through my cattle patch? Hey, 23 I'm out of business. I support the local community, 24 25 I'm not a -- I don't give them direct checks, but

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1	you're looking at to feed people, fuel people,
2	mechanics, I pay taxes. You know, this deal here,
3	it's all about the money, that's what it's all about.
4	That's the way I see it.
5	Grain Belt is not a public utility.
6	They're not benefitting they're not going to
7	benefit me any. I'm a part of Farmers Electric Co-op,
8	I get a dividend out of the deal. I'm part of the
9	cooperative. Only thing these guys are doing is
10	they're coming in here and wanting to ramrod, you
11	know, and take over.
12	Well, let me ask you this: As a business
13	owner, myself, how many business owners do you know
14	that can cut another business owner's throat? Can I
15	take since I need a place to feed my cattle, can I
16	put my cattle in these guys' front yard? Hey, I'm
17	benefitting the countryside, I'm feeding them there.
18	You know, I don't see how these guys are
19	saying that they're going to do us such a big favor,
20	the land values, they're going to drop. Because right
21	here, the people in Alberta, Canada, that's what they
22	say, they got a power line up there, and at least
23	their country made these power lines people pay the
24	difference on what their land values were.
25	These people aren't going to do this. Only

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1	thing they're going to do is take everything, and
2	they're not going to win here. I don't have a problem
3	with capitalism, but when we're cutting another man's
4	throat to better your company, what kind of deal is
5	that? I mean, like I said, I don't understand how
6	these people are setting there telling everybody that
7	they're going to do us a favor. They're not doing
8	nobody a favor in the state of Missouri. If they get
9	eminent domain, they can come in there and take away
10	Arkansas denied them, well, Arkansas may know
11	something we don't. Why did they deny them? They sit
12	here and tell everybody, oh, we got all this support.
13	Well, if they got all this support, how come they
14	didn't get Arkansas then? They write a letter to the
15	Department of Energy, they want to go up above
16	everybody's head, and they want to do an eminent
17	domain.
18	If the states do not want to let them do
19	what they want, these people aren't going to live
20	here. Soon as this is all done and said, they come
21	in, yeah, they're going to spend a little money here
22	for a while. I worked construction for 37 years. I
23	traveled all over the place. Once we was there, we
24	got it done, we was out of there, that was the end of
25	it. Them people never seen me begin. And that's

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1	exactly what's going to happen to this deal, but I'm
2	going to have to live with this for the hundred you
3	know, however long I live, and my kids, and my kid's
4	kids. Well, they're sitting there telling you this
5	doesn't affect cattle. I'll tell you what, you own
6	cattle, you take any rancher out there and have them
7	run with cattle. Those cattle will run every which
8	way. The more people you have out there, the more
9	weight you lose. I'm selling by the pound. We don't
10	want people monkeying around doing anything else
11	because it's costing me as a business owner. I don't
12	see how you can sacrifice one business owner for
13	another. How would you guys like it if I was wanting
14	to apply for this eminent domain? Or how about I just
15	load up my cattle and come where you live whether you
16	live in the farm or city or whatever and rent your
17	backyard to run my cattle because I'm helping
18	everybody. That's the way I feel about this deal,
19	it's ridiculous. It is all about the money and it
20	goes clear to Washington. They're the ones promoting
21	this. Everybody got their own promotion. I hear
22	people come up here, and I can understand, you know,
23	they got a survey company and it's going to help them
24	do this and that, but they're not thinking about what
25	it's going to do to me as a business owner.

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1	I don't mind helping somebody, but I'm not
2	going to cut my own throat doing it, and I wish you
3	guys would just tell them to forget it. You know, we
4	don't need this. We got farmers electric, MNUE down
5	there in Kansas City, Missouri Public Service or the
6	Power and Light. They have an eminent domain. If
7	they was coming through my property, I wouldn't have a
8	problem with it. It is itty power lines. We all got
9	them.
10	This thing is huge. We've got crop dusters
11	that come around and dust people's land. How they
12	going to fly around them things? You got this magnet
13	field. And you know, I got some other documents in
14	here that says this stuff will cause cancer. I grew
15	up under power lines, and I ended up with colon
16	cancer. You know, I can't say that was the cause of
17	it, but it could have been. I don't know. You guys
18	have the power to shut this off. All you got to do is
19	say that's it, huh-uh, but these people here, they're
20	wanting this for real real bad. I don't know why
21	they want it so bad, but it has to be for the money.
22	That's what it's all about.
23	Why would a billionaire want to invest in
24	something? He's already got more money than he could
25	possibly spend, and as far as foreigners owning land

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1	in this company, you as an American, go to any other
2	country, try to buy a farm or land or whatever, you
3	can't do it. They won't let you. You either have to
4	marry somebody and be a dual citizen. You can't just
5	go over there to China and say hey, I want to buy some
6	land. It don't work that way, but it does in America.
7	Missouri will sell one percent of our land to
8	foreigners. That's crazy. That's just crazy. I used
9	to be in the hog business. I don't know if you guys
10	ever heard of Premium Standard Farms, oh, they come up
11	here in north Missouri, and they promised everybody
12	the world. We're going to give you people this, we're
13	going to make jobs. We're going to do this for you
14	and that.
15	Well, they ended up going bankrupt, now the
16	Chinese own it. The Mexicans work it, so what do the
17	local people get out of the deal. They don't get
18	nothing out of this deal, they got the shaft. Now, we
19	got foreigners up here. I mean, come on, guys, this
20	country and another thing, this country pits people
21	against each other. It pits the rich against the
22	poor. The farmer against the cattle boy. I mean,
23	jiminy christmas, I mean, you know, it's just like
24	Obama Care, forces somebody to do something. That's
25	what I feel like these people are trying to do. Clean

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1	Line are forcing people to do something that they
2	don't want to do. If this was such a great deal, why
3	don't they put it in their backyard? They're not
4	going to live here. They're going to put it in my
5	backyard and leave. And you know, I understand that
6	all these people, you know, they're coming up here and
7	saying they're going to make jobs, this and that, hey,
8	I feel for the people, everybody needs the job, but
9	the reason we don't have any jobs is because all the
10	jobs are shipped overseas.
11	The corporations in Missouri pay more tax
12	than anywhere else in the world. We're the least
13	amount of we produce the least amount of, you know,
14	poisonous gases and all that and all this stuff about,
15	you know, climate change and all that. They've only
16	been doing studies for 200 years and the world's been
17	here for how many thousands? They said there's an ice
18	age here at one time. It's always changing. If
19	you're worried about carbon [inaudible], plant a tree.
20	It's ridiculous that these guys want to
21	force this on everybody. Tell everybody, oh, well,
22	you know, we're going to do you a favor. They're not
23	paying anyone. They're not giving enough money for
24	the land and compensation that's going to happen to
25	us, and they don't care. It's all about the money. I

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1	mean, I don't understand, you know, how they can set
2	there and tell everybody that, you know, they make
3	promises, but there ain't nothing in writing. I mean,
4	I just don't get it, guys. You got the power to shut
5	this off, all you got to do is tell them, no, just
6	like Arkansas, but what they're going to do is they're
7	going to go to the federal level. Hey, we live in
8	America, everybody has an opinion, but you don't cut
9	one man's throat to save another man. You just don't
10	do it.
11	Otherwise, what are we going to do here? I
12	might need a kidney. One of you guys going to donate
13	a kidney? Is that what we're going to do, decide
14	who's going to get what? Those people in the east
15	coast, they don't got no wind there. You can't tell
16	me the wind don't blow there, so if you want to run a
17	power line clear across four or five states to these
18	states that don't have power, hey, they need to
19	develop their own energy. They got wind out there.
20	They can do it a half dozen different ways. We need
21	to take care of our own people in our own state, and
22	the county needs to take care of the county and the
23	people in the county. Not try to take care of a world
24	or somebody else. What's the east coast doing for me?
25	They're wanting me to sacrifice my land? Everything

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Page 56 1 I've worked -- 30 years, 30 years, so I can do this? 2 This is a bunch of bull shit. 3 All I got to do is develop their own land 4 energy, but the way I see it is it's over the money. б	this pipeline. And I don't think this should go
7	through because I don't think it's going to help the
8	Missouri folks because there's no power as far as I
9	know going through Missouri to help the Missourians.
10	They're just robbing our property, making our property
11	value go down, our [inaudible] if you can even sell
12	it. People aren't even willing to die. So, you know,
13	I've worked all my life to get this property, and I'm
14	basically if this goes through, it's going to be
15	worthless. I just don't think that it's the American
16	way. I don't think that rich people only get rich
17	and the poor people only get poor because they help
18	the folks that this is making them richer.
19	You know, I never served in the service,
20	but my father did and my brother did, and that's not
21	what it's about, and the my my daughter and her
22	family live up here and they farm, it's going to
23	devastate them. My other daughter has just bought a
24	place up here, it's going to devastate them. So it's
25	basically going to destroy my whole family, and I pray

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1	to God that you folks setting up there take this at
2	heart and really think about what we're doing here.
3	That there's so many families, families that this is
4	their whole life, their whole livelihood and, you
5	know, generations, you know, I I've got cancer
6	already, and I want to leave a legacy for my grand
7	kids and my grand kids to come for this property.
8	Well, this comes through, it's going to be all for
9	nothing. So I just hope that everybody really thinks
10	this over before they let it go through. Thank you.
11	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Thank you.
12	John Wolfe.
13	JOHN WOLFE,
14	of lawful age, produced, sworn and says:
15	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please state your name and
16	spell your last name.
17	MR. WOLFE: John E. Wolfe, W-O-L-F-E.
18	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Where do you live?
19	MR. WOLFE: [Inaudible] Missouri
20	[inaudible] State Route H.
21	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please go ahead.
22	MR. WOLFE: My concern since I was a little
23	boy, 12, and we've had the farm and about to lose
24	quite a bit of it too if this power line is going to
25	come through there now. And I don't believe anybody's

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1	figured out how much land we're going to give to them.
2	They actually buy it right away, but it's never yours,
3	you still pay tax on it, and have the regulars go
4	through there and cut this back in 1980 or 1880,
5	and when it closed out, we had to buy our own land
б	back and pay taxes on all of it again, but anyway, a
7	mile to 200 feet could take about 12 acres off your
8	farm, so I may never have access to it today with
9	power lines string around they said 400 somebody
10	said seven in a mile. I got three-quarter a mile
11	bottom right there next to the river, with the
12	pipeline, the north side, they come on the north side
13	of the pipeline within a hundred feet of the barns,
14	and in the south it'd be a little further away. But
15	anyway, it's money that's worth losing to them, and I
16	don't know why. Can't the United States do something
17	and keep the money in our country? But if you're
18	going to have a line over it, why don't they let the
19	United States build it? All this stuff to come in
20	that the pipeline went through, there the pipeline
21	oftentimes, why didn't they take the United States to
22	make it? No reason for that, they could have done
23	that. Why can't they build that line does it have
24	to come through here, it ain't going to do us in
25	Missouri any good at all. If it was, they'd put the

WOLFE: The transformers, putting in if 8 9 they want it in Missouri or Kansas either one, it's right there three miles to my house at the barn and 10 property line, and anyway, they're going to put these 11 seven lines in a mile across their line and have tires 12 13 on me. They bury concrete in the ground probably 20-foot. They said last night there wouldn't be any 14 heavy equipment on the land because a 600-ton frame, 15 16 probably set those tires right there. Concrete 17 trucks, probably two loads of concrete on each one, 18 loads they put on the tires. I have no idea. They 19 said they backhoe. Going to take a backhoe to dig 20 that deep all the way down. Doesn't make no difference. Why don't the United States do this 21 22 instead of letting someone else come? They said last night that there'd be \$46 billion. How much is our 23 24 government going to subsidize towards that? Everything else they do we help out, and I'm wondering 25

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Page 71 1 why we can't do it. If it has to be that, and again, 2 why don't they put the tires in Indiana, power, 3 [inaudible], they got all the -- just as it does here, 4 Kansas they're laying 700 miles to get to St. Louis, and said they're going to furnish Missouri electric, 5 they might in St. Louis, but they won't bring it back 6 7 across. They have all the dams right there in Table Rock and all that down here, but several dams produce 8 water, they said the waste water, goes down that dam 9 10 and all this waste goes anyway because it has to turn loose. Just takes electricity. There's several 11 12 things there that they're talking about, all the stuff 13 in the -- taking our land just because they got the right-of-way or get the right-of-way, it's up to the 14 public, you all to stop it. And if we would need it, 15 16 surely our people in the government in the United 17 States ought to be smart enough to put this power and all this stuff in because we have a lot of windmills 18 19 up there in Kansas City, Kingston. Isn't it -- they 20 said one of them will furnish lights for six farms? So that'd be a lot of windmills coming across Kansas 21 22 picking up electric to furnish all the electricity 23 back on the east coast. 24 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Five minutes. 25 MR. WOLFE: And I just think that we should

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1	think it over, our public should know about all this.
2	Thank you.
3	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Any questions?
4	COMMISSIONER HALL: Thank you.
5	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Teresa Sprouse?
б	MS. SPROUSE: I'm going to give my time
7	Lauren Sprouse.
8	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Lauren Sprouse, you
9	testified in Moberly; is that correct?
10	MR. SPROUSE: That's correct.
11	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Okay. I'm going to move
12	you to the bottom of the list.
13	Weldon Sprouse?
14	MR. SPROUSE: I'm going to defer my time to
15	my brother, Lauren.
16	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Ed Pautz.
17	ED PAUTZ,
18	of lawful age, produced, sworn and says:
19	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please state your name and
20	spell your last name.
21	MR. PAUTZ: My name is Ed Pautz, P-A-U-T-Z.
22	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Where do you live?
23	MR. PAUTZ: Address is Polo, Missouri.
24	Caldwell County.
25	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Go ahead.
1	MR. PAUTZ: Okay. First off, I want to
----	---
2	thank you, all of you for coming out and giving
3	everybody that this directly affects a chance to make
4	a statement and to be added to the hearings.
5	Myself and my wife, Virginia, are very much
6	opposed to this particular project. And agree with
7	most other opposition that's been stated. We live on
8	Missouri home place which is a registered Missouri
9	century farm which her grandmother started and was
10	carried on by her father. We are now there operating
11	the farm. We raise cattle, have chickens, pave the
12	ground, the garden. We take great pride in being
13	stewards to the land. It's one thing that's going to
14	be here past you and I and everybody else in this
15	room. We will some day perish in the land that we
16	have.
17	Grain Belt Clean Line has asked to
18	construct, own, operate, control, manage, maintain a
19	high voltage DC line and converter station in
20	Missouri. For me, that can't put up a bigger red flag
21	for everybody to take note to somebody that has
22	nothing but an idea and a pencil and paper. They've
23	never done anything like this before. They don't have
24	the equipment. It will all be done by contractors of
25	some sort. I don't think they have any intention of

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being a utility. They're just going to be a manager
 so to speak, so I guess they would qualify for one of
 those quotes.

4 I and my wife feel that Grain Belt has not 5 shown that they've had the ability to be a utility, and what they have shown to us personally is very 6 7 little professionalism and respect for the landowners. And what I'm going to base part of that on is our very 8 9 first and only personal contact with them within a 10 flier. I'd like to give to you as far as evidence that was an 8-and-a-half by 11 piece of paper that 11 12 they did have addressed to myself and Virginia. So I 13 can give them credit to that, but otherwise, it just basically was a piece of junk mail, you might say. 14

15 We attended the meeting at Cameron. Went 16 and listened to their spiel at all their different 17 locations and would confirm that the location, that Virginia's acreage is affected and where they plan on 18 19 going is cutting straight through the middle of the 20 farm. We also have a second acreage that is over east of this location and it would be within a half a mile 21 22 of that location also.

23 We explained then that we were not 24 interested in having the line on our property, and I 25 also questioned them that they were a private entity,

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1	which they said they were, again, I told them I was
2	not interested and they just come back with the
3	comment, well, we will compensate you. At this point,
4	they're a private indemnity [sic]. I have the right
5	to tell them no. They said, we were welcome to fill
б	out a form, which I did, again, telling them that I
7	was not interested in having a line on our property,
8	and also covered again that it was a century farm, and
9	that it could also be considered an organic farm. We
10	do not use sprays, chemicals, and things like that on
11	the farm.
12	And that this is causing us to lose sleep
13	having to worry about it until we were going to be
14	notified what would happen. And I also did request on
15	this form that when they made the decision that they
16	would contact us so we could be at ease.
17	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Five minutes.
18	MR. PAUTZ: Okay. In November, we went to
19	a meeting in Gower that they hosted. I discussed or
20	visited with Mike Lowler and asked him about the line,
21	whether it had come out and about the loss of sleep
22	and stress and having to worry about it, and he didn't
23	show much concern.
24	In February and March I went to the Polo
25	office and spoke with Loel Nusan, asked him about the

1	line and explained to him about it. And he did say
2	soon that they would be announcing something and check
3	back in a couple weeks, that it'd been moved to the
4	south route, and again, at that time, I asked for a
5	notice letting me know whether they were going to send
6	out something letting me know that they weren't going
7	to be crossing my property. Yesterday I spoke with
8	Loel because I never had received a letter. And he
9	said, I'm sorry, I forgot.
10	So to this day, I've never got a letter,
11	and Edlar Johnson was standing there and jumped into
12	the conversation and did a lot of talking, and so I
13	figured I'd ask her, what percent of Missouri affected
14	landowners are for this project? She kept on talking,
15	never answered my question. So as of today, I have no
16	information from them whether it's going to be on my
17	property or not. Only thing I have is their Internet
18	site and the maps they've got on there. I had some
19	other things I was going to cover, but you've cut me
20	off at five minutes, so I've completed what I've been
21	able to at this time.
22	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Any questions?
23	SPEAKER: I'd like to relinquish my time to
24	the gentleman.
25	JUDGE BUSHMANN: What's your name, sir?

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1	SPEAKER: Gary Stuckley.
2	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Okay. You can finish up,
3	sir.
4	MR. PAUTZ: Okay. Only other thing I was
5	going to say is we were also involved with the Midwest
6	Transmission Project, so evidently, where our property
7	is located, it's a pretty good site. But what I want
8	to hit on them is in January of '13 they sent us a
9	piece of mail and an envelope, a normal form with a
10	letter telling us we were in the proposed line.
11	In April they sent me another letter
12	letting me know where they were at in their process.
13	In June they sent me a letter in a post card and an
14	envelope explaining what route they had chose. I feel
15	KCP&L, Midwest Transmission Project, whatever, were
16	being thorough, time conforming, so I feel they were a
17	little bit more professional.
18	Also, I know that you have no control over
19	eminent domain, but also in granting somebody utility
20	status, eminent domain follows with it. That's a
21	tough cookie to swallow, and it's a lot of
22	responsibility. This very same farm in about 2000 or
23	2002, public water supply in Clinton County wanted to
24	upgrade their lines, they already had a present
25	easement across the road, and that's where the water

1 line stopped at that time. 2 They were upgrading and were wanting to go 3 over to Kingston to the jail and supply some other 4 water over there. I questioned them at that time, how come they wanted to come to my side of the road? And 5 they told me because the north side of the road's got 6 7 big ditches, it will cost more money. It will be 8 easier to come to your side of the road. Well, the reason there's no ditches is 9 because the fellas before me and myself work harder 10 for that land to try to keep it usable, so I don't 11 understand what eminent domain means, course of least 12 13 resistance or what's better for them. So I'm a little puzzled with eminent domain on that. That basically 14 concludes what I've got to say, but eminent domain is 15 16 a very strong tool. You might say that a utility can 17 use, so I want you to very much consider that in your 18 decision. My preference, of course, is for you to 19 deny, but you gentlemen have the decision, you got your work cut out for you. It's very evident, I 20 believe, that the landowners are very much in 21 22 opposition. So I've done all I think I can do. 23 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Any questions? 24 COMMISSIONER KENNEY: Thank you for your 25 time.

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Page 79 1 MR. WILLIAMS: Sir, did you bring some 2 documents you wanted to give? MR. PAUTZ: Yes, I did. I would like to 3 4 admit -- this is a photocopy, but it is in color of the one and only notification I got from Grain Belt. 5 That's the only personal notification I ever received 6 7 from that. 8 JUDGE BUSHMANN: That will be received into 9 the record subject to attorney's right to object. 10 MR. PAUTZ: Okay. 11 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Thank you, sir. 12 MR. PAUTZ: Thank you. 13 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Diane Davies. 14 MS. DAVIES: I wish to give my time to Lawrence Sprouse. 15 16 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Steven Newman. 17 MR. NEWMAN: I want to yield my time to Jennifer Gatrel. 18 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Okay. Jennifer Kisser? 19 20 JENNIFER KISSER, 21 of lawful age, produced, sworn and says: 22 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please state your name and 23 spell your last name. 24 MS. KISSER: Jennifer Kisser, K-I-S-S-E-R. 25 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Where do you live?

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1	MS. KISSER: I live in Kingston, Missouri.
2	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please go ahead.
3	MS. KISSER: I've not ever been on any
4	proposed lines. Not in current or previous, but my
5	community, my county and my state are literally on the
6	line and this project and these [inaudible]. I have
7	been fully fighting this for 14 months since we have
8	become aware in this area of the proposed project. We
9	have not stopped for a day without thinking about
10	this, worrying about it, and try to figure out what we
11	can do about it. I'm opposed to this project for all
12	of the reasons that landowners have spoken about up
13	until this point, so what I want to do is I want to
14	just mention a couple of topics that I have not heard
15	that have come up, and Mr. Kenny, yesterday it came up
16	several times, you had Mr. Robert Kenny, on several
17	occasions you had asked people who were testifying if
18	their opinion would change if the route was placed in
19	a current right of way or perhaps buried or any other
20	sort of adjustments. Primarily I heard people say no,
21	and I would fully agree with them. And the reason for
22	that, the problem itself is Clean Line, Grain Belt
23	Express.
24	This company has no credibility in our
25	communities. I can't even say that they've lost our

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1	trust. They never gained our trust. They never even
2	had it. They never tried to get it. They've treated
3	the rural communities very disrespectfully from day
4	one. I attended several open house meetings where
5	people were led to believe immediately that it was a
6	done deal. They pitted neighbor against neighbor as
7	they walked people through these open houses and had
8	you look at maps and gave people the illusion that
9	they could move the line. Where do you live? If you
10	don't want it here, well, we'll move it over there.
11	Well, those people didn't even know they were in
12	harm's way. There's probably still some to this day
13	that don't know that.
14	They've come in through the back door to
15	our county commissioners, causing terrible problems
16	between commissioners and the constituents by
17	misinformation and having them make decisions before
18	landowners or anyone else was aware of what was going
19	on. I believe you have a number of examples of
20	outright lies from people in Clean Line to landowners.
21	I think you have some in audio recordings. We've been
22	ridiculed, we've been called names, and this goes back
23	to the infamous, UCI transmission seminar that Clean
24	Line's response, where there was seminars or marketing
25	to Mayberry, how to work with bananas and any more

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1	bees. Those were direct references to us in these
2	communities. And as we all know, they either pulled
3	out or they were kicked out of that, so that did not
4	come to pass, but yet it was there and it was very
5	obvious what the intent was. They continue to
6	propagate the lie that this is I don't the
7	misinformation that this project is a done deal. We
8	went door-to-door just Saturday, several of us, and we
9	had many landowners. You've had landowners here today
10	tell you that the land agents come to their door, and
11	they tell them that it is a done deal, you might as
12	well sign now. That cannot be farther from the truth.
13	Everything not everything so much of how they
14	present things is that it's a done deal. By saying it
15	does not make it so. And people are very wise to
16	that.
17	As you can see now, it has changed
18	incredibly from the first days when we all learned of
19	this, it was it was kind of the feudal thing in
20	front of us, what do we do, what can one person do?
21	Well, it's changed quite a bit over the last
22	14 months. But finally, I do want to commend Clean
23	Line for one good thing that they've done. And that
24	is that they have awoken a sleeping giant of
25	passionate, like-minded people who care about each

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Page 83 1 other. It's not about us individually, you've heard 2 that from everybody and you'll continue to hear that. This isn't just Missouri. It's Illinois, it's Kansas, 3 4 Iowa, Arkansas. 5 We expect to very soon be connected with people in Indiana, Tennessee, New Mexico, California, 6 7 anywhere that Clean Line goes. There is likely to be a number of folks, like-minded folks like us. We will 8 find each other. We will all find each other. 9 There is -- this bond that we have, I have 10 11 never been involved in anything where when I meet 12 someone you have an immediate connection. I do with 13 every person here wearing greens, buttons, what have you. It is an immediate connection. We are all 14 committed to the very same cause and that is 15 16 protecting our life, Liberty, happiness, and our way 17 of life. That bond will never be broken, and I'm sure 18 that you see that and you see the passion. So please, 19 sirs, thank you so much for coming, and please make 20 the right decision. Thank you. JUDGE BUSHMANN: Thank you. Mary Starets? 21 22 MS. STARETS: I donate my time to Jennifer 23 Tramol. 24 MS. GATREL: Tramol is my maiden name, 25 sorry.

12	build and maintain power lines for the citizens. I
13	own a 40-acre farm in Carroll County. I reside in
14	Chariton County. I have family members that are
15	directly affected by this project. I'm not an
16	authority on illness, disease, property value. I can
17	stand here and tell you, though, that this will create
18	jobs in the electrical industry which directly affects
19	me. Like to stand here and ask you guys not to block
20	this project. That's all I have.
21	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Any questions?

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1	Commission, it's important to know that I give my
2	testimony as a citizen of north Missouri, and I have
3	no personal financial gain in supporting this measure.
4	I believe this committee's support for this project
5	will be a significant financial boost to the areas in
б	north Missouri. Both landowners and public taxing
7	districts will have benefits greatly with this
8	project. The taxing districts across north Missouri
9	will be approximately \$15.8 million along the route of
10	this transmission line. Not contacting the number of
11	contractors and employing numerous employee's
12	families. This is significant income without other
13	demands for services that are not normally required
14	for this significant infusion of capital. Alternative
15	energy is a must for this country. It is a small step
16	to energy and defense. A nation's economic prospect
17	is directly related to the energy cost. This
18	committee's approval would be a step towards
19	[inaudible]. I have heard the opposing arguments,
20	opinions, and positions. They're strong or opposing
21	this as landowner's right of property.
22	In this case, the landowner maintains full
23	control of the property except for an easement for
24	maintenance. They receive full value of the turbans
25	on their property. The landowner wants options of a

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1	one-time payment or annual payment with an increase of
2	two percent. Landowners can continue with the land
3	usage as before and will be compensated for the
4	property if damage occurs. If the regulatory body has
5	oversight and power to regulate with the necessary
6	bonds to support the damages to landowners in case
7	Grain Belt does not fulfill its promises; therefore, I
8	believe the eminent domain issue is moved, and I do
9	believe the entity is doing its best to deal with this
10	eminent domain issue. Thank you. Therefore, I'm in
11	support of the project.

21	MR. GATREL: Cowgill, Missouri.
22	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please go ahead.

24	for coming. And really appreciate the opportunity to
25	speak our minds.

1	My farm is not directly impacted by the
2	line, although, when it originally came out, the
3	middle line ran within 300 feet of my house. As the
4	man that just said, and I heard somebody else say, it
5	would landowners would be compensated fully for
6	their land value. It was going to come right down my
7	property line, between my dad and I's property. I was
8	going to get paid on half a mile. When I went down
9	and talked to Mike and Kerry of Polo, they informed me
10	a payment for half a mile is around \$72,000. My half
11	of that would have been 36,000. I did not believe
12	that that would anywhere near have covered the cost of
13	the loss of value of my house which would have been
14	300 feet from the proposed line, let alone my
15	80 acres.
16	I would also like to say I believe in the
17	pursuit of life, Liberty life, Liberty, and the
18	pursuit of happiness, and our happiness is in our
19	landownership and family farm and knowing that we can
20	pass our land down to our children. And I do not
21	support eminent domain for a privately owned company.
22	Thank you very much.

2	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please state your name and
3	spell your last name.
4	MR. HOLLIS: My name's Roy Hollis,
5	H-O-L-I-S.
б	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Where do you live?
7	MR. HOLLIS: I live in Polo, Missouri,
8	Caldwell County.
9	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Go ahead.
10	MR. HOLLIS: I come here today just simply,
11	my wife and I were brought up on a farm and we've
12	always chosen 44 years of marriage we've chosen
13	to live rurally. I was a mechanical engineer for
14	General Motors in Michigan, and my son located a farm
15	in Caldwell County, beautiful home, beautiful setting.
16	I was buying the view, and long story short, I was
17	notified two days prior to this being brought before
18	the Public Utilities Commission that this transmission
19	line had switched sides, and it was going to come on
20	me. So now, I've got a quarter mile driveway going to
21	my house, little creek bottom land, 80 acres of woods.
22	Quarter mile drive to my house. I sit within three
23	feet within the highest point of Caldwell County.
24	I've got a beautiful home, a beautiful view, the
25	entire east side of my house is glass, and we bought a

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Page 90 1 view. 2 We're not farmers unless you consider five ducks and a dog as a farmer, but we bought that 3 4 property for that view. Being in a creek bottom where they're coming through, I got a 13-acre clearing 5 there. My sons have always wanted to build homes 6 7 there. And me being the dad I am, it's not an issue. It is now because the transmission line provides, if 8 it's approved, will go right through there. So 9 obviously, where they would be setting a home would be 10 within the easement property. So I'm asking you guys 11 to look at this from a retirement standpoint. We all 12 want to retire some day. I sunk another hundred grand 13 in this place within probably the first 14 to 14 15 16 months after owning it by choice, but I chose to 16 reside there for the remainder of my life. Now, I 17 know that the property value's going to be severely impacted. Can I deal with that? Yeah. Monetarily I 18 can deal with that, that's not an issue for me. 19 20 But it's going to be an issue for my children because I had an opportunity to have my 21 22 children as part of a -- as part of an acreage, if you will, and we all live in a communal affair to where, 23 you know, I still got my children there. That can't 24 25 happen now. So I ask you to look at it from that

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1	angle. You don't want it in your backyard. Just
2	reverse the roles for a change. You look at it from
3	my standpoint. You put it in your backyard and front
4	yard. I don't have any 200-foot trees. I got a lot
5	of mature trees, but that being in the low ground, you
6	put a 200-foot tower up there. Now, when I look out
7	the east side of my house, guess what I see? I don't
8	see the rolling hills going to Kingston and see the
9	lights of Hamilton in the night. I look out, I'm
10	going to see tower and lines running. Selfish, yeah,
11	it's totally selfish because I'm concerned about me,
12	but, you know what, I've got a neighbor that lives
13	across the road from me that's going to be looking at
14	it from ground level. I'm concerned for him as well.
15	I'm concerned for everyone that's impacted with this.
16	I ask you to deny them public utility status. I don't
17	know when I've ever known or this is the way I feel
18	why should someone with money be allowed to push me
19	and all my neighbors, all my farmer friends, why
20	should they be allowed to push us around because
21	they've got more money? I I don't want to live in
22	a country like that, and I don't think you guys do
23	either. So I want to go on the record that I'm in
24	opposition to Clean Line, 110 percent.
25	And I just ask you guys, I thank you for

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1	your time, I thank you for the fact that you came to
2	us instead of us finding you, I appreciate your time
3	in listening to us and just ask you and pray about it,
4	if you would, that the decision you make is the right
5	one. And my opinion, the right decision is to not
6	allow them to come through. Thank you for your time.

And I complained about that, and now you want to put in 5 power lines in these people's lands that they worked 6 so hard to obtain. That thing is huge and will take 7 up so much of their property and you say that you'll 8 give them rights? Well, my brother-in-law moved into 9 this house after he bought it, and the people failed 10 to tell him that the Missouri -- Public Service 11 12 Commission had paid them for a portion of his land, and they took part of his land after he moved in 13 there. And he couldn't fight it because it was 14 already sold to the Public Service Commission. 15 This 16 is -- this is something that is different than what 17 these guys are fighting, but it's the same because the 18 land was sold before they moved into it, and he lost so much footage of his land. These power lines do 19 20 cause cancer. They do cause people to get sick. Because that is the reason why these people moved out 21 22 away from the city to get away from all that noise, 23 away from all that congestion, away from all that building, and you guys still have stuff in the city, 24 25 that there's empty buildings that nobody uses that.

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1 You've not made use of that. You did buy the 2 property, and they sit there empty. You don't house the homeless in them. You don't feed anybody with 3 4 They just sit there empty because you don't them. want to put anything in them. And then you pay some 5 people for their land to not produce on it or animals 6 7 or whatever, cows. That's wrong. That's their land. And it's not right for someone to take it and do what 8 9 they wanted. That's the reason why they moved out 10 here. And the land produces a lot of good garden 11 products. We have had so much stuff to share this 12 year with people that don't have food and we've been 13 grateful to share it, and we're grateful that you hear 14 us today, and we're grateful that you came and spent 15 16 some of your time away from your offices to come to 17 us. But we don't want our land taken away from us because we worked hard for it, and that's the reason 18 19 why we're out here in these rural communities because 20 we don't want the congestion of all the power lines and oil lines. And that cracking does cause some of 21 22 the earth to move. So you can see that in California from all that stuff that caused the earthquakes that 23 they have, and we haven't had that earthquake yet 24 25 that's going to come from down south up through here,

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1	but it is coming, and part of it is the fact that you
2	guys have produced so many buildings and so many power
3	lines, and so many oil fields, and it's loosening the
4	land and making it not producible. What are you guys
5	going to do? Where are you going to get this food?
6	Where are you going to put these cows? There's
7	nowhere to put them. It's not right. Where are our
8	natural resources? It's affecting our water. There's
9	been certain communities that have not had clean water
10	from all this stuff. It's not right. You guys have
11	to stand up for us. You're elected officials. You're
12	supposed to speak up for us, not against it. Not take
13	away our land, not take away our water, not take away
14	our natural resources. What are we going to live on?
15	Power lines? We're going to look pretty funny sitting
16	up there. I don't want to sit on a power line. I

5	there was 25 of them along the Delaware River have
6	all been ripped down, and I can assure you that
7	whatever people may tell you about utilities, the land
8	will never be the same, so that if you're going to put
9	in a series of 200-foot poles across the state of
10	Missouri, that's going to be an eyesore forever. I
11	was in the meeting in St. Joe last night, and I was
12	very much impressed with the presentation by a
13	professor there who stressed the necessity of a grid,
14	that we had to have a better grid for moving power
15	throughout the United States. I understand this. I
16	understand also that this is probably the first step
17	towards having this grid throughout the United States.
18	It's not that it's just going to happen
19	here, it will happen throughout this country. And
20	you're going to have a landscape throughout this
21	country of studding with 200-foot poles, and I'm not
22	opposed to wind power or efficient use of power. I am
23	a member of the Autobahn Society, not a member of the
24	Sierra Club, but I sympathize with them. I would say,
25	however, that if you're going to conserve the

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1	environment, you should try to find some kind of a
2	solution which will at one in the same time provide us
3	with wind power and solar power, and at the same time,
4	let this country look as though it's still a beautiful
5	place to be. Instead of having the landscape studded
б	with these towers, I would suggest that we go ahead
7	and put everything under ground. Somebody is going to
8	tell me that this is technically impossible, but I do
9	know for a fact that lines like this have been placed
10	from France to Spain, across the Pyrenees, and they
11	have been able to place these direct lines under
12	ground. I realize that it will cost a lot more money.
13	It will be more expensive, but I would urge Missouri
14	to be a leader in this, and if legislation is
15	necessary, the legislation should say that if you're
16	going to put in these direct these what do you
17	call it? Not alternating current, but DC. If you're
18	going to put in DC, bury it.
19	And I recognize too that that will have its
20	own cost, that the land through which it goes will
21	still be disturbed, that there will still be problems
22	with the easements and all the other things, but
23	you're not going to have the whole United States

That's what you've heard 4 over and over again. That's a common thing. We flat 5 do not want to do business with this company ever in 6 any capacity at all due to the way we've been treated. 7 These easements are like marriage ought to be. 8 Once 9 you enter it, there's absolutely no getting out. 10 Eminent domain in a sense is like a forced marriage because you don't have the right to say no, one way or 11 12 the other it's going to happen. 9	voltage DC, and I said, Carrie, if you think that I am
10	so stupid to believe what is so obviously a lie, I
11	don't know that I can trust you at all, and she said,
12	I will provide I will provide you with the studies.
13	I said, I would like to see them. Still waiting,
14	never have a have they emerged.
15	Okay. I would like to talk a little bit
16	about the infamous Clean Line kick ass pizza party. I
17	mean, you can't make this stuff up, gentlemen. Okay.
18	Here it is. So we got someone at MU wrote me and
19	said that Clean Line has offered college students a
20	kick ass pizza party, so I got on Facebook and checked
21	it out, and what they had offered is if they could get
22	a thousand signatures, then they would throw them a
23	kick ass pizza party. I mean, this is not I have
24	the actual screen shot from the college campus. At
25	that point, Paul from the Missouri Landowners Alliance

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1	requested the the e-mail interactions between Clean
2	Line and the students at Columbia, so we have the
3	actual e-mails received to and from where, in fact,
4	they are bribing them with a pizza party for getting
5	signatures to sway you for students who are completely
6	uninterested, but apparently are hungry.
7	I mean, so they were able, I think, to get
8	50 signatures even bribing kids with pizza, so that's
9	how desperate this company is. You can read it in
10	here. It's ridiculous. Also, I found in these
11	e-mails that we received pretty disturbing that they
12	apparently hired some kind of cyber spy. You can read
13	it. I'll read a part of it all.
14	We started subscribing Hi Grain Belt
15	team, we started subscribing to a new social media
16	monitoring service this week. It's going to be much
17	more informative, and much more efficient. Right now
18	it's taking time for all of our data. In the
19	meantime, here's a quick report taking place around
20	your project. And then it goes on to talk about the
21	things we've been doing. Are you kidding me? This is
22	the kind of company we're dealing with that they need
23	to hire some type of cyber spy to spy on us farmers on
24	Facebook. I don't even know about Twitter, so
25	apparently

1	Okay. I want to touch on that, the elder
2	abuse that occurs from Clean Line. You all received
3	an affidavit at the last meeting from a from a
4	landowner that was talking about her relative who is a
5	97-year-old being harassed at their assisted living
6	home. I find it despicable, first of all, that a land
7	chart could even go into an assisted living home, and
8	when they're asked to leave, not leave is completely
9	inappropriate. We also had a landowner here today
10	that I think he got he didn't get to finish what he
11	was saying, but he's an elderly gentleman. He was
12	called on the phone by a land agent and was told the
13	project's a done deal, you need to come in and sign
14	your easement, and since he already come and had
15	experiences with numerous utilities and he thought it
16	was, and if he had not come to a meeting, he would
17	have signed an easement not knowing the process had
18	begun. This is not the type of business that we're
19	willing to do business with at all.
20	Next, I want to talk about Missouri law.
21	And you all are really the experts on this, so I won't
22	try to educate you, but I really am confused as to why
23	we are all still here. Because Missouri law says that
24	and I'll just paraphrase it, it's Missouri 229.100,
25	that unless the utility has the permission of the

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1	county, then they cannot erect power lines.
2	Well, 8 of the 14 potential counties and 5
3	of the 8 counties have rescinded the approval they
4	previously gave Clean Line. They do not support it.
5	You all yesterday saw two of the commissioners
6	testified in Clinton County that they do not support
7	it. This is I'm not I'm just not sure why we
8	are even doing this. This is the PSC says, the PSC
9	may not grant a certificate of convenience and
10	necessity unless the applicant has already obtained a
11	local franchise, which is an absolute prerequisite.
12	And so I would just ask you at this point they have
13	not met it. It would be like my going to get my
14	driver's license without proper identification. I
15	can't do it. So I mean, I would love it if you could
16	just stamp no. I'm sure you can't, but that would be
17	my hope.
18	By 2050, our world population is expected
19	to increase by 2 billion people to a total of 9
20	billion. There's a lot of international worry and
21	study to determine how we could possibly meet the
22	need, additionally the median age for farmers is 59.9.
23	From about 1982 through the 2007 census according to
24	Bob Young, the chief economist with the American Farm
25	Bureau, folks just really weren't getting into farming

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1	that much. One thing about this is clear, gentleman,
2	farmers are providing the public need, arguably, one
3	of the most important public needs.
4	You also heard a lot of farmers speak as to
5	how they would be negatively impacted. Clearly, we do
6	not need to send a message to possible future farmers
7	that their land can be taken via eminent domain to
8	make out of state rich people richer.
9	And we've heard debate that it's easy to
10	farm around power lines, it's horrible to farm around
11	power lines. The result is this, if you hit it, this
12	is what can happen. It's a picture of a power line
13	getting on top of a tractor, for anyone that can't see
14	it.
15	All right. I would like to suggest to you
16	gentlemen that renewable cannot be sustainable without
17	it being local. I would like to repeat that.
18	Renewable cannot be sustainable without it being
19	local, and here in Missouri, there is a lot of great
20	projects coming on line.
21	In the news recently a huge methane
22	digester, I think, an \$80 million investment is being
23	put up in north Missouri. Amron is doing a national
24	investment in power. There's been disclosed people
25	digging their own distributed [inaudible] such as

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1	solar and wind. That, gentlemen, is the future.
2	Giant transmission lines transmitting power
3	from where it can be produced, the cheapest and I
4	should say in quotations, the cheapest, because it's
5	subsidized by our tax dollars, to where it can be sold
б	for the most money isn't the answer.
7	This is like a private partially foreign
8	owned company wanting to put a toll road through the
9	middle of our state's most productive farm ground,
10	only this road will start in Kansas and end in
11	Indiana. If the company promised it maybe kind of
12	sort of would let a few cars on the road in one
13	county, we would tell them to hit the road, and I hope
14	you tell Clean Line the same thing.
15	We know some of the investors at Clean Line
16	are, of course, heavily invested with gas and oil,
17	with that in mind, I'm very concerned with what is
18	happening on the plain and eastern line. The plain
19	and eastern electric line passes by Cushing, Oklahoma
20	and goes to Memphis, Tennessee. The brand new Diamond
21	Oil pipeline product starts in Cushing and goes to
22	Memphis. The impacted landowners I have spoken with
23	says the route is the exact same. Coincidentally, the
24	Keystone pipeline is stalled out in Cushing. My
25	question to you, gentlemen, is could the same thing

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1	happen here? In light of the MODOT paper and Laun
2	will testify to that, that questions the safety of
3	putting a DC power line next to pipelines. Is that
4	not a major concern? Also, 53 percent of the Missouri
5	Grain Belt route parallels the pipeline. If the power
б	line causes a rupture, the results could force
7	[inaudible]. My little son testified to that fact.
8	You don't leave a gas can next to a camp fire. A
9	six-year-old can tell you that. You ought not put a
10	giant electric transmission line over the top of a
11	pipeline, that's ridiculous. Here in tornado alley,
12	if a huge pole could get knocked into the pipeline,
13	which is a mere feet below the ground. Oh, and I
14	wanted to submit into evidence, it's press releases
15	about the different projects that are occurring in
16	Missouri that serves Missouri.
17	Ultimately, what this comes down to is
18	property rights and eminent domain. Here in the
19	country, land is usually earned with literal blood,
20	sweat and tears, often from generations of landowners
21	with a vision of the future that most include
22	perpetual optimism. They simply make it happen. It
23	means getting up early and going to bed late, and
24	always, always caring for the land. To say I own this
25	land is stated with pride and gratitude for those that

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1	have gone before. You all get to decide how much
2	power an out of state private company gets to have
3	over us. You all determine if the precedent is set
4	that will surely lead to further erosion of property
5	rights.
6	You have heard a ton of reasons that you
7	wish for the right to simply tell Clean Line no. To
8	approach us as a business to a business, those reasons
9	are personal because they should matter too because
10	the same great determination that saw them hold on to
11	the land will see them fight to keep control of it.
12	If Clean Line is granted a certificate for
13	convenience and necessity, then in all likelihood, we
14	will be seeing the largest taking of private land by a
15	private company in our nation's history. Landowners
16	have made it clear, we do not want to do business with
17	Clean Line. In our counties, Clean Line's name is as
18	they say mud. Chances are great, but if they if
19	landowners allow themselves to be taken through the
20	combination process, a group of their peers and in
21	combination, court will award far more than Clean Line
22	would ever willingly give.
23	You, gentlemen, have an incredible
24	privilege to protect your fellow Missourians and allow
25	us to get back to work. We would very much appreciate

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Page 121 1 you denying Clean Line. Thank you. JUDGE BUSHMANN: These documents will be 2 received into the record. Subject to objections from 3 4 companies, and why don't we take a ten-minute recess. (A break was taken.) 5 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Okay. Let's go back on 6 7 the record. The one gentleman that I did not pronounce his name correctly, so I will call him now. 8 Mr. Shrewsbury, Ed Shrewsbury. 9 10 ED SHREWSBURY, 11 of lawful age, produced, sworn and says: 12 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please state your name and spell your last name. 13 14 MR. SHREWSBURY: Ed Shrewsbury, S-H-R-E-W-S-B-U-R-Y. 15 16 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Where do you live? 17 MR. SHREWSBURY: Lathrop, Missouri, Clinton 18 County. 19 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Go ahead. 20 MR. SHREWSBURY: Thank you for having me, and I along with other people, I commend you all for 21 22 being here and listening to the people. This power line does not directly affect my family. I am a fifth 23 generation farmer. My son is sixth generation, and 24 hope my grandson will be the seventh, and I would -- I 25

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1	think you all have a great task and weight upon your
2	shoulders to make a decision like this because the
3	majority of the comments I've heard today come from
4	the people that are living here now. But you're going
5	to ultimately make a decision that will possibly
б	affect generations to come. And I would like to use
7	the example of when I was a 6-year-old, the first high
8	voltage power line came through my father's farm.
9	They paid so much a pole and so much for an easement
10	right away. They made that payment one time,
11	approximately 65 years ago, but my son now farms
12	around those same poles with no additional
13	compensation. In 1964 a second power line came
14	through, and they, again, paid a fee for their
15	easement, but I farmed around them all my life. Now,
16	my son's farming around them with hope my grandson
17	will be. Third power line came through in '84, same
18	kind of [inaudible]. We're still farming around them,
19	but we got paid one time.
20	One of the things that makes it hard to
21	evaluate what is this worth and how will it affect
22	people's lives. When I was six years old, my father
23	used a [inaudible] corn planter that was approximately
24	5-foot wide. My son now uses a corn platter that's
25	40-foot wide and a separator that's a 100-foot wide.

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When you go farming around an obstacle in a field with an implement that's 100-foot wide, it cuts your efficiency and that's what American farmers are about. They're the most efficient producers of food and fiber in the world. They're going to continue to be more efficient.

some type of air operating production. In food or 8 9 fire, a scout for insects or pests or drone or 10 possibly even the farm equipment may be some type of 11 hovercraft. We cannot imagine what might come in the 12 future, so when we look at these easements and right of ways, it's not a one generational cost or effect, 13 it's a multigenerational. And I think that's very 14 hard to evaluate what it would be worth or that could 15 16 go through a property. I didn't really plan to speak, 17 so I may get lost here, and I'll just keep myself 18 down.

But I think the one gentleman talked about a grid for power, and I think we all recognize, every one of us in this room is blessed to have electrical service. That's the greatest [inaudible] that my mother and father owned a farm in the 58 years they lived in a farm. We all want to continue. If we look at a map of the United States of the power lines that

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1	exist today, it would likely look like some type of
2	spider web as they crisscross around here and there.
3	And I think the Public Service Commission needs to
4	shoulder the load in figuring out how to establish a
5	grid that concentrates the transmission lines similar
б	to the way our interstate highways are from our
7	traffic. Possibly if a line is going to cross
8	Missouri, what about putting it on the I-70 corridor
9	where there's already a right-of-way or I-29 or you
10	name it, so I think there's a lot of things that you
11	gentlemen ultimately have to consider as to whether
12	you grant this or deny it because it's not a one-time
13	easy-to-picture situation. It's a great
14	responsibility. I'm glad I'm not in the position that
15	you are to have to make that decision. But as far as
16	these people that are farming and producing food and
17	fiber, I definitely stand with them.
18	I would hate to see someone else take my
19	family farm that's now in the sixth generation for
20	some type of so-called public project, when we have
21	worked generations to put together, that happens to be
22	several hundred acres my family owns because we've
23	been thrifty and hard working and good operators, but
24	it does mean a lot to us. I would I would guess
25	that any one of you setting in front of me would not

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1	want a high voltage transmission line running across
2	your own home property.
3	The other thing with the easements, and I
4	don't know, I do intend to address this with my
5	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Five minutes.
6	MR. SHREWSBURY: Thank you. That there
7	should be an annual payment for the use of this
8	right-of-way and a bond posted that if the company
9	that gets the easement or right-of-way ceases to
10	operate, that they are responsible for removing and
11	renovating the land back to its original state. Take
12	the case of cell towers in Missouri. Several have
13	been built, the companies go out of business. The
14	cell tower's on the person's land, the companies
15	defunct, but that landowner is responsible to keep
16	warning lights for aircraft on that cell tower or pay
17	to have it taken down.
18	Again, there's many things to consider.
19	I'm sure you all will do it, and I appreciate you
20	letting me speak, and the fact that you've given all
21	these people the opportunity.
22	CHAIRMAN KENNEY: Thank you for your
23	testimony.
24	JUDGE BUSHMANN: There are six people
25	remaining on the list to speak signed up today. All

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1	six of those persons have spoken in a previous
2	hearing. We have a situation where we have another
3	hearing that's going to be occurring this evening.
4	It's a fair drive from here. We're going to not be
5	able to take any additional witnesses beyond the six
6	that I've already signed up. And for you six people,
7	I would appreciate it if you only include information
8	that you have not already told us. I don't want you
9	to repeat anything that you've already said that's
10	already in the record and that's already preserved,
11	and also I would ask if you could be as brief as
12	possible, we would appreciate it. With that, we would
13	the next witness is Lauren Sprouse.
14	LAUREN SPROUSE,
15	of lawful age, produced, sworn and says:
16	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please state your name and
17	spell your last name.
18	MR. SPROUSE: Lauren Sprouse,
19	S-P-R-O-U-S-E.
20	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Where do you reside?
21	MR. SPROUSE: I live in Leawood, Kansas and
22	I am a property owner on the proposed Grain Belt
23	Express Line.
24	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Go ahead.
25	MR. SPROUSE: Commissioner and others,

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1	thank you for the opportunity to speak today. Really
2	appreciate to take your valuable time in order to get
3	the the right informed decision about the right to
4	try to really stop this ill-conceived project by a
5	private company trying to be a public utility. From a
6	background perspective, my brothers and I operate a
7	farm south of Braymer. I proposed DC line follows the
8	three [inaudible] pipeline right-of-ways through that
9	areas through about three-fourths of a mile through
10	our operations. This land has been in our family for
11	a little less than a hundred years. These pipelines
12	are [inaudible] oil lines. The [inaudible] Express
13	Natural Gas Line, and the Trans Canada Keystone XL
14	Crude Oil Pipeline. As I said in Moberly, these
15	buried lines are out of site, but not out of mind.
16	And I want to add to that to clarify the point I made.
17	Somebody asked me if they require ongoing attention
18	with the landowner with varied facilities and what I
19	mean by that is on our land there, we've had we've
20	had our livestock get out through temporary fences.
21	Pipeline leaks and subsequent pipeline leaks, we've
22	had soil compaction and tracks left due to mudding
23	retears on our property. We've had culverts damaged
24	due to heavy equipment. We've actually had the
25	pipeline exposed because of significant erosion on the

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1	properties. We had our water lines cut during
2	construction. They didn't even know they were there.
3	They knocked down overhead power lines, AT&T and the
4	same property brought in obnoxious weeds, at the
5	shatter canes that it's cost us additional money,
6	chemical treatment every year to try and fight this.
7	The problem we have is we currently have the problem
8	with a pipeline that's too shallow with a repair that
9	was made that we can't farm over it safely and likely
10	going to have litigation on that pipeline to get that
11	pipeline lowered into the ground, and so the final one
12	which is kind of insult to energy, we had this we
13	had an underground structure that AT&T landed on our
14	property, and we had to buy back the land that it was
15	on from them which kind of reflects the flaw in the
16	state processes around the way. [Inaudible] property
17	are handled. We literally had to buy back the land
18	from them, and then they gave us the crap they left
19	behind. And with all that said, we still prefer
20	buried lines than this monstrosity that's proposed in
21	our area. In fact, I wish we could have had this area
22	in our farm. It's a great location. I like the field
23	trip in our farm. In our farm there's elevation
24	change. When you look out the back of the farm,
25	there's about a hundred foot elevation. These

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1	proposed towers and lines will be the top of the hill
2	and will become the dominant visible structure that I
3	estimate for three to five miles, and it will be if
4	Grain Belt Express gets their way and gets public
5	status.
6	Finally, this whole thing I was really
7	appalled by was the way when I heard how close some of
8	these lines could be within 250 feet from a home.
9	That's that's say that I would have to go out
10	and look at 30 to 45-degree angle and look up at the
11	porch of my home if I had this line. That's just
12	appalling. 250 feet, that's less than a football
13	field in length, in fact, that's 83 yards. That would
14	be a long pass by a good quarterback; right? And
15	that's the distance of these lines from people's
16	homes. It's appalling to me, but you know, you heard
17	this over and over again today, at least a hundred
18	people told you about these concerns. I think a lot
19	of people want to focus on really the fact that
20	there's really no public necessity for this route and
21	this project and some of the unintended consequences
22	that may occur. You will be responsible for this
23	brothers' green scheme on your watch. Therefore,
24	because of that you'll end up being what we'll have to
25	live with the rest of our lives.

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1	First, I want to clarify here, I'm a
2	proponent of the wind energy. In fact, this very home
3	had wind electrical energy in 1920. And taken out in
4	the RAA that came out in the '40s, but the point is at
5	one point, it experienced even then, the wind energy
6	is highly variable, and since the national grid likely
7	will own this project when it's all said and done. I
8	thought it would be appropriate to get some figures
9	from the United Kingdom prepared by the John Mere
10	Trust, and in their research they found that wind
11	power capacity was extremely variable, in fact, and
12	not meeting the expectations that the clients
13	originally put in place in their studies.
14	The delivered capacity, for example, was
15	20 percent of it. It was less than 20 percent of the
16	stated capacity for more than half of the time, so
17	therefore, that would be if we were expecting at
18	500 megawatts. We would be getting a hundred
19	megawatts for half the time it was below 10 percent,
20	for a third of the time and less than 1.25 percent for
21	the capacity for a little less than a day a month.
22	What does that mean? That means for the Missouri
23	interconnection system operator, that the supposed
24	500 megawatts of wind energy, the Amron and the other
25	recent utilities would still need 500 megawatts of

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conventional gas and power need to be spun up on line
 when the power would die down.

3 Therefore, if they signed a power purchase 4 agreement, which I can't imagine them doing, if they 5 signed a power purchase agreement with GBE, they'd still have to have the same capacity on line to match 6 7 it megawatt for megawatt spun up to cover when the wind died down. Or the other option is you could have 8 9 that GBE can deliver that power more consistently by having their own backup, then that backup would be the 10 11 Holton, Kansas, Kansas plant that's just been 12 approved. So somewhere that coal is going to get 13 burned, and likely, if they provide power that somebody wants that's consistent, it would most likely 14 take away jobs from the state of Missouri. I heard 15 16 3,500 jobs, so in effect, if we bought power from that 17 and bought a reliable source of power, it would shut down plants here and cause coal to be burning in 18 Kansas. I don't understand it. And the investment 19 would still be on the books here in our state. 20 By the way, this variability is the -- is 21

22 what separates wind power as a technologist. I grew 23 up in the technology business. It's what separates 24 wind power from solar. Solar is more predictable on a 25 daily basis. I might add to it that Pacific Gas and

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1	Electric are introducing large scale solar power into
2	the power portfolio. And in the process of doing
3	that, they've put in their own weather forecasting
4	organization and that weather forecasting specifically
5	is there just to make sure to know whether or not the
б	sun is going to be shining a couple days in advance,
7	so they're going to be doing the production planning.
8	I said if we had this, maybe Amron is going
9	to have to hire some people maybe actually find
10	some jobs for this for retiring politicians. You
11	might be able to make some referrals to people on
12	this. Who had who really had a good ability to
13	tell which way the wind's blowing, so maybe some good
14	retirement jobs for them. Where all they have to do
15	is predict where the wind is blowing. It wouldn't
16	create jobs.
17	Again, pardon the humor, the second point I
18	want to make is the way GBE presents their information
19	about this line. They call it a six plus or minus
20	six-caliber line. I don't know how many of you
21	understand what that is. It's kind of an earn term.
22	However, in their testimony in the Illinois issue,
23	they finally used layman's terms on this to show this
24	is really a 1.2 mega volt line between the conductors,
25	and they also are about either 3,500 megawatts, it's

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1	3.5 giga watts to reach the size and scale of what's
2	going on here. And delivering 3,000 acres of power
3	with the large, probably reaching temperatures of a
4	150 degrees even without a sun volt on the water.
5	This voltage is three-and-a-half to four
6	times greater than any of the [inaudible] delivering
7	AC power. That high voltage brings with it all the
8	unknowns with these unprecedented levels of voltages
9	around [inaudible], ionization, electric fields, even
10	though if they're in their literatures. DC fields
11	have electromagnet fields. Third point I want to make
12	for this is this hole around this is this lack of
13	attention or disregard for the unintended consequences
14	of building this line. There are concerns by various
15	groups, you know, around electric fields, electrolysis
16	on pipelines, coronas, and UV radiation given off by
17	these extremely high voltages being used and
18	operational standards. This is going to be operated
19	by PJM in Indiana, which means we wouldn't have the
20	way the power is being controlled in the state of
21	Missouri. It's going to be controlled by Indiana. I
22	requested Missouri DOT to do the study on this on
23	highways, bridges, and other pipelines due to straight
24	currents on this project, and their research indicated
25	that there is a concern for the potential electrolysis

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1	on pipelines near this facility especially that's
2	operating them in a monopolar configuration, which is
3	what they would do during the maintenance
4	configuration, which is smaller power than the ground
5	that's [inaudible], therefore, it could drive the
6	straight currents depending on how long it is
7	operating the configuration. Electrolysis is the
8	biggest kern of the pipeline. It ultimately causes
9	leaks, ultimately causes leaks and explosions, but
10	I've actually had the unfortunate experience and
11	opportunity to see a pipeline fire, and I don't know
12	if any of you have ever seen that, but we could see
13	this fire over the horizon, and we drove we drove
14	from central Indiana for three hours towards that
15	fire, and when we got to the fire, we would the
16	fire was still probably 80 feet high, and it was a
17	natural gas line, I estimated when I just doing
18	some quick math on that I would estimate that that
19	line is a fourth of the size of the capacity of the
20	Rocky Express Pipeline. So when I look at that it
21	seems to me to be so capricious that they're allowing
22	this design, to allow this structure to be placed
23	anywhere close to each other on this state. And I
24	will turn there's a lot of other findings in this
25	MODOT document.

I will turn it in as evidence for this
hearing of the the final point I want to make on
this is about varied facilities versus aerial
facilities. I'm submitting another document from
national grid that states around 10 percent of their
high voltage transmission facilities are varied and
give different information about various techniques
they use to bury high voltage lines. So I get
national grid in their home country, find that their
citizens make them bury their lines there, but I guess
over here in the colonies they just feel to do the
cheapest way they do to put it is put it up, which is
in the aerial, and I think we need to hold their feet
to the fire on that kind of business decision.
I want to wrap up all my comments. Like I
said, I went in difference of the schedule here. I
just want to wrap up my comments by trying to put
things on a policy note, and that is for us to kind of
develop a leadership blueprint for the state of
Missouri. On this topic, first, I think we must be
very careful not to violate and hold sacred the
property rights by making it clear what constitutes a
public utility serving our state versus the wholesale
private transport company that doesn't deserve utility
status, number one.

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1	Number two, I think we need to take a
2	national leadership role on construction standards
3	with very stringent standards in the electric fields
4	like those at the World Health Organization is now
5	talking about. Companies must design or meet or
6	[inaudible] if they exceed the ratio, just set the
-	
7	standards for the United States. We can do that here
8	in the state of Missouri. These standards also ought
9	to include minimum distances that either underground
10	or overhead facilities in terms of how they could be
11	located from homes, schools, playgrounds and other
12	properties, so these standards these things that
13	these people have to build to, some place, we can lead
14	the country and set those standards on a policy note.
15	Included in that would be consideration for permitting
16	monopolar [inaudible] of this line, which it has just
17	lost of negative impact.
18	Three, we can take a [inaudible] and bury
19	facilities for preferred solution for our state in a
20	going-forward basis. If it turns out to be
21	uneconomical, so be it if that if it's not
22	economic, bury, do the right thing, then so be it, the
23	project gets cancelled. And just another business
24	decision, don't go on and build a fish cannery or
25	something, some other business.

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1	Four, we need to consider by the farm
2	legislation, like that is recently passed in Minnesota
3	where farmland owners can opt to sell their entire
4	farm to the utility or private transport company with
5	additional compensation at their discretion if they
6	believe the project has destroyed their property
7	value.
8	There's an article about that. I don't
9	have that as a submitted document, but it's the
10	Missouri Farmer Magazine, recently published an
11	article about what's set on there.
12	Fifth, very large escrow account policy
13	required [inaudible] in order for removable and
14	recovery of AT&T. Example, like the one I mentioned a
15	while ago, so I don't have the one project, gets
16	started, it goes bankrupt and they abandon it and we
17	have a giant piece of concrete on the ground and we
18	can't do that on our property. If we have with these
19	standards the real utilities, [inaudible] would have
20	the guidelines that would take Missouri through the
21	21st century for a model states where it could, just
22	its leaders to do the right things.
23	And with those standards in place, even the
24	private companies like GBE can also determine if they
25	want to pursue their project with private

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1	right-of-ways, but still maintain their standards to			
2	build. I just want to close with saying we just can't			
3	let companies like Central Grid or [inaudible] make a			
4	mockery out of our state by turning us into an I-95			
5	corridor, [inaudible] to drive through, and many of us			
6	have been there and we just can't let them make us the			
7	door mat of the Midwest, so they can make some money.			
8	Thank you.			
9	JUDGE BUSHMANN: These exhibit will be			
10	received into the record subject to objections from			
11	the parties.			
12	Donald Davis?			
13	MR. DAVIS: I'll withdraw. And go to my			
14	home county in Carrollton this evening.			
15	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Thank you.			
16	Robert McPhaters? Cindy O'Laughlin.			
17	CINDY O'LAUGHLIN,			
18	of lawful age, produced, sworn and says:			
19	JUDGE BUSHMANN: State your name, please,			
20	and spell your last name.			
21	MS. O'LAUGHLIN: Cindy O'Laughlin,			
22	O-L-A-U-G-H-L-I-N.			
23	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Where do you reside?			
24	MS. O'LAUGHLIN: [Inaudible], Missouri.			
25	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please go ahead.			

Page 139 MS. O'LAUGHLIN: Assuming that the projects 1 2 go forward within the parameters that we are to set, I 3 do see some positive results of it, and I wrote a 4 little short thing. North Missouri is a sparsely populated rural area. Small businesses and their 5 employees struggle to survive. We have a small 6 7 business. We employee 35 people, and we've been in business about 60 years. Tax revenues are in the 8 decline for our county services, the largely 9 agricultural area results in low tax assessments on 10 11 farms and higher assessments on our businesses and 12 their employees. Our presiding commissioner recently 13 related to me that his taxes were higher on his \$14,000 pickup than the taxes on a friend's farm worth 14 15 about \$350,000. Businesses must have work 16 opportunities if they are to survive. I would suggest 17 that a multimillion dollar project properly supervised 18 and regulated to protect the landowners is an 19 opportunity we would support. This project could 20 provide a great [inaudible] to our area businesses, our employee partners and county budgets for services 21 22 to all county residents. That's it. 23 CHAIRMAN KENNEY: Thank you. 24 JUDGE BUSHMANN: Thank you. 25 Wayne Beach?

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MR. BEACH: For the sake of time, I'll
pass.
JUDGE BUSHMANN: Thank you.
Alinda Baker?
ALINDA BAKER,
of lawful age, produced, sworn and says:
JUDGE BUSHMANN: Please state your name and
spell your last name.
MS. BAKER: Alinda Baker, B-A-K-E-R.
JUDGE BUSHMANN: And where do you reside?
MS. BAKER: Polo, Missouri.
JUDGE BUSHMANN: Do you have some
additional information that you didn't provide at the
last time?
MS. BAKER: Yes, I looked through my notes,
and I did retype them. I will submit that at the end
of this testimony. I tried to make a point that there
were many planned and existing transmission lines from
Canada and that in order to shore up the Eastern
states, those multiple transmission lines can be used
in separate sequences, you know, to provide power for
outages from one line. And the other point I made
I wanted to make was that the renewables here in our
state regarding hydropower can be used if we have
outages, those would shore up our grid.

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1	Regarding engineering new technology, we						
2	send shuttles up into space, if there isn't if						
3	we're presented that there's not technology to bury						
4	these lines, cost effectively, then we need to put the						
5	engineers on it to engineer line burial. Do we need						
6	to call in the Army Corps of Engineers? They did a						
7	great job with the dams, they've done, you know, a						
8	great job building things. Maybe we need a huge body						
9	of engineers that can tell us how we can bury our HVDC						
10	lines within existing corridors such as Iowa and						
11	Missouri corridors. When I said my joke yesterday						
12	didn't go over very well, but when I said Clean Line						
13	towers were up in the area, but not up in the area as						
14	their operational documents would be for four						
15	converter stations, no one laughed at that, so I want						
16	to give them a little more information. Converter						
17	stations are needed to download HVDC power. It can't						
18	be downloaded all along the route like AC power. The						
19	required converter stations are expensive and have						
20	limited over [inaudible] at smaller the losses in the						
21	converter stations may be bigger than in an AC						
22	transmission line than in the same distance. The cost						
23	of the converts may not be offset by the reductions in						
24	line construction cost and lower line losses.						
25	Multiterminal systems are rare. As of 2012 only two						

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1	are in service, the hydro [inaudible] in England			
2	transmission between [inaudible] and the [inaudible]			
3	was to also provide power to the Island of Corsica.			
4	So if they can't engineer, you know, buried			
5	lines along our existing corridors, how can they			
6	possibly engineer operations between four converter			
7	stations? Missouri should collect highly [inaudible]			
8	from the installation and [inaudible] HVDC that's done			
9	responsibly, and if an entity is awarded a contract,			
10	it should be the one to carry out the contract. And			
11	it should be additional that this contract cannot be			
12	sold without the Public Service Commission approval.			
13	Thank you for your time, and I would like these notes			
14	appended to my testimonies.			
15	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Would you like to bring			
16	them forward?			
17	MS. O'LAUGHLIN: Sure.			
18	JUDGE BUSHMANN: Thank you very much.			
19	This exhibit will be received into the			
20	record subject to objections from the parties. That			
21	concludes our testimony.			
22	CHAIRMAN KENNEY: Thank you all for being			
23	here.
