2	JUDGE DIPPELL: Let's go ahead and go on the
3	record.
4	This is Case No. ET-2018-0132, In the Matter
5	of the Application of Union Electric Company d/b/a
6	Ameren Missouri for Approval of an Efficient
7	Electrification Program.
8	My name is Nancy Dippell. I'm the Regulatory
9	Law Judge assigned to this matter, and it is April 23
10	and we have gathered for a Pre-Hearing Conference. We
11	had a little bit of technical difficulties and we are
12	getting started at 9:15.
13	So I want to begin by having everybody present
14	make their entries of appearance, and I'll just start
15	with the company, Union?
16	MR. LOWERY: Good morning, Judge. Jim Lowery,
17	Smith Lewis LLP, P.O. Box 918, Columbia, Missouri,
18	65205, appearing on behalf of Ameren Missouri.
19	JUDGE DIPPELL: And the Commission Staff?
20	MS. FORCK: For the Staff of the Missouri
21	Public Service Commission, I'm Marcie Forck, and my
22	information has been provided to the court reporter.
23	JUDGE DIPPELL: Office of Public Counsel?
24	MR. WILLIAMS: Nathan Williams, Chief Deputy
25	Public Counsel, and I provided my information to the Page

1	court reporter as well.
2	JUDGE DIPPELL: Spire?
3	MR. PENDERGAST: Michael C. Pendergast
4	appearing on behalf of Spire Missouri, Inc. My business
5	address is 423 South Main Street, St. Charles, Missouri,
6	63301.
7	JUDGE DIPPELL: ChargePoint?
8	MR. COMLEY: Appearing for ChargePoint is Mark
9	W. Comley, Newman, Comley & Ruth PC. My business
10	address is 601 Monroe Street, Suite 301, Jefferson City,
11	Missouri.
12	JUDGE DIPPELL: Renew Missouri?
13	MR. OPITZ: For Renew Missouri Advocates, Tim
14	Opitz. I provided my address to the court reporter.
15	JUDGE DIPPELL: Is there anyone on the phone
16	from Kansas City Power & Light?
17	Anyone from MIEC?
18	National Resources Defense Council or Sierra
19	Club?
20	Is there any other intervenors? I know we
21	have another person listening in on the phone from
22	Lockheed Martin, but are there any other intervenors
23	present that I didn't call on?
24	MR. HYMAN: Division of Energy but Marc is not
25	here. Page

JUDGE DIPPELL: Yes, and I failed to say that. 1 The Missouri Division of Energy, Marc Poston, asked me 2 if he could be excused. They do have someone available 3 4 in the room to discuss matters after we're off the 5 record. And I said that his participation was excused. Okay. I think that's everyone present. 6 7 We basically are here today to figure out how to go forward with this case. We have a pending Motion 8 to Dismiss from the Office of Public Counsel. And we've 9 10 suspended the tariffs for awhile but not for the 11 complete, you know, allowed time. I think that there's 12 been responses to the motion. I think everything is 13 pretty clear with regard to that. Mr. Williams, would you like to say anything 14 15 else with regard to your Motion to Dismiss? I think it was clear enough 16 MR. WILLIAMS: 17 unless the Commission has questions. 18 JUDGE DIPPELL: Okay. I'm not -- I obviously 19 haven't brought that to the Commission yet for decision, 20 but what I'd like you all to do today is to consider 21 that the motion will be denied and figure out what kind 22 of procedural schedule and how you would go forward if 23 that's the case.

JUDGE DIPPELL:

MR. LOWERY: Can I ask a clarifying question?

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MR. LOWERY: We should also assume that the 1 Staff's recommendation that the one aspect of the case 2 be dismissed will also be denied? 3 JUDGE DIPPELL: I would like you to assume 4 that it's going to go forward, whatever that procedure 5 would be, worst-case scenario so to speak from my 6 7 perspective if we have to go forward and whether, you know, whatever that looks like can be accomplished in 8 the amount of time that it has been suspended or if that 9 10 would have to be extended further. 11 There's no other pending motions. Oh, I know I did want to ask Union Electric about that. So you all 12 13 extended the effective date of the one group of tariff 14 -- the one tariff sheet. MR. LOWERY: The line extension? 15 16 JUDGE DIPPELL: Yeah. 17 MR. LOWERY: Okay. I do sort of recall that, 18 but I don't have it all completely in my head. 19 JUDGE DIPPELL: My question was going to be 20 why is that separate enough from the others that --I think we probably did that in 21 MR. LOWERY: 22 response to the Staff's recommendation. So we opposed 23 dismissing that aspect but we extended that tariff so we 24 could have additional time to discuss it because I don't

think Staff had generally, and Marcie can speak for the Page

1 Staff, but I don't think generally there was substantive 2 disagreement with conceptually that aspect of the case but they thought there was a legal reason why it 3 4 shouldn't be handled here, handled in a rate case. So I think we decided, and I think they suggested this, that 5 we would extend that on the assumption that their 6 7 recommendation to dismiss would be overruled and we would try to maybe -- let's put it this way. 8 that one probably has a greater likelihood of getting 9 10 resolved early than the other aspects of the case. 11 JUDGE DIPPELL: Okay. But it is still related sufficiently --12 13 MR. LOWERY: It is. 14 JUDGE DIPPELL: -- that it didn't need to have been its own separate case? 15 MR. LOWERY: No, no, they all have 16 17 relationship in terms of more efficient use of the 18 system, but it is a more narrow, I think a simpler more 19 narrow proposal than the other two and so our 20 anticipation is if it's not dismissed, which we don't think it will be and hope it isn't, that our differences 21 22 with the Staff, which I think might at that point become 23 technical, mostly technical, might be able to be worked

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out but that might leave the other two aspects of the

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case to be litigated.

1 JUDGE DIPPELL: Okay. Did Staff want to 2 respond to anything about that particular tariff? MS. FORCK: I don't think we have anything 3 4 else to add. 5 MR. WILLIAMS: If I may. JUDGE DIPPELL: 6 Yes. 7 MR. WILLIAMS: My recollection is that it is a complete change in methodology. I'm not sure that that 8 may not be litigated. I'm not quite sure where Public 9 10 Counsel is on that. It may be more than just a legal 11 question. 12 Yeah. JUDGE DIPPELL: That's again with 13 regard to procedural schedule I would like you all to 14 consider if everything before you is going to be litigated. 15 MR. LOWERY: Your Honor, for your information, 16 17 I basically have brought a schedule to discuss with the 18 parties this morning that assumed that. It would assume 19 full litigation of all three aspects of the case, 20 although obviously we hope we can avoid that but you 21 never know. If whatever further suspension would be 22 necessary to accomplish that schedule that we're going 23 to talk about, we obviously would have to do. So I sort

of anticipated that this is probably the road we were

going to go down this morning.
